My door Mr. Cardner:

I admoviedge with thanks your nice letter of October 15. Howover, I have wondered why you wrote me, but I presume you thought that I was still Eirector of Athletics. This is not the case. Hr. Owinn Henry, the old College of Emporia coach and later coach at the University of Hissouri, is now and has been for the past two years Director of Athletics at the University of Kansas.

I assure you that I am fully accepting your statement that your letter conveys friendly criticism, and I will treat it in that light.

My title here at the University is Director of Physical Education, which has to do with administration of this department in the School of Education. We give a bachelor's degree in Education with a major in Physical Education. In addition to my administrative and teaching work in this department, I have to do with only one competitive sport and that is backetball.

I was coach of baskethall here at the University in 1908 and 1909 and we wen twodismpionships in the old Missouri Valley Conference. I then returned to the University of Mansas in 1919 as Manager of Athletics. I was not to coach any sport, but in 1920 I started coaching the baskethall team and have done so ever since. In the fall of 1920 I also was head coach of varsity football here. The Mansas team that year was the lightest ever in the history of the University. The team averaged 162 pounds and we had two of Gwinn Henry's boys from the College of Maporia on that team - Kenny Welch who weighed 133 and Marley Little who weighed 150. John Bunn, now coach at Stanford, was one of the quarterbacks on that team, and Dutch Lonborg who is now basketball coach at Morthwestern, was the other quarterback. We had only one man on the team who weighed better than 190 pounds.

I merely mention this to give you a kaleidoscopic view of my interest and experience in the different sports. I have coached at Baker University, at Haskell Indian Institute, and for seven years I was director of athletics and coach of all sports at Central Hissouri State Teachers College, Warrensburg, Missouri.

I am only sorry that I did not get your letter a month carlier because had I received it then I would have stopped in to have a chat with you when I went through your town on Saturday, October lst, on my way to McPherson. I went there to attend an executive council meeting of the Mankas Health and Physical Education Association which was held at the Hotel McCourt on that day. This also happened to be the day that we played Notre Dame at South Bend. I was in an executive meeting most of the morning and part of the afternoon and got away from the hotel and started back to Lawrence from McPherson to hear only the last quarter of the game. I agree with you that it sounded somewhat like a slaughter.

I am sure that if you and I could sit down together across your desk you would say that I would not be alibi-ing for anybody nor would I be pulling chestmuts out of the fire for anyone. I would talk to you just as if you would want to hear a statement from someone who has no desire to embarrass anyone or have any desire to alibi for anyone unduly. Now, this is what I would tell you first. I would tell you that I have coached small colleges and I have coached in the University, and this is my conception of the small college because I know their mental attitude. They never want to play a university except at a time when they feel like they have their strongest team and parhaps have a chance to beat, or at least make a fine showing against the university. This is perfectly natural.

There should be a rule prohibiting small colleges from playing universities. The university, unless it is through an act of kind-ness, has no desire to play a small college.

I remember in 1912 when I was coaching the Teachers College at Warrensburg that W. O. Hamilton, then Manager of Athletics at Kansas, called me over the phone and asked me if we cared to play Ransas in football. It happened that William Jewell College of Liberty had scheduled a game, and then finding their team weaker than they hoped to have, they cancelled the game less than one week before the time that it was to have been played.

Now, you can imagine what would happen if a university would cancel a game with a smill college. You would never hear the last of it, especially from the patrons of the small college.

But what did the University of Kansas do? They accepted it in good grace and said nothing. That is all they could do. When he (" asked me if we desired to play at Lawrence I said, "Yes, indeed." Kansas had just defeated St. Mary's College, which team was coached by E. C. Quigley, 64 to nothing on the preceding Saturday. You can see why no small college team was eager to play the Jayhawkers who had beaten the St. Mary's fighting Irish — and I might say that when Mr. Quigley coached St. Mary's they were "Fighting Irish".

So in response to Mr. Hamilton's call I said, "Yes, indeed, we would like to play you. We consider it an honor." He said, "How much money do you want?" I said, "Just what we are worth - what-ever you want to give us. We are glad to come."

How, this is no build-up on my part. I, having attended the University of Hansas and having played on her teams, felt that it was a great honor to bring a team back to play Hansas. I had no antagonism against the University. I leved her. Would it be fair to say that the majority of small college people not only dislike, but utterly detest some angle of university behavior? Many people think that the university people are highlat. They are not. I have coached boys in the Indian school, in demoninational colleges, in some state institutions, and the university, and the finest, cleanest group that I know of are in the University and on her teams.

Now, do not misunderstand me. There is a lumitic fringe of about 15% in the University, and of course the University having a greater number enrolled, is bound to have a greater number incorporated in that lumatic fringe. Children of wealthy parents come here for the social splurge, for a dip into politics, or high life which is found in every college. The University is the pinnacle of education in the state and it is simply a cross-section of the children from Dodge City, Pittsburg, Kansas City, Marion, Frontenac (where it is alleged the finest deep-shaft whiskey is made in Kansas). El Dorado, Hutchinson, Wichita, and so forth. So you see what we have here at the University is a mixture of the good, the better and the best, the mine run, the culls, and some offeasts of society of Kansas.

The game with St. Benedict's was played four years ago while I was Mirector of Athletics. The gune with Washburn was played this year under Mr. Henry's directorship. I believe if you will be extremely fair with yourself you will not blame the University boys alone for their conduct in either one of these gres. Someone has said there are three sides to every question - your side, my side and the right side. Personally, I hold the coach of every teem responsible who permits any boy on oither side to slug without irmediately taking him from the line up, and then to remove everyone of those men who slugged, and not wait for the official to do it. People are sick of such nauseating exhibitions like slugging in any ball game. We have been led to believe that boys should hold their temper, should say "no" to their emotions even if they are burning up inside. That is the scheme of teaching education through play. No boy can play a good game while he wants to injure his opponent. It was Lord Relfour who said that "every man should be a laughing tiger", but this tiger should know when to spring and upon whom to pounce. It is not always a physical attack that has the most potumoye

Now, I want to add a brief for our Kansas boys. I have been coaching here for a number of years and with only one or two exceptions have I seen a man on any team of all the sports show the

attitude of a knocker, and that fellow failed to have the respect of his own teamsates. He did not last long in the University. His fellows estracized him.

I am glad that you state that you like the University of Kansas. Of course, Harold Hauser, who was captain of our football teem here one year, is a Marion boy. I am sure you have had some friendly discussions with him.

and too, I know of your sincere good wishes for Coson Bill Hargiss. I remember when he coeched your larion, Hanses, High School. I played against Bill in 1905 and 1906 when I was on the Konoas teem and Mill was at Importa. Later my Warrensburg teem for years played his Imporia Teachers College beam. I remember when Hill came to the University of Homeas as assistant ecach in 1912. Hourt year he want back to ecach at the College of Importa, and then I had much contact with him. We not in all oports and we had some tough battless. Then when he went to Oregon State Agricultural College as athletic director he wrote me end stated that he would like to give up the directorship, but would like to coach football and truck and would like for no to accept the directorship and coach bashetball. That was in 1918. In 1919 I came to the University of Hansas as Hanager of Athletics. In 1920 I was made Elrector of Athleties and conohed the football team. Conch Hargies had returned from the coast and was athletic director and head football coach at Importa, and he and I not on Hocook field as rival directors and oceohes in 1930 when we played his teems

In 1928 he called no up and applied for the position as head coach of football here at Kansas. He was elected and he coached during the years 1928, '29, '30, '31. I am sending you his record so that you will see that in the four years he coached he had a wiming percentage of 548. This applies to all games played in and out of the Big Six conference. Doubtless you will not remember, but in 1928 Kansas was a member of the old Missouri Valley Conference, and in 1929 a formation of the Big Six was instituted. This, of course, has nothing to do with the percentage, but it does have something to do with the conference members played.

Also, I might add that Coach Hargiss is this year the chief hedd scout. He has scouted all of Hansas' opponents, and for the past several years Coach Hargiss has been coaching the ends of the varsity and scouting all of the major games for Coach Lindsey.

I assure you, Mr. Gardner, that I have not been offended in the least by your remarks, and I know that you have written as a friend of the University and as a lover of good clean sportsmanship. I trust that these remarks of mine will give you certain information some of which you doubtless have not had heretofore.

If you ever come to Lawrence it would be a pleasure if you would stop in the office and be my guest at any game you wish to see.

Please let me know ahead of time when you are coming. And if I again go through Marion I will callet your office so that we may have a better acquaintance and finer friendship.
