RADIKO (Ra-di-ko)

This dance takes its name from an island characterized by a huge rock behind which the people of the island are supposed to hide the "old maids" when young boys arrive in their midst.

Radiko is danced vigorously and with humor.

A circle of any number of couples in social dancing position, joired hand extended in counterclockwise directions.
