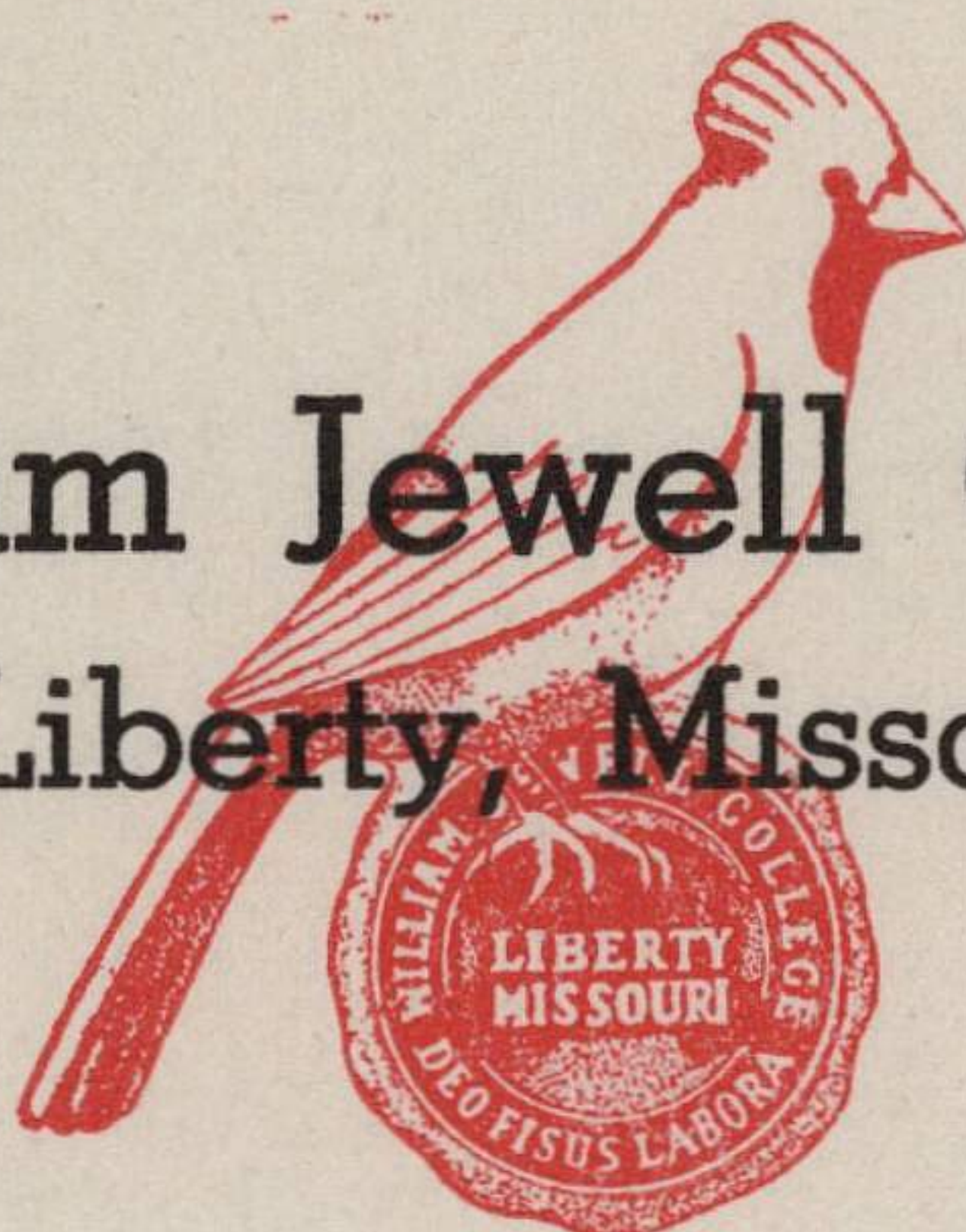

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I learn you are to be the speaker at our "Kick Off" dinner. It is kind of you to come and I want to express my personal appreciation.

Mr. Kenagy, with whom you communicated over the phone, president of our student body, asked me to write you relative the nature and purpose of the dinner so that you could better select the nature of your talk.

As far as we are concerned and I think generally speaking this kind of an affair at this time of the season is an innovation. The purpose of the dinner, as you might surmise, is to produce a genuine college spirit on the campus. 

Please pass my best wishes on to all and especially Mrs. Webster, and let her know I'm in a better mood and disposition than when she last saw me.

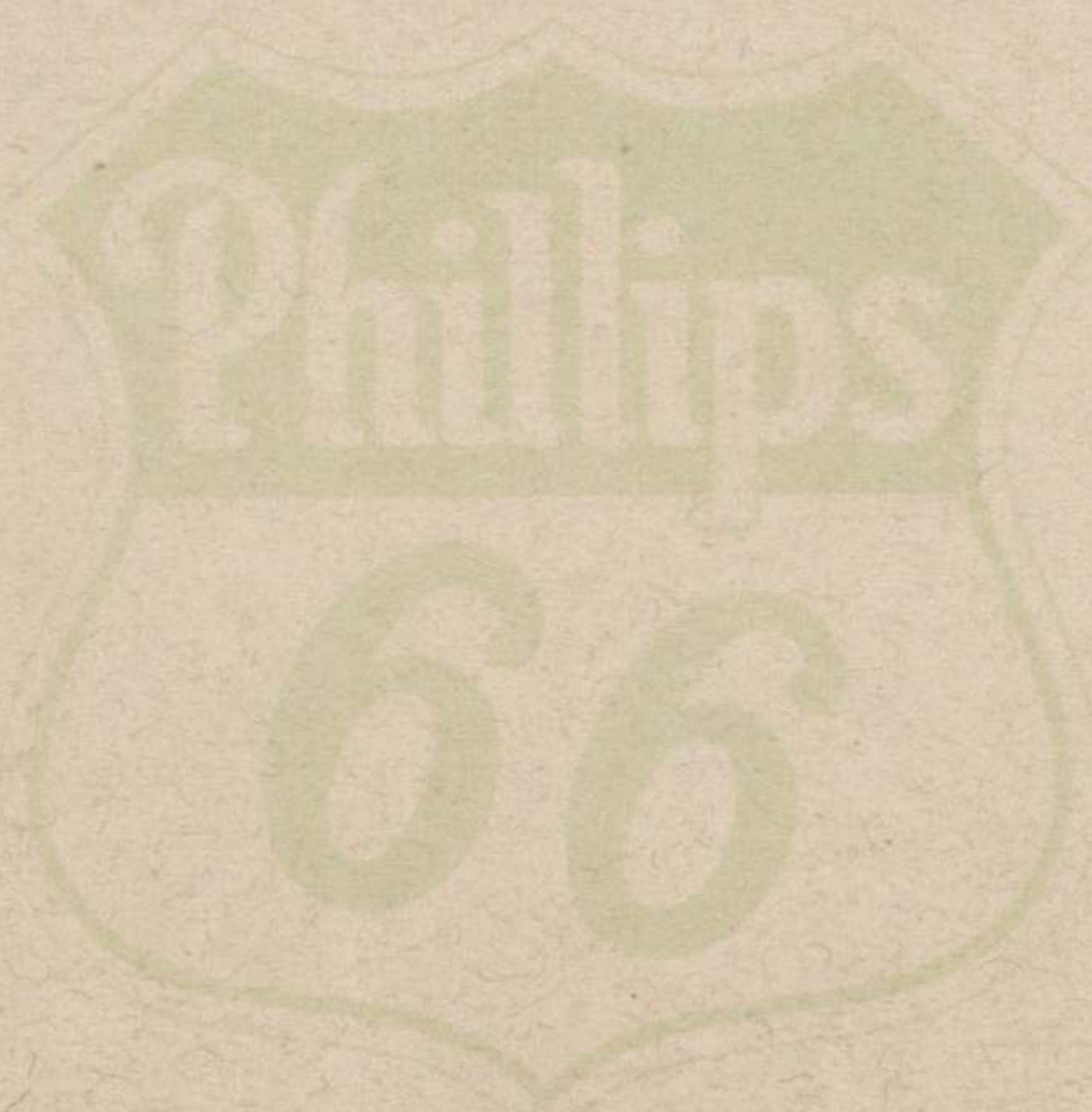

Was certainly glad to receive your letter upon my return from Toronto, Canada, where I attended a four day session of the National Ice Association Convention.

I have just placed several "feeler" letters in the mail relative to your current officiating problem. Incidentally, be sure the playing floor in Chicago is satisfactory as most De Paul teams are always hard to beat in an intersectional game because of officials and general playing conditions. Will write you immediately upon hearing from several of my Chicago friends.

While passing through the Windy City I took time out to call Jane. She had just gotten home from the office, but was kind enough to ask me out for one of her own meals. This naturally pleased me greatly, but since my train was to leave in about thirty minutes I had to take a rain check.
