Dear Bert:

Thank you very much for your nice letter of January 3rd. I want to congratulate you and the Des Moines Register and Tribune on the wonderful coaching school that you put over. Of course, Sec comes in for a fulsome share in being broadminded enough to get behind a project such as this.

I also thank you for the two checks. The one for \$400.00 has been turned over to Mr. Earl Falkenstien, our financial secretary, while the \$25.00 check for my lecture has found a very ready response and has been put where it is needed most to keep the wolf from the garage door.

Bert, I would like your counsel. I have had a great many fellows ask me why I did not put on a coaching school, one in which I would teach the high school coaches and others my course in treatment of athletic injuries. I would like to refer you to page 339 of my book, "Better Basketball", where I mention the four fellows who have been trained by me and are trainers now: James M. Cox, trainer of Harvard athletic teams, Roland Logan, trainer of the Boston Red Sox, who on January first started as head trainer of athletic teams at Pittsburgh University, Milton Kelley, trainer at the University of Texas, and Elwyn Dees, our present trainer at the University of Kansas. All of these men are graduates of the University of Kansas and were athletic trainers here before they went to their respective present positions.

The high school and college coaches know less about the treatment of athletic injuries than they do of any sport they teach. Therefore, I believe that such a course as this would go over big. I have these courses at the different coaching schools but time is so limited that I can only give them a smattering of training.

For that reason I thought I would put on a summer coaching course, just giving the treatment of athletic injuries and basketball. I am wondering if you would be kind enough to send me a list of the coaches that registered for your Des Moines Register-Tribune coaching course this past December. I assure you that I would not embarrass you in any way, but I would like to pick out some of the

names of these coaches and write to them personally and find out what they think of such a possibility. I will appreciate it very much, Bert.

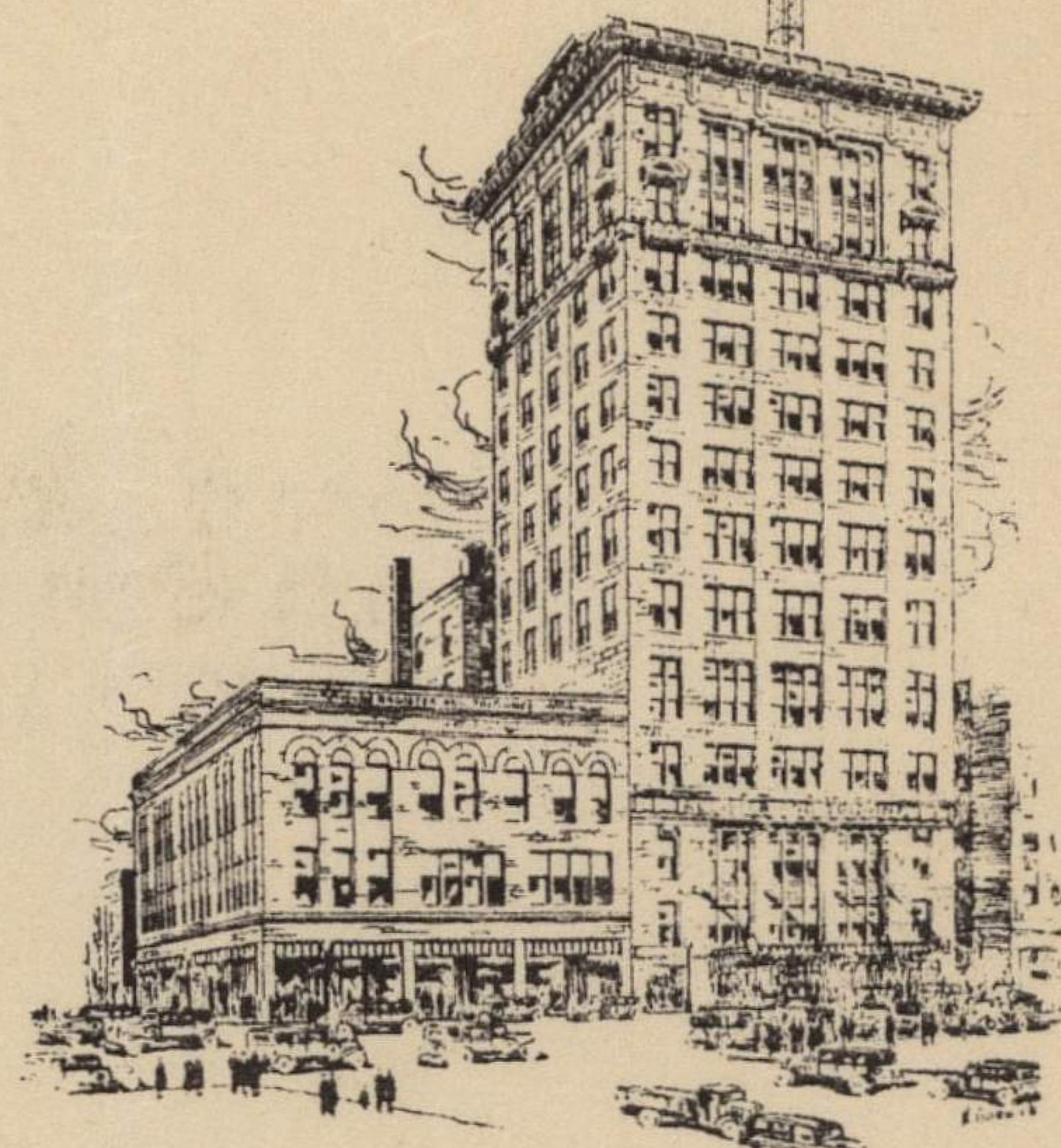

Dear Friend Lind:

I am sending you under separate cover a bulletin "Balancing the Box Score", put out by our director of publicity here at the University, Professor W. A. Dill. I thought this might prove interesting to you.

By the way, Friend Lind, I have a promotional idea on. I receive so many requests from coaches all over the country asking if I would put on a special course at some school, say a week or two weeks, devoted nearly exclusively to treatment of athletic injuries. I thought if I might locate some populous place and give this course in the days and in the evenings I could give basketball, not having anyone else connected with it. It would be the Phog Allen coaching school on treatment of athletic injuries and basketball.

I would like to refer you to page 339 of "Better Basketball", in which I mention James M. Cox, trainer of the Harvard athletic teams, Roland Logan, trainer for the Boston Red Sox, who on January first started as team trainer for Pittsburgh University, Milton Kelley, trainer at the University of Texas, and Elwyn Dees, trainer at the University of Kansas. All of these men are graduates and were trainers at the University of Kansas before they went to their respective present positions.

I am wondering why you and I couldn't put on a school at Wittenberg College, have you as publicity man and promoter, and I would do the work. I have had inquiries from coast to coast from high school and college coaches who want this sort of work. While we might use Wittenberg or some other school in Ohio as our focal point, you and I would do the job. We would have the school limited to a certain number, and my thought was that we would charge \$25.00 for a full course. We would work these men in squads of four and have enough training tables so that we could handle the full course and every man would get experience in taping, treatment of athletic injuries, adjustments, and so forth.

From my long experience in these coaching schools I believe both of us could make some money. With your exceptional talent in getting the publicity over, I know that we could go big. I am wondering if Dr. Tullis would let us use the facilities at Wittenberg for the publicity and advertising that might build up the school. Of course, we would pay all expenses.

I would like to know what you think of this. Of course, it would be necessary for us to start soon. What would you consider an adequate advertising budget, and what do you figure your work as publicity man and secretary-promoter-manager of this school would be worth? I would furnish the finances necessary to promote the school and you would only be obliged for the publicity in putting the thing over. Since I would have to do all the work of the school, do you think that 20% or 25% of the net income would be worth your trouble? I believe we could make something out of it.

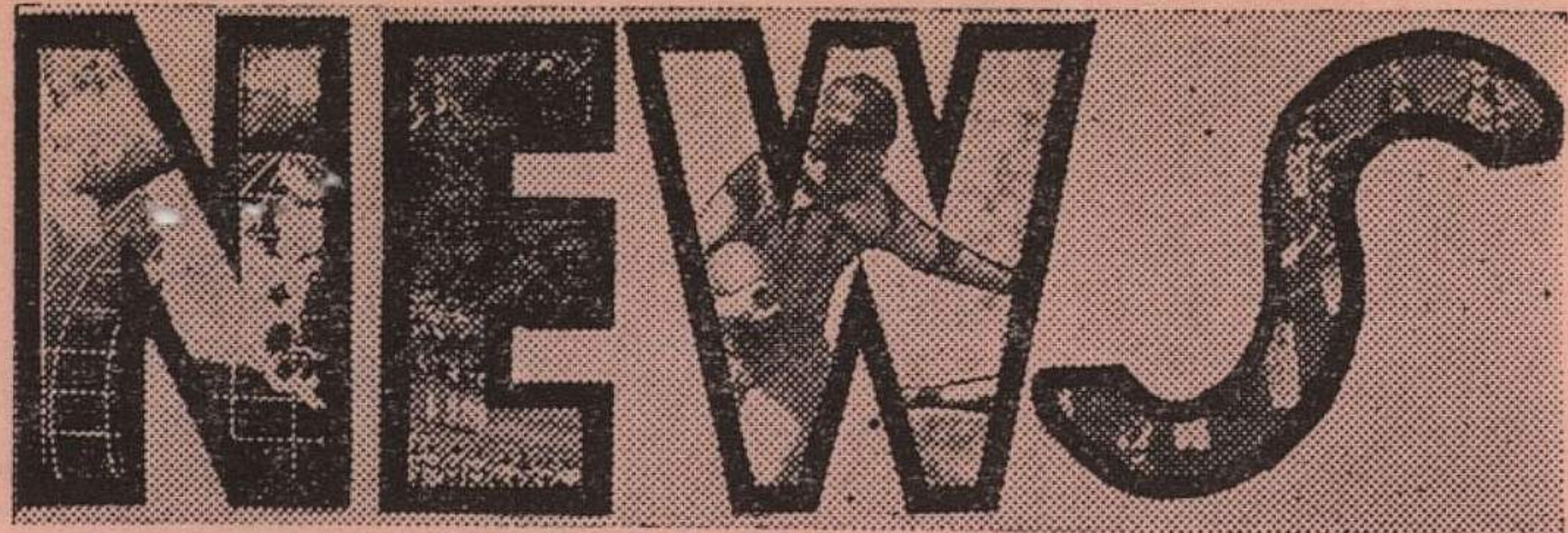

Dear K. G.:

This will acknowledge receipt of your good letter of the 18th instant stating that the president is out of town for ten days. I have written Bert McGrane, sports desk, Des Moines Register and Tribune, and to other sports writers, asking them what they thought about the possibility of promoting such a school, and they have all come back with notions of strong conviction that such a school would go over big.

My idea was to charge \$25.00 and to make the treatment of athletic injuries the major item. I have some swell newspaper notices regarding my work on the treatment of athletic injuries. I would have about 12 tables, a squad of four men at each table, with medical charts and other helpful adjuncts to aid in the teaching of anatomy and physiology. Then I would use all the cripples in the nearby area and all the injuries among the coaches as our clinic material.

This would be during the day. Then at night I thought we would run lectures on basketball for those who want it. Of course, that would also receive major attention, but I would justify the \$25.00 charge in the course for treatment of athletic injuries.

My idea was to limit the group to 100, take no more, and they would have to pay \$10.00 in advance matriculation to be considered a member.

Now you may think that is shooting high, but I have pretty definite knowledge that I can put this over, without any doubt. That is, if we have a man like K. G. Lind to put it on and a school that is up and coming like Wittenberg.

Each summer I have had men from California and the four different corners of the U. S., so I believe that if we advertise it properly that it will go over. The Des Moines Register and Tribune put on a school this December, and I was one of the lecturers on basketball. Here is part of what McGrane says:

"As to my own reaction to your proposed school, I think the idea is tops. It has been my observation that coaches attending our school 'go' for the discussions on training and injuries ahead of everything else. If you happened to be on hand at the time, perhaps you noticed the rush for front row seats the minute I announced Dr. Cramer's part on our program.

"We added Bill Frey, the Iowa trainer, to our program this year, entirely as the result of the unusual interest evidenced by our coaches in the training and injury angles. I am sure that at least two of our one-hour periods will be devoted to these subjects again next year. Most of the letters I have received since the school ended have had some comment to offer on these angles.

"I heartily agree with you that the high school coaches know less about the treatment of athletic injuries than they do of any sport they teach. . . . Again let me repeat that I like your idea. . . ."

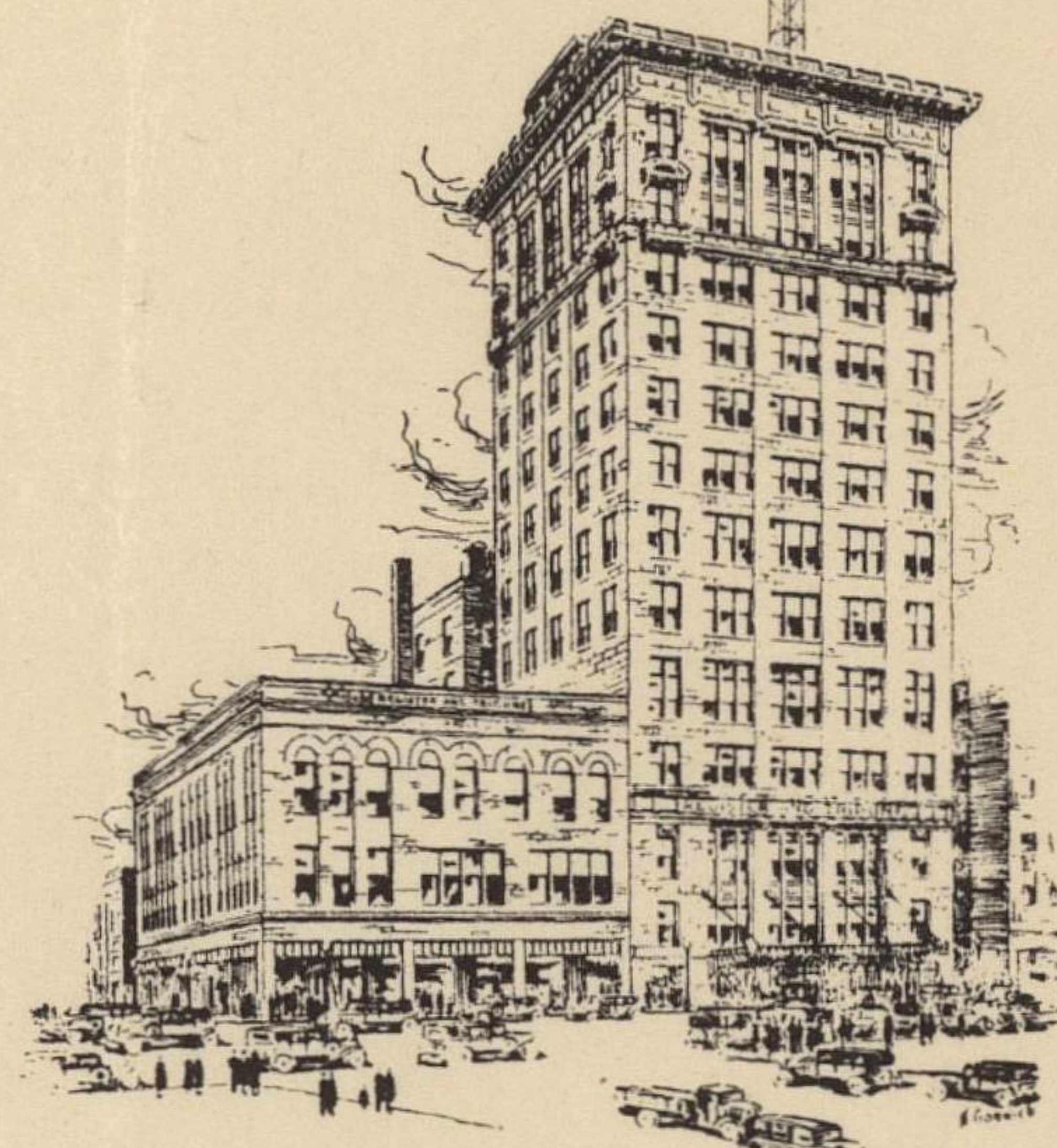

I heartily agree with you that the high school coaches know less about the treatment of athletic injuries than they do of any sport they teach. I feel certain that a school devoted strictly to basketball and athletic injuries would have a wide appeal. I think you are on the right track with your new idea. The only thing in the way of a handicap that I can think of is this: The summer months are the logical periods for coaching schools; a basketball school might carry a wider appeal if it could be staged immediately ahead of the playing season. However, your discussions of injuries and treatments should appeal to all coaches, including the group that handles football only as well as those who double up on football and basketball.

Again let me repeat that I like your idea. I wish you great success and will be happy to assist if it is at all possible. In the meantime, congratulations on the way you are bringing that young team of yours along. Personally, I'm not counting Kansas out of the Big Six race just yet. Regards.


My dear Doctor:

Dear Saundy:

I am sorry that I did not get an opportunity to visit with you longer when I was in Des Moines.

I had one thing to ask you, especially; that is, if you were interested in a trainer, a line coach for your football team, or a track coach. I do not know what sports you are coaching or whether you would be interested in obtaining any additional help.

We have a young man here named Elwyn Dees, whom I have trained, and I think he is one of the best trainers in the United States. Dees was the National Collegiate Champion Shot Putter, and he also played on the Big Six champion football team of 1930 for Kansas. He is looking for a job, although he will be here at the University if nothing better turns up. But as you know, I trained him, and unless a fellow gets out he never gets the salary he would if he got away from the parental roof. I am wondering if you know of any place that he might be interested in.

Another reason that I am writing you this letter is to send you a little booklet that our Mr. W. A. Dill, director of publicity at the University, got out. On pages 22 and 23 Morningside College box score appears. I thought it might be interesting to Coach Rogers and you to see this bulletin. You may keep it for any purpose you wish. Maybe your publicity man would be interested.

Another thing, Saundy - I am figuring on having a school some time this summer in which I will take a limited number of boys for a week or two weeks for a full course in treatment of athletic injuries. I would like to refer you to page 339 of my book, "Better Basketball", where I mention four men who have been trained by me and who are trainers now - James M. Cox, trainer for the Harvard Athletic teams, Roland Logan, trainer for the Boston Red Sox, and who on January first started as head trainer of the athletic teams at Pittsburg University, M. W. Kelley, trainer at the University of Texas, and Elwyn Dees, our present trainer. All of these men are graduates of the University of Kansas and were athletic trainers here before they went to their respective present positions.

I have not decided upon the fees yet, but I will have about 12 or 15 tables made and we will divide the group into squads of four, so that every man will have a fulsome course on the treatment of athletic injuries. I will also have a course in basketball, but that will be only for those who want basketball.

Some of the boys in your coaching school last year asked if I would put on a course of this kind. Understand that I do not want to tear any shingles from your roof, but I would very much like it if you do not object, if you will give me a list of the boys in your coaching school that might be interested in a school of this nature. I would like to write them if you will give me their addresses. Of course, I would not want to take any of your boys that might be repeating at your Lake Okoboji coaching school. But if you could give me a list of your Morningside graduates out in the field that you feel would be interested I would appreciate it very much.

I think I wrote you about this matter once before, but I am not dead certain. Will you kindly give me your reaction as to what you think regarding the possible success of such a venture?

It was good to see you, even if we did get licked by Drake, and by the way, we also took a licking Friday night from Okiahoma. It looks like we may win a few games this year, but they will be few and far between. We use no generalship nor strategy.

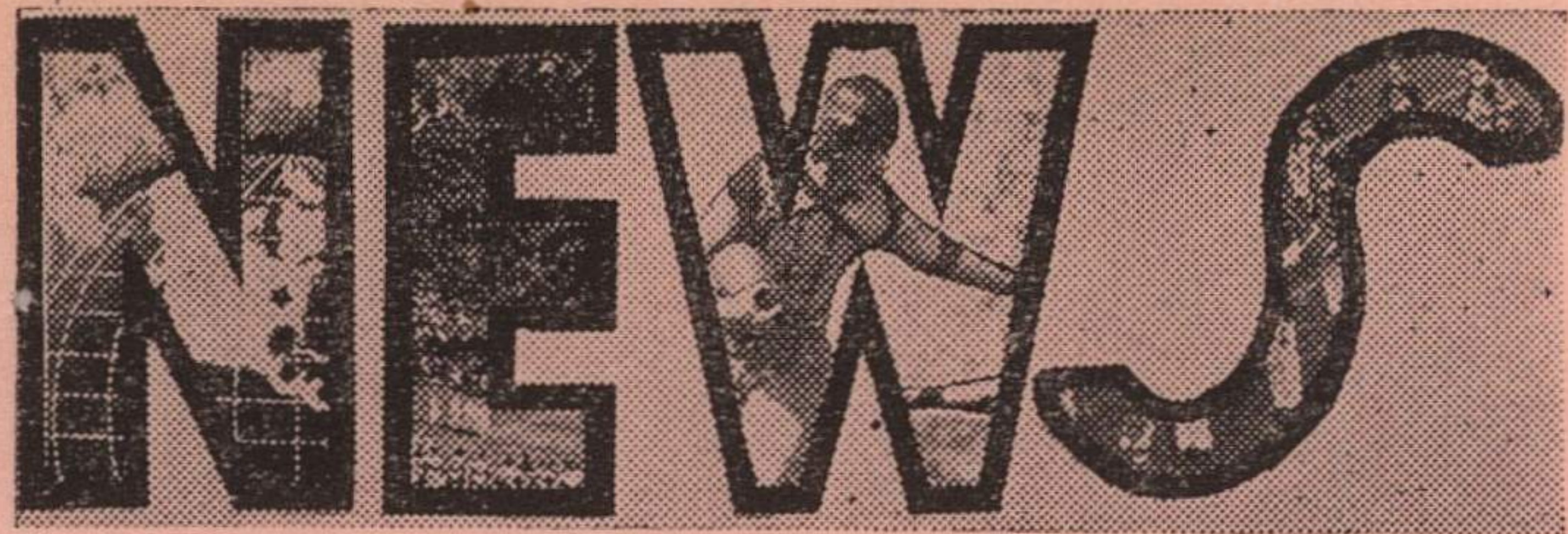

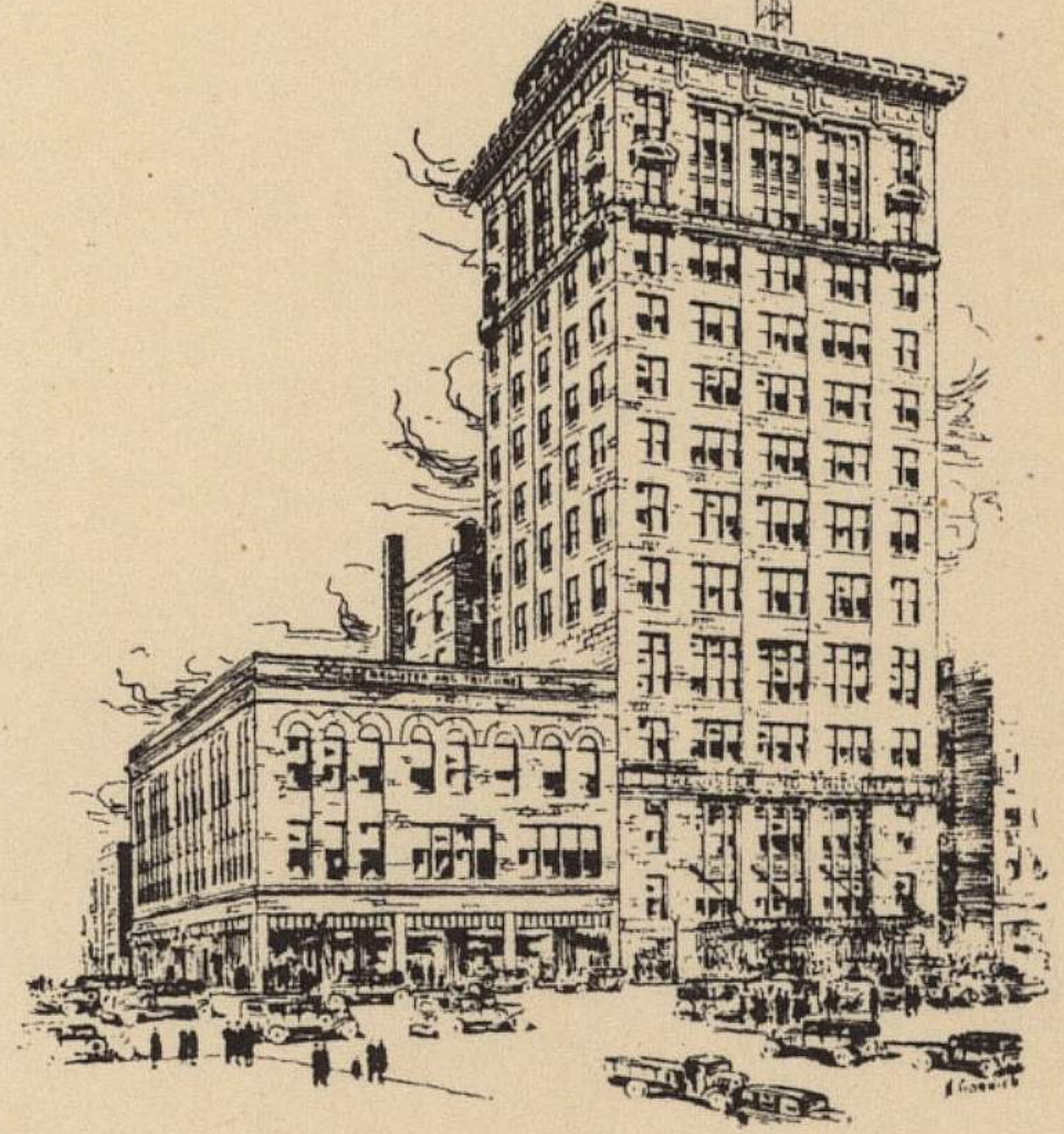
