Dear Mr. Green:

You doubtless have read that Mr. Gwinn Henry is my successor as Director of Athletics at the University of Kansas. I have nothing to do with the distribution of tickets or the administrative end of the athletic department.

I have turned your letter over to Mr. Earl Falkenstien, our financial secretary, the man in charge of the ticket sales, and doubtless you will hear from him at once. I am quite sure that since it is against the Athletic Association policy to mail tickets out on credit that he will write you to the effect that he has placed four tickets in your name at the ticket office at the front entrance to the stadium, and you can get them any time from 12 o'clock on. Should you come in Thanksgiving morning you could drive up to the gymnasium where the tickets office is located and get them here any time up to 11:30, at which time they will be sent to the stadium for handling there.

You will not have the slightest difficulty in getting your tickets under this arrangement. The tickets are \$2.00 each, plus 20% government tax and 4% state tax, making a total of \$2.24 for each ticket, or \$8.96 for the four.

Yes, I remember you very well, Mr. Green, and your sons, and I am sorry that it is so late that you would not have time to mail your check and have Mr. Falkenstien return the four tickets to you special delivery so you would not be inconvenienced standing around a booth. However, on Thanksgiving Day Mr. Falkenstien has made ample provision to handle a great crowd. At the north entrance of the stadium there is a stockade, or rather a blockhouse, in which there are 13 windows, and each window is fed by a central chief clerk who feeds out the tickets to you should you call at any one of the 13 windows. I trust that you and your family will enjoy the game.
