

Spinner layout, ROBERT MORGAN, has got Miss Suggs admirably grounded in a sound golfing method, a swing on the flat side, and a thoroughly business-like way of getting hold of the ball and dispatching it toward an objective. And what a putter! She knocked around that pleasant little course (some of the holes are not so little, at that) in 39-39—78, picking off three 3's on the second nine, one of them at the dogleg fourth, which is a par 4 of 295 yards, if you play it as laid out, around an angle of woods to the right.

NOW, you can cut off some of this yardage by hitting a bold, towering and elongated drive over the angle of forest, but you may take it from me, this requires a lot of wallop, especially for a lady golfer. But Miss Suggs (weight, 100 pounds, remember) socked her drive to a position within two yards of the left-front corner of that green; chipped boldly six feet past the flag, and canned the putt with a precision
