I have no desire to have anything to do with that because so far as I am concerned I do not expect to have anything to do with the training of the football team. As far as basketball is concerned, I would be very happy with any of the boys that work with me because I can soon show them all that it is necessary to know regarding the successful training of our varsity basketball team.

I would suggest that you take the matter up with Mr. Gwinn Henry, Director of Athletics, and with Ad. Lindsey.

Coach John F. Carmody, of Haskell, was in my coaching school here last week and he told me that he was seriously considering you as the trainer at Haskell. This is no news to you, is it, Wade?

There is one thing that I hesitate to mention to you, Wade, because it is none of my affair and I should not even be concerned about it. While playing golf with Elwyn Dees last week he told me that he had loaned you the money for you to pay your initiation fee into the fraternity and that you had never seen him or said anything to him about it. Of course, I know that you expect to pay him, but I think Elwyn feels a little uncertain about your appreciation. And I do not want you to make the mistake of losing fast friends due to your negligence.

Certainly from the standpoint of courtesy you should take care of this matter; at least you should write him a letter and put yourself on record. As it is now I am afraid you stand in rather an unfavorable light.
