In a letter from Chancellor E. H. Lindley, as of October 13, 1938, he states as follows:



SENATE ADVISORY COMMITTEE REPORT TO SENATE

In the November meeting the Senate delegated to the Advisory Committee the task of defining and delimiting the function of the Senate Committee on Athletics and the Athletic Board. The Advisory Committee has studied the problem for a period of some three months and has held numerous meetings and conferences in the course of its study.

As a result of these deliberations and conferences certain facts emerged which seem to the committee to be of paramount importance in the consideration of the problem and basic to any action which the University Senate may take. Some of these major facts the committee had in mind are:

1. The charter of the Physical Education Corporation itself bears upon the problem. We quote from the charter

"That this corporation is organized not for profit and that the purposes for which it is formed are:

"To promote and encourage the physical education and development of the students in the University of Kansas in harmony with and in subjection to the general educational policy of said University; to schedule and manage athletic contests of such sorts as are in harmony with the policy aforesaid and collect and own the receipts from all such contests and expend and disburse the same in the interest of the physical education of the student body of the University of Kansas; to borrow money for the above purposes and own or lease such property, real or personal, as it is necessary or proper to hold therefor."

From the minutes of the Board, May 29, 1928

"That there be a Board of Directors of the Physical Education Corporation constituted as follows: seven members of the faculty, three alumni members, and two students. This proportion is necessary in order to satisfy the regulation of the conference to which we belong that athletics shall be under full faculty control."

2. That by the nature of the charter of the Physical Education Corporation and the administrative organization set up under this charter the Senate has no direct part to play in activities of the Physical Education Corporation or

control over its activities except in so far as it has become the practice of the Athletic Board to delegate the choice of faculty members to the Senate.

3. There appears to be considerable evidence that provision for student physical recreation other than intercollegiate athletics is inadequate in comparison with other institutions. This inadequacy seems to be the result of numerous factors, including insufficient funds, inadequate equipment, and insufficient personnel.

4. No definite information is available as to the actual number of students served by the present intramural program, but it is highly probable that not more than fifty percent of the total student body is served by such programs and that disparity exists in respect to the proportion of students in organized fraternities and those not so organized who are involved; also there appears to be a disparity in respect to the number of men as compared to the number of women served.

5. The intramural and general physical recreation program as now existent seems to have no recognized sponsoring body. It is at present carried on by the Department of Physical Education, whose principal recognized obligation is the physical education curriculum in all its phases.

6. There is, in fact, an almost complete separation between competitive athletics and the physical education activities and physical recreation activities. The personnel concerned with the former is almost, though not completely, separate from the latter two, and the administrative machinery of the former almost completely divorced from the latter two. In effect the competitive athletics are carried on and financed by a corporation outside the University, though theoretically responsible to the faculty according to the regulations of the conference to which we belong (see quotation above).

With this general basis in mind, and in view of the fact that it would seem that the Senate does have certain responsibilities and should be informed in regard to the activities and welfare of all the students of this University who participate in intercollegiate competition as well as in regard to the physical well being and physical recreation of the student body as a whole, the Advisory Committee suggests that either one of two alternate plans is available to the Senate, namely:

a. Since according to its charter the Athletic Board really does have all the powers which any senate committee on athletics could have, and the actual activities and interests of the Athletic Board might be expanded to include the functions hereafter set forth, in which case no Senate Committee on Athletics would be needed.

b. Or, since it would seem that at the present moment the Athletic Board must concern itself largely with intercollegiate competition and allied affairs, the Senate might continue its Committee on Athletics as a liaison committee to work in connection with the Athletic Board and the Department of Physical Education. In this event it is suggested that this committee be renamed the Senate Committee on Athletics and Physical Recreation.

In either event the Advisory Committee suggests that the Senate approve as functions of the Athletic Board or committee of the Senate at least the following:

1. That with respect to intercollegiate athletics the Board of Senate committee

a. Study the question of the requirements of hours of enrollment and standards of quality for athletes with a view to recommendation (if and when desirable) to the Big Six Conference through our regular representatives.

b. Investigate the academic load, psychological test records, and

academic records of members of varsity teams for the past five years, and make such recommendations concerning the maintenance of academic standards as may seem warranted.

c. Investigate the matter of employment for support of members of athletic varsity teams during their residence as students at the University and recommend regulations concerning such employment.

d. Investigate and make recommendations concerning the control of eligibility of varsity squads.

e. Concern itself with informing the Senate regarding any other matters affecting the status or welfare of students involved in inter-collegiate competition, or affected by activities looking toward such competition.

2. That with respect to intramural sports and physical recreation the Athletic Board of Senate committee

a. Secure and transmit to the Senate full and complete data upon the present program of intramural sports and other forms of physical recreation, including data concerning the number of students involved by sexes and whether members of organized houses or not; the schedules of games; the nature and adequacy of supervision; the status of the equipment of players; and similar pertinent data.

b. Consider the advisability of control and limitation of games for any given organized groups; the control of hours of scheduling games, especially games after 8:30 p.m. except on week-ends.

c. Investigate and recommend concerning certain hazardous games such as touch football, possibly with a view to the elimination of such games unless adequate facilities and supervision can be provided for them.

d. Investigate and recommend concerning the improvement of playing fields and equipment.

e. Investigate and recommend a method or methods for student participation in the organization of physical recreation and intramural sports program.

f. Recommend a policy for a general program of physical recreation.



The Chairman of the Senate Jan. an Athletics respectfully
submits the following report —

The U. of Ks. Phy. Ed. Corp. ^{otherwise known as the Athletic Board} a non-profit sharing
corporation of 14 members, eight of whom are faculty
members, control the finances and direct the intercollegiate
athletic policy of the U. of Kansas. The eight faculty members
on the U. of Ks. P.E.C. ~~are as follows~~ ^{also two student}
members, the Pres. of the Mens Student Council and an athletic
member of the student body are elected by the student body.

This election serves as a nomination to the U. of Ks. P.E.C.
The corporation elects ~~the two student~~ ^{these two} members to their board.
The Chairman also elects their four members and
that election serves as a nomination to the Corporation. The
four alumni members who hold membership under this
plan are 4 yrs 3 yrs 2 yrs 1 yr —

The eligibility for the athletics participation of all
athletes is set by the Missouri Valley Conf. etc. or
the Big Six. Prof W. W. Davis is Faculty Rep —

representing Kansas in this Conference.

The faculty representatives are the legislative body
of the Conf. making all laws and rules governing participation of
the athletes. The Athletic Dir's are the business managers
arranging all schedules ^{and business details all of which} must be approved
by the faculty representatives

The Senate Com. on Athletics has not been extremely active since the formation of the U. of K. P. Corp. in 1923. However it seems entirely logical that intra-mural athletics should come under the scope of the powers of the Senate Com. on Athletics.

The Charter of the Univ. of K. P. E. S. states that when the stadium is paid for the earnings of the Corporation shall go toward play utilities for the students of the U. of Kansas.

The total cost of the Stadium to date is \$660,000 and there is a debt of \$150,000 remaining in the form of debenture bonds bearing an interest rate of 5 1/2% per annum.

An annual principal payment of \$12,500 is due Dec 1st and interest amounting to \$8250.00 is due semi annually on June and Dec 1st. If the present schedule is maintained the stadium will be free of debt Dec 1st 1936.

Several years ago Dean Geo. Shagel then fac. rep. rep. Kansas proposed that the hours for electing be reduced to 20 hrs of C work instead of the then 30 hrs ^{work above failing} for engineering 38 hrs for law and 27 hrs for College - This was voted down - Three years ago the Eng. req. was reduced to 28 hrs but no higher standard of grades ^{was} proposed. It seems entirely fitting that an investigation into the normal amount of work successfully carried

passed by the majority of students at the Univ of K
could serve as a ~~measuring~~ ^{standard} stick for athletic
competition. Most of the athletes work a
whole or part time in an effort to get thru
school. If a student works he may carry
but 12 hrs of academic work. Should he
pass 100% of his work the two preceding
semesters he is still ~~short~~ ^{short} 3 or 4 hrs.
on eligibility requirements. Summer school
or correspondence work is the only
thing open to him for eligibility. He needs
this summer work to recoup his financial
depletion. I would ^{respectfully} recommend the raising
of the standard to a C average and the
lowering of the hours to 10 ^{per} semester
making a total of 20 hrs - of Cs for
the two preceding semesters prior to athletic
participation.
