The Community Chest is an incorporated body authorized under the laws of Kansas with a constitution and by-laws. The officers are Mr. George Lowman, Prof. J.O. Jones, Messrs. Ruben Fox, F.C. Whipple and Charles Louk.

The total budget for lawrence and the year is \$7546.00. Dear Mr. Schaal:

I have just received a check from Miss Minnie S. Moodie for \$10.00 for the Community Chest. This is a rather belated give but nevertheless one that is appreciated by the Chest officials as well as, I am sure, by the beneficiaries. Since this may be the last of the contributions, I am turning over about \$60.00 that has accumulated here to the Chest headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce Building.

I feel at this time, since we are about ready to close up the First Annual Lawrence Community Chest Drive, that it is perfectly fitting and proper that we should give a report of the workers here on the Hill and the amount of money that they collected.

I might also outline the policy that I pursued in organizing the Drive. First, I wrote a personal letter to each individual that the Special Gifts Committee of the Lawrence Community Chest allocated to me. I set out the fact that the Community Chest was an incorporated body, authorized under the Laws of Kansas with a constitution and by-laws. The officers were then listed, and the total budget for Lawrence was given. Inindicated the purposes of the drive, the date the drive was to begin, the beneficiaries of the plan and the dead-line or the date the pledge cards were to be returned. I also explained why the Red Cross and the K.U. YMCA and YWCA were not included among the beneficiaries.

A letter was then written to the following workers, who as individuals were to be responsible for soliciting either the members of special departments, or parts of a building which might be allocated to them, or even in some cases a whole building, if the task was not too large.

We pointed out the important and convincing requirements of this very necessary project, giving the dates and other important data as well as the officers of the organization, and so forth. The general facts that were covered in the first letter were also given in this one. We emphasized the complimentary breakfast for the downtown workers in the Eldridge Hotel, Tuesday morning at 7:30, and insisted these workers availathemselves of the opportunity to be present to receive the necessary inspiration which would enable Lawrence and Mount Oread to go over the top in keeping with the ideals and practices of free America. We also stated that the chairman would write a special campaign letter to all members of the faculty and endeavor to make the solicitation somewhat more efficient and easier. We pointed out the fact that an individual may deduct 15% of his net income under the Federal and State Income Tax Law. This information was to be passed on to the individuals solicited, hoping that the contributors would give freely, but I admonished all of them not to oversubscribe.

Then the third letter was written to each and every faculty member and employee of the University of Kansas. In this letter we endeavored to stimulate the patriotism and the responsibility that each and every one and of us feel at the present time in contrast to the misery and want in the European countries. We did not mention that, but we did call attention to the old English slogan: "There will always be an England," and we paraphrased that with "There will always be an America and an England."

I said, "Home and neighbor are the warp and the woof of American virility and democratic hospitality. We recognize the needs of our neighbors and we unfailingly respond to these needs founded uponhelpful service.

The Community Chest idea is founded upon the mpinciples of democarcy. Each of us give to a fund where all beneficiaries are aggredated and one single drive is made. For some of these activities it is thinkable that in the past we have made no contribution; for others we give annually. A budget has been made and I am enclosing it herewith to show you the beneficiareis of the plan."

I then set out in the body of the letter the general data that I had emphasized heretofore; hamely, the incorporation data, the officers, the date of the drive, the total budget, including the Christmas Program and the Fourth of July Celebration, listed separately, and the explanation why the K.U. YMCA and YWCA and Red Cross were not included, and so forth.

I devoted a paragraph to the Kansas City, Missouri Community Chest campaign and manifested the speendid response that the Missourians had made to such a worthy cause. I noted that there would be no pressure exerted here in Lawrence on anybody by anyone; in fact, we stated that we desired that the individuals give only as their conscience and their pocketbook dictated. I also mentioned the fact that Chancellor Malott has approved the Community Chest Drive here on the Hill. The letter then stated "The chairman is asking one of the following gloup of faculty members to call upon you in your building in an effort to make your solicitation somewhat easier and more efficient." A list of the solicitors followed, then In the name of some of those less fortunate than we, I am, Sincerely yours, Forrest C. Allen, Chairman, University Committee."

This letter was delivered to the University postoffice the night before the drive started so that it would get into the 8:00. It was planned that this letter would be open by the faculty members and the employeeds at the eleventh hour prior to the workers presenting their pledge cards on the opening day of the drive.

We then personally contacted every solicitor over the telephone, pointing out the necessity of getting on the job and staying with it until we had gone over the top, if possible, the first day. I am now listing the names of the workers together with the amount of the donations that they turned in at the office of the Physical Education Department, which was our headquarters for the drive.

I desire to thank the officers and the office help of the Community Chest Drive for their kindness and courtesy in endeavoring to soften the rougher spots of a campaign that worked wonderfully well for the first effort of such a civic venture. The job of assembling these contributions was an unusual task and Mrs. Humphrey and her assistant did a wonderful job. However, I believe next year that the

miscellaneous group, which included so many divergent interests and heterogeneous groups could be broken down into a more efficient and workable plan. In this miscellaneous group I found the School of Medicine, which we asked Dr. Nobel P. Sherwood to handle. He also accepted the hospital personnel and the Watkins Nurses Home group. The Physical Physical Building (Blake Hall) could have been and should kare been allocated next year to Dr. Stranathan, Dr. Kester or Dr. King. I took that as a part of my miscellaneous group. All the halls, such as Corbin Hall, I think, Miss Zipple should have that for hext year, and watkins Hall. for self-help girls, and Miller Hall, and the Union Building. John J.O. All the Miscellane ous group was handed to me unexpectedly and instead of doing a good supervisory job I was forced to get out over the campus past the twelfth hour and get these cards into the hands of the workers. It was such an overwhelming job that I wrote personal letters to each one of these individuals and sent them through the University mail at once. Miss Minnie Moody's check, which just came in from the Spoener-Theyer Museum was such a letter which was written the first day and just now received response. I believe that each one of the matrons in these halls whould be asked to solicit their building, even though they and one or two other employees are the only ones listed therein. This would allow the disposition to be handled efficiently and it would also impress those people with their responsibility of getting the job done. Therefore, on the Miscellaneous group I would make the people in each one of those separate buildings responsibil for their own

pledge and I would list them in that fashion.

Also from the miscellane ous group we picked out the ministers at Myers Hall and asked Rev. Barr to handle those for us. I am suggesting, therefore, that in everyone of these cases that we have a chairman or worker named just as we have these other workers listed to handle each building.

I am enclosing a copy of the letter that I have written these workers which wantkikuten can be included in your files.

I believe that I have covered almost every detail that I can think of regarding this drive, and I trust that this information may be helpful for the job of my successor next year.
