A good deal of publicity has been given the Nursery and the files of the Journal would contain a lot of information about it, but the following facts might help you in refreshing people's memories: The Nursery is located near Rugby and houses children from much-bombed Birmingham. The children (about 35 in number) are from two to five years old and are either (a) war-orphans, or (b) half-orphans with the mother in munitions, or (c) children with fathers in the service and mother in munitions. They are all from poor families. The Nursery provides excellent care with a trained staff of matron, nurse and dietitian. I think Henry Warner can supply more information if needed.

Thank you very much for your help. All that we want is that the Nursery should receive support as long as the war continues. As you can see it has been more of a K.U. project than a town project although it has been called a joint one. But K.U. will contribute generously to this fall's War Fund and we are not really out of luck, are we, in asking that the Nursery be provided for?
