My dear Mr. Fullem:

Under separate cover we are sending you a copy of the catalog of the University of Kansas.

In the General Information Section on page 23 you will find a statement of the fees. Nonresident students pay a matriculation fee of \$20, an incidental fee of \$37.50, a health fee of \$5, and purchase an activity ticket at \$6, making a total of \$68.50 for the first semester. The second semester fees include only the incidental fee of \$37.50, the health fee of \$5, and the activity ticket at \$2.75, making a total of \$45.25.

Certain laboratory courses, such as Elemental Animal Biology and Physical Education, all skill courses, have laboratory fees. The amount is stated in Section 2 of the catalog along with the description of the courses.

Living expenses vary with the individual. An estimate of the probable living expenses is given on pages 25 and 26 of the catalog. A list of approved rooming houses for men may be obtained by writing to Mr. Henry Werner, Men Students' Advisor, Room 1, Strong Hall.

On pages 78 and 80 you will find the detailed statement of the four-year curriculum in Physical Education. This course leads to the degree of B. S. in Education. You have completed the high school requirements necessary before beginning on this course.

On page 79 you will find a list of the courses in which you would enroll during each semester of the four years. You will note that in each semester there is opportunity to take several hours of elective courses, either to apply on your academic minor (a subject you can teach in high school in addition to Physical Education or coaching), or in any other field in which you may be interested. You will receive a thorough groundwork of skills in Physical Education, learning how to participate in all of the sports and games, as well as learning the techniques for coaching these sports or officiating in them. You will also get a background of biological science in order to understand the human machine with which you will deal as an athletic coach or teacher.

If you are interested in participating in football, basketball, baseball, swimming, or track, you can go out for a freshman numeral your first year and for a varsity letter after you have completed one year of freshman training. In order to participate in these sports, you must have completed twenty-seven hours during the preceding year.
