years at Columbia showed totals of 174 and 169.

I mention these particular years to show you that the precedent for disregarding conference rules concerning complimentary tickets has not been just recently established.

I believe, you know enough about our University procedure, George, to assure Dr. Allen that before a check is written for a guarantee or an option our auditing department has full knowledge as to the accurace of the accompanying statement.

I wonder if the Kansas auditorium has shrunk? If the capacity is now 2933 how did they crowd 4095 persons in there in 1930, 3255 in 1931, and 3339 in 1932? Dr. Allen was quoted in last night's Kansas City Star as saying that they could take care of a maximum crowd of 4700. Which is considerably in excess of the figure he gave you.
