Dear Dr. Allen;

I am rather late in getting this note to you but here it comes. At birth Cornelia Ann's head had a tendency to lean a little towards the left. The attending physician said that nature would take care of it all right. We kept careful check on it and it really did improve, photos etc. show that the condition was practically normal, when she had the misfortune to break her right arm. This happened about four years ago. If the left arm had been broken carrying it in a sling would have helped the original condition, but instead, the carrying of the right arm, had a tendency to make Cornelia Ann lean her head to the left and the pull aggravated the old condition. I think I told you that my opinion was that she carried her arm too long.

We feel certain that the trouble is in the Sterno-mastoid muscle. As you know this is a strap like muscle with two heads, one attached to the sternum and the other to the clavicle. The contraction seems to be concentrated in the strap from the sternum to the mastoid process.

We have been using resistive exercises and diathermy treatment under a man, who is good, here at the University.

Since you are not sure that you and Mrs. Allen will be able to visit us I am going to try and arrange to have Nina and Cornelia Ann stay in Atlanta with me during the entire session of the National meeting. By doing this we can see one another between sessions.

I certainly do appreciate your interest in Cornelia Ann and if you have any perscription other than what we have done and are doing we will be grateful to you for same.
