





Dear Doc:

Right about now I imagenthe K.U. Campus in humming with activities of another school year. With startling realization & find it is seven years ago that I started my last year at K.U., but as in all good memories it doesn't seem that long.

at the present time I am in Juneer, Korea, 20 miles from the capital Deijo. We were among the first to move in here with accupation forces & supplies, of it has been quite an experience, the without excitement. We are at latitude 37/2 north, just 30 miles from 38° north, the boundary lun between U.S. & Russian occupation of Korea. Our convoy sailed up here from Okinawa, ready for anything & hoping the Japa had revealed all the summe fields. Outside of a little rough weather the trip was perfect & cooperation of the Japa war to the letter. The rough weather didn't appeal to the army, however, & many of the soldiers we were taking along had their heads over the rail most of the trip. We anchored offshore Junsen for a couple days then finally pulled into a tidal basin to unload. The tider here are the most extreme I've seen, being 25 to 30 feet from high to low water. Thur the tidal basin served us well, as they lock the gater to the lasin at high tide keeping enough water in the basin to keep the ships unside afterest. I can't tell the difference between a Korean & a Jof, but they all seem

guete friendly and interested in all we do. In Jussen of 'we seen some beautiful Japanese temples — we had to take our shoer off to enter, which is a good way to keep floors clean of immorked! There are quite a few modern buildings of houses and a cleaner town than I that it would be, this some sections are foul. The accupation is working smoothly, for which I'm thankful, and maybe it won't be long until a good part of the Navy can head lock for the States. The redeeming feature here is the climate, just like Calif-, a big difference from the hot, sticky. South Pacific.

It's been a long time since I've received a 'Jayhande Relounde so I'm rather out of touch with Hings around Faurence. I haven't had the good fortune of running on to any of my fellow "K- Clubberr" out here, the I've met a lot of K.U. men, & the conversation has been very easy once we've met. I understand Paul Masoner was around the Philippiner about the lime I was last June, but no luch ur seeing him. Keft hoping I'd run uits Don Ebling. Englemon, & some of the others in the Mary. Knute Kresie was just coming back to the States as I was pulling out. I tell you it h going to be a threll to come lack to K.U. with a good chance of seeing Bob allen, Corlin, Dich Harf, Gralle, Voran, Dolay, Schmidt, miller, Kline, Kappleman, Sands, Engleman, Ebling, + all the rest of the gang that were at K.U. in '38 + '39. Not all at once, of course, but I'll see them.

Sometimes out here we can get short wave with sports news & sometimes not. I'm still waiting to hear how K. U. & Jekar Christian came out. I hope some of the boys that had to leave school in 1942 & 43 will be coming back soon & furish their interrupted playing career, particularly in basketball. I remember a February day in 1944 when Dave thirk and I visited you in your office, + it was just after a tough loss to Oklahoma. We expressed the hope that K. U. again would be dominating the Big Dix un basketball as soon as our boys could return. You said, "We will," and I know damn well it took a war to knoch in off that top spot.

Some of the boys wor't be coming lack such at T.P. Hunter, and wayne nees. Your tribute to them in the Bebounder put into evorde how we all feel. We're proud of them, proud they were K. U. men & sportsmen.

I ve written quite a long letter without saying much & guess, but that I'd let you know there's some rabid Ransas rooting going on half way around the world. I hope to be back around the first of the year, I one of the first things I want to do is treat myself to a visit with you, and I hope to a few basketball games. Thanh God this terrible war is over and we can come lack home again.
