

SQUADS ARE NAMED FOR ALL-STAR GRID TILT

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Meagher and Dodd to Coach Football Teams

The Georgia Coaches' Association has shaped up its second annual clinic and built it around an all-star player list and an all-star coaching cast.

Players have been selected and coaches have been chosen and have accepted.

The cast is announced in the May issue of the Southern Coach and Athlete, official publication of the association, and includes not only two squads of senior football players, but a brace of basketball teams. The clinic thus is stepping out into a field that is bound to attract a multitude of coaches who were not interested in the football goings-on featured in the inaugural clinic at Georgia Tech last August.



a highly geared outfit headed by the fleet Brooken Blanton, the Valdosta lad who has been flying around to look over campuses. Paul Brodie, the Waycross ball-lugger, who perhaps is as good or better than Blanton, is another south Georgia mainstay.

THE ALL-STAR basketball game will be a new attraction. Members of the coaches' association say that it is the only one they have seen scheduled by a coaching clinic.

Smaller cities contributed a majority of the cage stars, only two coming from Atlanta. Jack Davis, the Russian ace, will head the northern squad and W. J. Griffith, of Eatonton, is the outstanding members of the southerners.
