COLLEGIATE BASKETBALL RECORDPART II

Upon the following pages of this booklet, Helms Athletic Foundation has recorded its Collegiate Basketball selections. Included are annual collegiate basketball National Championship selections, for the years 1920 to 1942, inclusive; annual All-America Collegiate Basketball Team selections, for the years 1920 to 1942, inclusive; All-Time All-America Collegiate Basketball Team selections; selection of the greatest collegiate basketball coaches of all time; annual Collegiate Basketball Player of the Year selections; Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame selections, and other collegiate basketball selections and facts.

The Helms Athletic Foundation selections, in every instance, have been based upon actual performances by players and teams, and not upon reputation. Selections have been made only after many months of exacting research, and careful study of the performances of thousands of players and hundreds of teams.

It is true that the names of many brilliant players have been omitted from the Helms Athletic Foundation selections. However, in limiting the All-America Team selections to ten players each year, the situation is only natural. In naming teams for National Championship honors each year, the records of the foremost teams were carefully analyzed before a decision was reached. In a number of cases, it was an exceedingly difficult matter to finally pick the National Championship team.

In naming the "greatest coaches," Helms Athletic Foundation was guided, to a great extent, by the recommendations of collegiate basketball coaches and authorities -- to whom questionnaires were sent in 1942. However, decisions were not reached until after the coaching records of coaches had been compiled by the Foundation, and until after such compilations had been carefully studied.

Helms Athletic Foundation is grateful to those coaches, sports writers, college news bureau directors, and authorities who provided facts, information and recommendations, in relation to the collegiate basketball research which has been conducted by the Foundation for the past six months.

Oddly enough, this collegiate basketball record -- the first compiled and issued by Helms Athletic Foundation -- has been titled "Part II." This may be explained as follows. It was planned by Helms Athletic Foundation to prepare and issue a collegiate basketball record for the period 1900 to 1942, inclusive. The task was such a great one, due to the incompleteness of recorded collegiate basketball achievements, particularly in the early years of the Game, that it was decided to first prepare and issue a collegiate basketball record for the period 1920 to 1942, inclusive -- titling it "Part II," and, at a later date, prepare and issue "Part I" -- covering the period to 1919, inclusive.

The expense for research and the preparation of this Collegiate Basketball record has been defrayed by Paul H. Helms, of Los Angeles, who is the Founder and Sponsor of Helms Athletic Foundation.

The Helms Athletic Foundation All-Time All-America Basketball Team selections have been made, following a most complete study of the performances of America's foremost collegiate players of the past forty years, and following a careful check of the All-Time Team recommendations which have been made by many of America's Basketball authorities. It is believed that the Helms Athletic Foundation selections make up the truly representative All-Time All-America Basketball Team.

ALL-TIME ALL-AMERICA PLAYERS

*FORWARD. . VICTOR A HANSON. . . SYRACUSE. . 1925, 1926, 1927

Exceptional floor man, splendid shot. Chosen on the Helms All-America teams of 1925, '26, '27. Scored 203 points in 1925, 282 in 1926, (Syracuse record) and 277 in 1927. Hanson captained the Syracuse National Championship team of 1926. Syracuse defeated Penn 30 to 25 in '26. Hanson tallied 26 of Syracuse's points. Hanson was a marked-man in every game, but the best guards in the nation couldn't stop him. Hanson has been named for all-time honors by many leading Basketball authorities. Chosen Player of Year in 1927.

Was also a brilliant football and baseball player. Starred in these sports at Syracuse, in addition to basketball. Captained all three sports. Was an All-America end in football. Received a tryout with the New York Yankees, in baseball. Hanson later coached football at Syracuse.

*FORWARD. . JOHN ASHWORTH THOMPSON. . . MONTANA STATE. . 1927, 1928, 1929, 1930

Outstanding shot. Clever floor man. Chosen on the Helms All-America teams of 1927, 1928, 1929, 1930. Only player since 1920 to be given four-year All-America recognition by Helms Athletic Foundation. First gained honors as freshman, on varsity team. Led Rocky Mountain Conference in scoring in 1927, '28, and '29. Captain of Montana State team in 1930. Greatest year was in 1929, when he averaged 16 points in 37 game schedule. Team won National Championship, winning 35 of 37 games played, and scoring 2,236 points to opponents' 1,204. This team is often referred to as "Wonder Team."

Thompson has been named for all-time honors by most leading Basketball authorities. Chosen Player of Year by Helms Athletic Foundation in 1929.

*FORWARD. . CHARLES HYATT. . . PITTSBURGH. . 1928, 1929, 1930

Exceptional ball handler, outstanding floor man, splendid shot. Chosen on the Helms All-America teams of 1928, 1929, and 1930. Member of two National Championship teams at Pittsburgh, in 1928 and 1930. 1928 team was undefeated in 21 games; 1930 squad won 23 and lost 2. Pittsburgh teams lost but 7 games in 3 years Hyatt performed for Panthers. Chosen Player of Year in 1930.

Hyatt has been ranked for all-time honors by almost every outstanding Basketball authority. Many claim him to be the greatest player of all-time.

Following his collegiate career at Pittsburgh, Hyatt played many years of amateur basketball, being many times named for All-America honors, and is still active in the game as amateur basketball coach.

*FORWARD. . ANGELO LUISETTI. . . STANFORD. . 1936, 1937, 1938

Brilliant all-around player. Chosen on the Helms All-America teams of 1936, 1937, and 1938. Ranked by Helms Athletic Foundation as the greatest player of all time. Led the Pacific Coast Conference in scoring in 1936, '37, and '38. His 208 points in 12 games set a Pacific Coast Conference record in '37. He broke the mark the following year, with 232. In four years of play at Stanford, Luisetti chalked up a total of 1,596 points against the greatest teams in the nation. Hank scored 416 points in 29 games in 1936, 410 in 27 contests in 1937, and 465 in 22 games in 1938. He accounted for the greatest achievement in collegiate basketball history on January 1, 1938, at Cleveland, Ohio, when he registered 50 points in a game against Duquesne, which Stanford won 92 to 27. Luisetti made 23 field goals and 4 foul shots. He scored 30 points against Southern California, in a Pacific Coast Conference game in 1936.

Luisetti is ranked by all leading Basketball authorities as an all-time player. He is regarded by many as the greatest player of all time. Chosen Player of the Year in 1937, and 1938 by Helms Athletic Foundation.

*CENTER. . JOHN SCHOMER. . . CHICAGO. . 1906, 1907, 1908, 1909

Remarkable ball handler and floor man. Splendid shot. Chosen on the Helms All-America teams of 1906, 1907, 1908, and 1909. The first player to be given four-year All-America recognition by Helms Athletic Foundation. Led the Western Conference in scoring in 1907, 1908, and 1909, being the only player to ever lead Western Conference scorers on three occasions.

Ranked by many Basketball authorities, including Ralph Morgan, as one of the very greatest of all collegiate players. Was a member of the University of Chicago teams which were chosen National Champions for the 1908, 1909 seasons by Helms Athletic Foundation.

Has served as Mid-West Basketball official for many years, being one of the most capable in the game.

*CENTER. . GEORGE GLAMACK. . . NORTH CAROLINA, 1940, 1941, 1942

One of greatest shots of all time. Exceptional ball handler. Chosen on Helms All-America teams of 1940, 1941. An amazing player. Stood 6 feet, 5 inches in height. Was ambidextrous, and so nearsighted that the ball was merely a dim object. Shot by instinct. Scored 458 of North Carolina's 1,210 points in 1940. In three nights of Southern Conference Tournament play in 1940, registered a total of 62 points. Scored a total of 306 points in Southern Conference play in 1941, averaging 20.4 points per game. Scored 45 points in a game against Clemson in 1941. Glamack made the remarkable total of 578 points in 28 games played by North Carolina in 1941, the greatest number ever made by a player.

Glamack was awarded the all-time center post over Charles "Stretch" Murphy, of Purdue's teams of 1928, 1929, and 1930, who was given worthy consideration.

*GUARD. . EARLAN ORVILLE PAGE. . . CHICAGO, 1908, 1909, 1910

Played in days when guards had to be rugged. . . and he was. An exceptional defensive player who was never outsmarted. Chosen on the Helms All-America teams of 1908, 1909, and 1910. Member of University of Chicago teams of 1908, and 1909, which were chosen for National Championship honors by Helms Athletic Foundation. Brilliant guarding limited Pennsylvania to 33 points in two-game National Championship series in 1908. With Page leading defense, Chicago held opponents to 122 points in 12 Conference games in 1909, and to 156 points in 12 Conference games in 1910.

Ranked by many Basketball authorities, including Ralph Morgan, as one of the very greatest guards of all time.

Took up coaching after leaving college, having a lengthy and successful career.

*GUARD. . EDWARD MC NICHOL. . . PENNSYLVANIA. . 1915, 1916, 1917

A brilliant defensive man, and an excellent shot. Exceptional foul shot. Scored 103 points in 10 games in 1915, and 118 points in 1916 -- 86 of which were foul goals. Against Yale in 1916, made 12 fouls in 12 tries. Chosen on the Helms All-America teams of 1915, 1916, and 1917. With McNichol leading the defense, Pennsylvania held Eastern Intercollegiate League opponents to 170 points in 10 games in 1916. Three times during the season of 1916, Penn adversaries were held to 9 points.

Ralph Morgan, eminent Basketball authority, regards Edward McNichol the greatest guard the East ever produced. Many other authorities are of the same opinion. After graduating from Penn, McNichol returned to his Alma Mater as coach, experiencing many successful years. He coached Pennsylvania to a National Championship in 1921.

Note: George Glamack, North Carolina Center, was chosen Player of the Year in 1940, and 1941 by Helms Athletic Foundation. Luisetti of Stanford is the only other player to twice gain Player of the Year honors.

*GUARD. . PAUL ENDACOTT. . . KANSAS. . 1921, 1922, 1923

A consistently great defensive player. Chosen on the Helms All-America teams of 1922 and 1923. Member of Kansas teams of 1922 and 1923 which were chosen for National Championship honors by Helms Athletic Foundation. Captained the 1923 Kansas team. Chosen Player of the Year in 1923 by Helms. Led defense which held Kansas opponents to 464 points in 18 games in 1921, 378 points in 18 games in 1922, and 299 points in 18 games in 1923.

Dr. Forrest Allen, illustrious Kansas coach, whose teams are noted for their outstanding defensive play, ranks Endacott as his greatest defensive player. Endacott has been named by many Basketball authorities for all-time team honors.

*GUARD. . JOHN WOODEN. . . PURDUE. . 1930, 1931, 1932

Probably the greatest all-around guard of them all. Brilliant on defense, and an exceptional shot. Chosen on Helms All-America teams of 1930, 1931, and 1932. Chosen Player of the Year in 1932 by Helms Athletic Foundation.

Member of Purdue team which won 10 straight games in 1930, to win Western Conference title. Member of Purdue team of 1932, which was chosen for National Championship honors by Helms Athletic Foundation. Wooden led defensive play which held Purdue opponents to 215 points in 10 Conference games in 1930, 275 points in 12 games in '31, and 303 points in 12 games in 1932.

Wooden scored 100 points in 10 Conference games in 1930, 97 points in 12 games in 1931, and 154 points in 12 games in 1932. His 154 points in 1932 established a Western Conference record.

Many of the nation's foremost basketball coaches have picked Wooden for all-time team honors. (Including Dr. Allen, Lambert, Dean, Keogan, Rupp, etc.)

DR. FORREST CLARE ALLEN

Born at Jamesport, Missouri, November 18, 1885. Educated at University of Kansas and Central College. Member of Kansas Basketball and Baseball teams, 1906-'07. Captain of '07 Basketball team. Basketball Coach at University of Kansas, 1908-'09, winning Missouri Valley championships. 1909-'12, Coach of Haskell Institute. 1912-'19, Athletic Director and Coach of all sports, Central Missouri State Teachers College, Warrensburg. 1919-'43, inclusive, Director of Athletics and Head Basketball Coach at University of Kansas.

Since 1920, Kansas hoop teams, under Allen's coaching, have won 5 Missouri Valley basketball titles, (1923, '24, '25, '26 and '27) and tied one. (1922) Since the formation of the Big Six Conference, in 1929, Kansas, under Allen, has won 6 Big Six titles, (1931, '32, '33, '34, '36, and '38) and has tied for the crown on 4 occasions. (1937, '40, '41, and '42.)

Allen's Kansas teams of 1922 and 1923 were chosen for National Championship honors by Helms Athletic Foundation, and almost captured the title again in 1936 when the Jayhawkers went undefeated in an 18 game schedule. However, in the Olympic Games tryout tournament Kansas twice went down to defeat at the hands of Utah State. Kansas won 21 straight games in 1936 before losing to Utah State.

During the seasons of 1922, '23, and '24, Allen's Kansas teams went through 34 consecutive conference games without defeat. During the seasons 1922 to 1927, inclusive, Allen's squads won 97 games and lost but 11 -- an amazing record. Three times Allen's teams have lost but 1 game in a season -- in 1923 it was 17 and 1; in 1925 it was again 17 and 1, and in 1934 it was 16 and 1.

Allen is perhaps the greatest Basketball coach of all time. In addition, he has served Basketball in many ways, in an executive capacity, on the Rules Committee, and on Promotional Committees. He was the founder of the National Assn. of Basketball Coaches of the U.S.A., and served as President the first two years, 1928 and 1929. He has served on the National Basketball Rules Committee for many years. Dr. Allen led the crusade to have Basketball competition included in the Olympic Games, meeting with success in 1936. He has written many articles on Basketball, as well as several books on the game -- including "My Basketball Bible," and "Better Basketball." Nickname is "Phog."

JUSTIN M. BARRY

Born at Aberdeen, South Dakota, December 17, 1892. Educated at Lawrence College and University of Wisconsin. Member of Lawrence College Football, Basketball, and Baseball teams. After graduating from Lawrence College, Barry served as coach at Madison High School, Wisconsin. He later became Director of Athletics at Knox College -- coaching football, basketball and baseball.

Barry took over the Basketball coaching assignment at University of Iowa in 1923, and remained there through the season of 1929. In his first year at Iowa, in '23, Barry's team tied for the Western Conference title, winning 11 and losing 1. His Iowa quintet again tied for the championship in 1926.

Barry went to Southern California in 1930, and remained there until early in 1942 when he enlisted in the Navy, being commissioned a Lt. Commander, and being assigned as Director of Athletics, St. Mary's Pre-Flight School, California. At Southern California, Barry's teams won Pacific Coast Conference, Southern Division crowns in 1930, 1933, 1934, 1935, and 1940. His teams tied for the title in 1936, and 1930. The Trojans, under Barry, won Pacific Coast Conference championships in 1930, 1935 and 1940. Barry's 1940 squad was chosen National Champions by Helms Athletic Foundation, winning 20 games and losing 3.

Barry conceived a "set" offense, which is sometimes referred to as the Barry System. He was instrumental in having the center-jump eliminated from the Game. Nickname is Sam. Coached Baseball at U.S.C. Coached Football in 1941.

CLAIR FRANCIS BEE

Born at Parkesburg, West Virginia, March 2, 1900. Educated at Waynesburg College. Also attended Ohio State University.

Bee is the youngest coach to be honored in the list which ranks the greatest basketball coaches of all time. At the age of 42, Bee finds his name in the Hall of Fame of Basketball's greatest coaches. The noted authority on Basketball, Ralph Morgan, has listed Bee among the ten greatest coaches of all time.

Bee earned letters in football, baseball, basketball, tennis and wrestling, at college. He is one of the foremost students of the game of Basketball. He has conducted coaching schools for the past four years, and has directed over 500 Basketball clinics. He has written more than 150 articles on the sport, and has written five texts on Basketball.

Clair Bee's remarkable coaching record at Long Island University for the past nine years, 1934 to 1942, inclusive, stands at 230 wins, and 17 losses. His Long Island team of 1936 won 26 straight games without defeat, while his 1939 team went through a 24 game schedule without defeat. Bee's 1937 squad won 28 and lost 3, his 1941 quintet captured 26 contests and dropped 2, while his 1942 model completed the season with 25 victories and but 2 setbacks. His team of 1938 won 23 and lost 4, piling up a total of 1,519 points.

The Long Island hoop team annexed the National Invitation College Tournament in 1939, and in 1941. Bee's 1939 contingent was chosen for National Championship honors by Helms Athletic Foundation.

OSBORNE B. COWLES

Born at Brown Valley, Minnesota, August 25, 1899. Graduated from Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota, 1922.

Like Clair Bee, Osborne is one of the younger coaches to be honored for all-time greatest honors. In fact, Osborne is but seven months older than Bee.

Cowles is regarded one of the greatest all-around athletes in Carleton College history. He was a star in football, baseball and basketball.

Following graduation from Carleton, Cowles coached at Rochester High School. That was in 1922-'23. His team won the State championship in football, and was a semi-finalist in the State Basketball Tournament. Cowles went to Iowa State as coach in 1923-'24. The following year saw him coaching at his Alma Mater, Carleton, where he remained until 1930. From there, Cowles went to River Falls Teachers College, Wisconsin.

Cowles took over the Head Basketball coaching assignment at Dartmouth College in 1936-'37. In his first year in the Eastern Intercollegiate League, Cowles' Dartmouth team captured second-place honors -- winning 8 games and losing 4. For the past five years, Dartmouth quintets, under the tutelage of Cowles, have won Eastern Intercollegiate League titles. His teams won 8 and lost 4 in '38, 10 and 2 in '39, 11 and 1 in '40, 10 and 2 in '41, and 11 and 2 in '42. No other Eastern coach has ever been able to match that record, and the Eastern Intercollegiate League has been operating since 1902. Cowles has fairly set the Eastern circuit afire with his brilliant coaching. Ralph Morgan also lists Cowles among the ten greatest coaches of all time. Splendid recognition for a coach who broke into the big-time just six years ago. Dartmouth was a finalist in the 1942 N.C.A.A. Basketball Tournament, losing to Stanford.

CLARENCE SINCLAIR EDMUNDSON

Born at Moscow, Idaho, August 3, 1886. Graduate of University of Idaho, '10. Starred in Basketball and Track while at College. National A.A.U. 380 Yard Run champion in 1909. Member of American 800 Meters Run Olympic Games Team in 1912.

Began career as coach in 1912, at University of Idaho. Remained there until 1918. Also served as Idaho Graduate Manager in 1917-'18. Went to Texas A&M in 1918, spending a year there. Went to Washington in fall of 1919. Has been at the Jusky institution ever since then.

CLARENCE SINCLAIR EDMUNDSON (Continued)

Edmundson has had exceptional success as Basketball coach at Washington. His teams won Pacific Coast Conference, Northern Division, championships in 1924, 1928, 1929, 1930, 1931, 1932, 1934, and 1936, and tied for the title in 1923 and 1937, only to lose out in the playoff series. Edmundson's Washington teams won Pacific Coast Conference championships in 1931 and 1934.

Edmundson-coached Huskies won the Northern Division title for five consecutive seasons -- 1928 to 1932, inclusive. Washington's greatest years under Edmundson were in 1929, when the Huskies won 16 and lost 2, and went undefeated in Northern Division conference play; in 1931, with 22 wins and 3 losses; and in 1934, with 16 triumphs and 3 setbacks.

Edmundson has been a member of the Basketball Rules Committee since 1940. He has also been a most successful Track and Field Coach -- his teams winning Northwest Track and Field championships on 10 occasions, and twice finishing second in N.C.A.A. meets. Edmundson coached the American 800 Meters Run team in the Olympic Games of 1932. He was a member of the Track and Field Rules Committee from 1922 to 1927. Nickname is "Hec."

NAT HOLMAN

Born at New York City on October 19, 1896. Educated at Savage School of Physical Education, and later at New York University. Excelled in Baseball, Football and Basketball in high school. Member of the Savage School of Phys. Ed. Basketball team in '17. Was a member of the Germantown, Pa., professional Basketball team in 1919. From 1920 to 1927, competed for the famous New York Celtic Basketball team which claimed the world championship. Captained the team.

Took over Basketball coaching assignments at City College of New York in 1918, and has remained there ever since. Has been one of the most successful coaches in the game. His teams have five times gone through the season with but a single defeat -- in 1923, 1924, 1932, 1933 and 1934. Best season was in 1932, when his squad won 16 and lost 1 -- losing only to Temple, 29-33.

During seasons of 1932-'33-'34, Holman's quintets won 43 games, and lost but 3. During seasons of 1922 to 1925, inclusive, his teams won 47 and lost but 6.

LON WALTER JOURDET

Born at Frenchtown, Pennsylvania, September 12, 1888. Graduated from University of Pennsylvania, '13. Member of Pennsylvania football and basketball teams. Captain of the Quaker hoop squad of 1912-'13. Took over Basketball coaching duties at University of Pennsylvania in 1915. Guided Quaker teams through the 1920 season, then retired. Came back to Penn as Advisory Coach in 1928, but returned to active duty, as Head Coach, in 1930-31.

Jourdet's Pennsylvania teams won Eastern Intercollegiate League titles in 1916, 1918, 1920, 1934, 1935, and 1937. Jourdet's squads of 1920 and 1920 went undefeated in Eastern Intercollegiate League play, winning 10 games, and 12 games, respectively.

The University of Pennsylvania team of 1920, under the leadership of Jourdet, was chosen for National Championship honors by Helms Athletic Foundation. The quintet won 22 games and lost but 1. The only loss of the season was to University of Chicago, in a post-season intersectional championship series. Penn won 2 of the 3 games played in this series. One of Jourdet's greatest teams was that of 1937, which won 17 and lost 3.

GEORGE E. KEOGAN

Born March 8, 1890. Attended University of Minnesota. Gave up dentistry for coaching.

First coaching assignment at Charles City, Iowa, college, 1909-'10 season. Coached at Lockport, Ill. Township High School next year. Moved over to Riverside, Ill. High School next season, and then to Superior, Wis. State Teachers College -- from 1912 to 1914. Traveled to St. Louis University, 1914-'15. Went to St. Thomas College, St. Paul, Minn. following year. When America entered World War, Keogan enlisted in Army.

After War, took coaching assignment at Allegheny, Pa. College. Moved to Valparaiso, Ind. University for two years, then to La Crosse, Wis. Central High School.

Appointed head basketball coach at Notre Dame in fall of 1923. Keogan's greatest teams were those of 1926, which won 19 and lost 1; 1927, which won 19 and dropped 1; 1932, which captured 18 and lost 2; 1936, which won 22, lost 2 and tied 1; 1937, which won 20 and lost 3; and 1938, which had 20 victories and 3 defeats. Keogan has had remarkable success at Notre Dame, producing some of collegiate basketball's most outstanding teams.

The Notre Dame teams of 1927 and 1936 were chosen National Champions by Helms Athletic Foundation.

WARD LEWIS LAMBERT

Born at Deadwood, South Dakota, May 28, 1888. Attended Wabash, where he excelled in football, baseball and basketball.

Prior to taking over basketball and baseball coaching duties at Purdue, in 1917, coached at Crawfordsville, Ind. High School; and Lebanon High School. Became Purdue's basketball mentor in fall of 1916, guiding Boilermakers to 3rd place in Western Conference standings of 1917. Enlisted in Army in 1917, being commissioned Lieutenant, and Director of Athletics at Camp Taylor, Ky. Returned to Purdue following War.

Won Western Conference basketball titles in 1922, 1930, 1932, 1934, 1938, and 1940, and tied for championship in 1921, 1926, 1928, 1935, and 1936. One of collegiate basketball's greatest coaches. A real student of the Game, and an author of several text books on basketball.

Lambert's finest teams were those of 1932, which won 17 and lost 1; and 1938, which won 18 and lost 2. His 1932 Purdue quintet was chosen for National Championship honors by Helms Athletic Foundation.

DR. WALTER E. MEANWELL

Regarded by many to be the greatest basketball coach of all time. A thorough student of basketball tactics, and one of the finest teachers of fundamentals. Had exceptional success at University of Wisconsin, coaching Badger quintets from 1912 to 1934 -- except for the World War period, when he served his country.

Meanwell's Wisconsin squads won Western Conference championships in 1913, 1914, and 1916, and tied for the crown in 1912, 1921, 1923, 1924 and 1929. His teams of 1912 and 1914 were undefeated in Conference and Non-Conference play, winning 15 games in each of the seasons.

Dr. Meanwell's team of 1916 won 19 contests and dropped but 1. In his first six years at Wisconsin, Dr. Meanwell's quintets lost but 8 games. Dr. Meanwell teams were always strong on defense, being expertly coached. Even during the lean Wisconsin years, Meanwell's hoop squads were stingy with opponent points.

Dr. Meanwell has written text books and many articles on Basketball, and also directed motion pictures on the Game. Has served the hoop game for many years in an executive capacity. He has probably contributed as much to the progress of collegiate basketball as has any other person.

On other pages of this booklet, Helms Athletic Foundation has named an All-Time All-America Collegiate Basketball Team, and has selected ten coaches for "greatest" honors. All of those who have been named for such honors are most certainly worthy of places in Collegiate Basketball's Hall of Fame -- as conceived by Helms Athletic Foundation. In addition, there are others who are being named for places in the Helms Athletic Foundation - Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame. They are men who have contributed much to Collegiate Basketball, and to the progress which collegiate basketball has made during the past forty years.

Helms Athletic Foundation has not been generous in making selections for its Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame, in addition to the players and coaches who have been given highest honors. There are perhaps many who have contributed much to Collegiate Basketball, and are possibly worthy of Hall of Fame ranking. However, Helms Athletic Foundation has named but three -- the late Dr. James A. Naismith, founder of the game of Basketball; Ralph Morgan, noted basketball authority who was responsible for the formation of the Eastern Intercollegiate League; and Oswald Tower, noted Basketball Historian and Rules Committee executive.

DR. JAMES A. NAISMITH

Born at Almonte, Canada, November 6, 1861. Died at Lawrence, Kansas, November, 28, 1939.

Dr. Naismith was the creator of the game of Basketball; having originated the game while an instructor at Springfield Y.M.C.A. College, Massachusetts, in 1891. Dr. Naismith published the rules of Basketball in 1892, and published them for a number of years thereafter.

Dr. Naismith received degrees from McGill University, Canada, 1887; Presbyterian College, Montreal, 1890. Colorado University, 1898, and Springfield College, 1891. While at McGill, Naismith competed in football and track and field.

Dr. Naismith's coaching career extended over a period of 1891 to 1905, during which time he coached at Springfield, Denver Y.M.C.A. and University of Kansas. He devoted much of his time to the game of Basketball, and for many years served the game in an executive capacity. From 1909 to 1920, he was a member of the Rules Committee. In 1923, Dr. Naismith was made Honorary Member of the Rules Committee, for Life. He was many times honored by colleges, prep schools, and Basketball groups. He received one of the greatest thrills of his life in 1936, when he traveled to Europe to witness Basketball competition in the Olympic Games.

RALPH MORGAN

Born at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, March 9, 1884. Educated at Friends School, and University of Pennsylvania. Competed in football, basketball and baseball while at Friends School.

Manager of the University of Pennsylvania Basketball team in 1905.

Founded the Collegiate Basketball Rules Committee, and acted as its Secretary 1908. (This committee was merged into the Joint Rules Committee in 1915.) Served as an executive of the Joint Rules Committee since its inception. Made an Honorary Member For Life of the National Basketball Committee. Chairman of the University of Pennsylvania Basketball Committee. Has served as Historian of the Eastern Intercollegiate League since he founded it.

Has probably given more effort and time to the game of Basketball, without thought of remuneration, than any man who ever lived.

COLLEGIATE BASKETBALL'S HALL OF FAME (Continued)OSWALD TOWER

Oswald Tower is a graduate of Williams College, 1907. He was a member and captain of the Williams team which won the New England championship of 1907. Has been a member of the Rules Committee since 1911, and has served as Editor of the annual Basketball Guide for thirty years.

He is a tireless worker for Basketball, contributing much time and effort.

In recognition of his noteworthy services to Basketball, Tower was presented with the Harold M. Gore Award in 1942.
