Dear John:

In Bob Busby's Sports Buzz in the Daily Journal World, as of Tuesday, March 11, he quotes you in part as follows: "Remember the time he (Allen) has his players change jerseys at the half in the Tournament game in Kansas City: I'll bet that was the first time in all the basketball experience of the Coach at Utah State that he has ever heard of anything like that."

Like most accurate sports writers' comments this statement was substantially correct. This story recalls to my mind an incident of a fellow who rather boastfully said, "I have a friend in Baltimore who made \$100,000 in six months manufacturing the new sanforized shirt." This fellow said to his friend, "Isn't that right, Bill?" "Well," he said, "It is substantially correct. Instead of Baltimore it was Kansas City, and instead of manufacturing shirts it was overalls, and instead of making \$100,000 he lost \$100,000."

Frankly, I believe that the coaches should share some of the odium of the inaccuracies that appear in the sports columns because the coaches hardly ever inform the sport writers of the correct version of the thing.

In order to cooperate with you John, old pal, I feel it my pleasant duty to inform you regarding the changing-shirt episode when we played Utah State. This is the first time that this story has been released from captivity, and as far as I know I have never seen the incident correctly described.

In 1936, our Big-Six schools, in their endeavor to help the Olympic Fund, each paid their own expenses to Kansas City for a basketball play-off tournament. The amount expended or contributed by each school toward the expense was \$200.00. Nebraska and Missouri of Big-Six schools, together with the Oklahoma Aggies, entered the Tournament. You will recall this incident. I was selected to manage the Tournament. Kansas won the play-off, defeating the Oklahoma Aggies in the Finel. We were then matched with Utah State to determine the team that would play in the Finals in New York.

It happened that I was in the identical position that I found myself in last year. I had a team in the Tournament and yet I was managing the affair. All the teams competing in the first and second Tournament were supposed to carry their traveling set of uniforms as well as their home team uniforms. Kansas and Utah State were supposed to play a series of games, the best two out of three to determine the winner.

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THE POST OF THE PERSON.

I asked Dick Romney if he had not brought his two sets of uniforms. He said that he had only brought one set, and that was the white uniform with a blue sash running through it. So he wore the white and we wore the red for the first two games. However, I was convinced, or at least I hada hunch that Dick Romney had another set of uniforms.

I might add that my own players came to me and said, "We have been wearing red all the time. Why can't we wear our white uniforms?" Old Convention Hall was not well lighted and the white suits showed up much better than the red. The players wearing the white uniforms were much easier to pick out than if they were any other color.

Noble and Ebling said, "We believe if we wear the white uniform we will go better." I said, "All right, I tell you what we will do. We will wear white and see if Utah State doesn't have another set of uniforms." We wore the white under our warm-ups and when the whistle blew for the start of the game we peeled off our warm-ups and we had white suite and they had white suits with the blue sash. Romney immediately sent back to the Kansas City Athletic Club for his traveling set of uniforms which were dark navy blue with the white sash. They called time-out and changed them.

Personally I feel that was a neutral court and Kansas owed no more courtesy to Utah State by wearing colored uniforms than Utah State owed a courtesy to Kansas of telling the truth and further, the added responsibility of the necessity of carrying two sets of uniforms. I have never felt like apologizing to anyone who prevarieates merely for their own advantage.

If you do not believe every word of this I would suggest that you just mail this epistle to Dick Romney and get his version of it.

I believe that our boys are as sporting as any outfit and my conviction is that our reputation is as good as the other fellows. With no desire to sweeten the pot, but with the pride that comes from receiving letters such as we have received from the manager of the Michigan Union, I am sending you a carbon copy of the letter that was written to Chancellor Deane W. Malott and to me from Mr. Stanley G. Waltz, Manager, Michigan Union. These letters are self-explanatory and I might add further that we had no knowledge whatsoever that such letters were being written.

We will feel confident in the fact that when good and bad sporting exhibitions are compared, that Kansas will not suffer unduly.

In our swimming pool ratings, samples which show a bacterial count of not over 200 bacteria per cubic centimeter are given a rating of excellent. The good rating is used for samples showing bacterial count of over 200. Samples showing the presence of coliform organisms are given ratings of fair and unsatisfactory. Usually samples showing a residual chlorine content of .6 parts per million, as these samples did, have a bacterial count of less than 200.

If you wish to have regular analyses made will you please come to the laboratory for sterilized bottles and we can make arrangements for additional analyses.

One part per million is equivalent to 1 pound of substance per million pounds of water. One gallon weighs 8.33 pounds. 17.1 parts per million=1 grain per gallon.
