
Dear Doctor Allen:

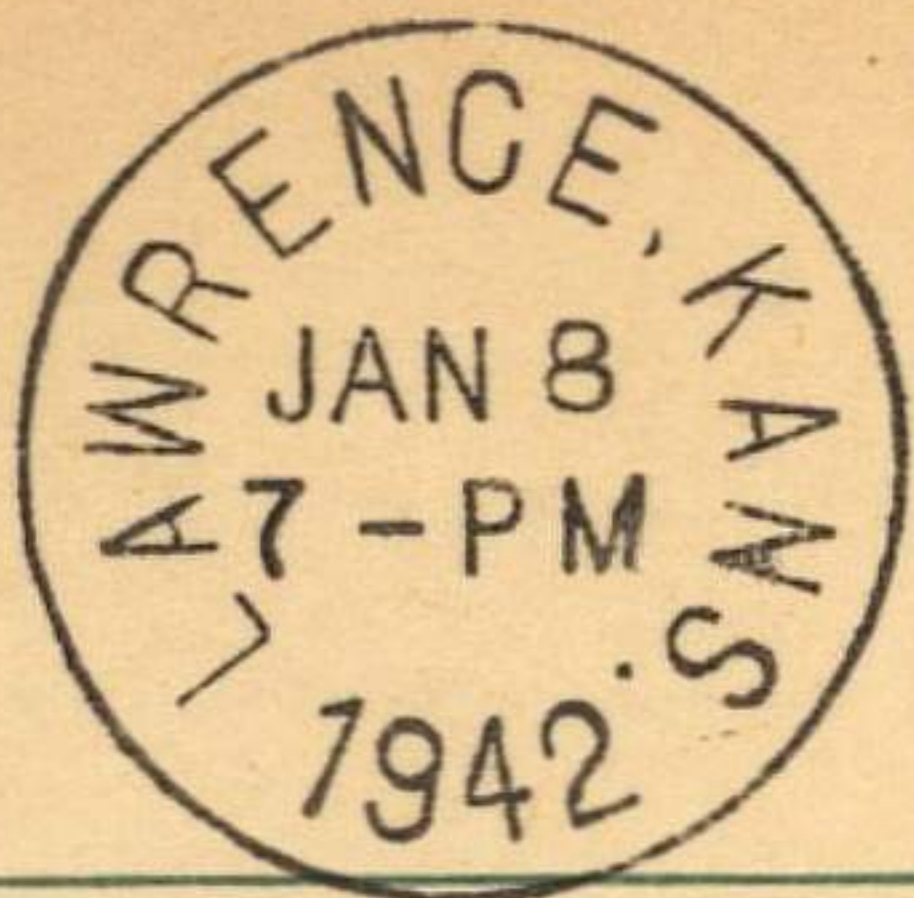
I received this morning your notice of the meeting of the Salvation Army Board to be held at noon on Wednesday, January 14, at the Green Lantern Cafe.
