Allen, last fall cried out against gambling dangers in the Madison Square Garden area, but his statements were denied at the time.

"College officials have efailed utterly to protect college athletics from the stigma of professional gambling," Allen declared. "Intelligent people all along have known that big time gamblers were getting to college basketball players in the East. Instead of facing the facts and acting, our college officials have been denying these conditions existed to save face."

Allen has been asking that college presidents appoint a czar over their events.

My belief is that Dr. Forrest S. Allen should be put in charge of all college athletics in the United States and as quick as possible.
