## Trojans Hold Coast Lead

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 20. (A)—Driving straight toward the Rose Bowl, the University of Southern California Trojans held the Pacific Coast football spotlight with a 32-0 victory Saturday over the California

Bears at Berkeley.

Functioning smoothly behind their T-formation plays, the Trojans snagged a touchdown in the first five minutes. It was the start of a near-rout. The Trojans scored again in the initial period, and hung on a third in the second quarter to lead 20-0 at the half. California barely held its own against second and third string players in the latter phases of the game.

The 2nd Air Force Super Bombers rolled up a 47-6 victory over the University of Washington Huskies at Spokane, Wash. Halfback Ray Evans and Fullback Bill Prentice scored three touchdowns apiece. The lone Washington tally came unexpectedly in the final period, on a 61 yard run by End
