

# Kansas Mentor Adds Color To Large Faculty

## Nation's Most Sought For Man Of Basketball Comes Here In July To Conduct Courses In Favorite Game

Dr. Forrest C. (Phog) Allen, head of the department of basketball at the University of Kansas and sometimes referred to as the king pin authority on the cage game, is to assist in conducting the second annual Texas Tech coaching school this summer, Coach Pete Cawthon of Tech announced yesterday.

Communication from Dr. Allen, in which he accepted the request to lecture on his favorite topic and teach classes in basketball, was received Sunday by Coach Cawthon.

The school is to be held July 18 to 29.

Allen's consent to come here cinches three faculty positions for the second Tech school. Heartly "Hunk" Anderson, who recently signed a contract as head coach at the University of Notre Dame, has been signed as chief lecturer on football. Clyde Littlefield, football and track coach at the University of Texas, will conduct the track department of the school.

### Warner May Come

Still another football coach, a disciple of the popular Warner or double wing back formation, will be procured to work as contemporary with Anderson. Anderson probably will be accompanied to Lubbock by Marchmont Schwartz, all-American back in 1931, Cawthon said. Glenn Scoby "Pop" Warner himself, of Stanford University, is being seriously considered as the other football teacher.

A coach of basketball for 25 years, Dr. Allen has won nationwide popularity as an exponent of the court game. His teams have been unusually successful, and it is said that here in one instance in which the coach lends the majority of color and winning ability. As a teacher of the game he is hardly excelled. He has capitalized on his ability to instruct by accepting coaching school jobs nearly every year and by writing articles for newspaper syndicates news services and magazines. He is probably the most sought for basketball man in the country.

The Associated Press at present is carrying the last of a long series of articles, an annual feature of the service, written by Dr. Allen.

An all-American guard with the Kansas City Athletic club in 1904 and 1905, the organization he joined after playing on the University of Kansas varsity, Allen was considered one of the best players of the game. He coached first at Baker University in Kansas, his teams defeating the University of Missouri, Kansas A. & M. and most of the other opponents. From Baker he went to the Haskell Indian Institute as head basketball coach, producing a team in his first year that won 24 out of 25 games on a 5,000 mile road trip.

Allen went to the University of

Kansas in 1908 and his first team won the Missouri Valley conference title. He became director of athletics at the Missouri State Teachers college, Warrnesburgh, and stayed there until 1919, then answered the call to come back to Kansas. He has been director of athletics and basketball coach at the Jayhawker institution since then.

In addition to his regular lectures and basketball courses, Dr. Allen will lecture on physical training and treatment of injuries for athletes, Cawthon announced. He will demonstrate the various styles of taping, manipulation of bones and muscles and care of injuries. He is in demand by major league baseball clubs each summer as trainer and medical adviser.
