for Alberta and me.

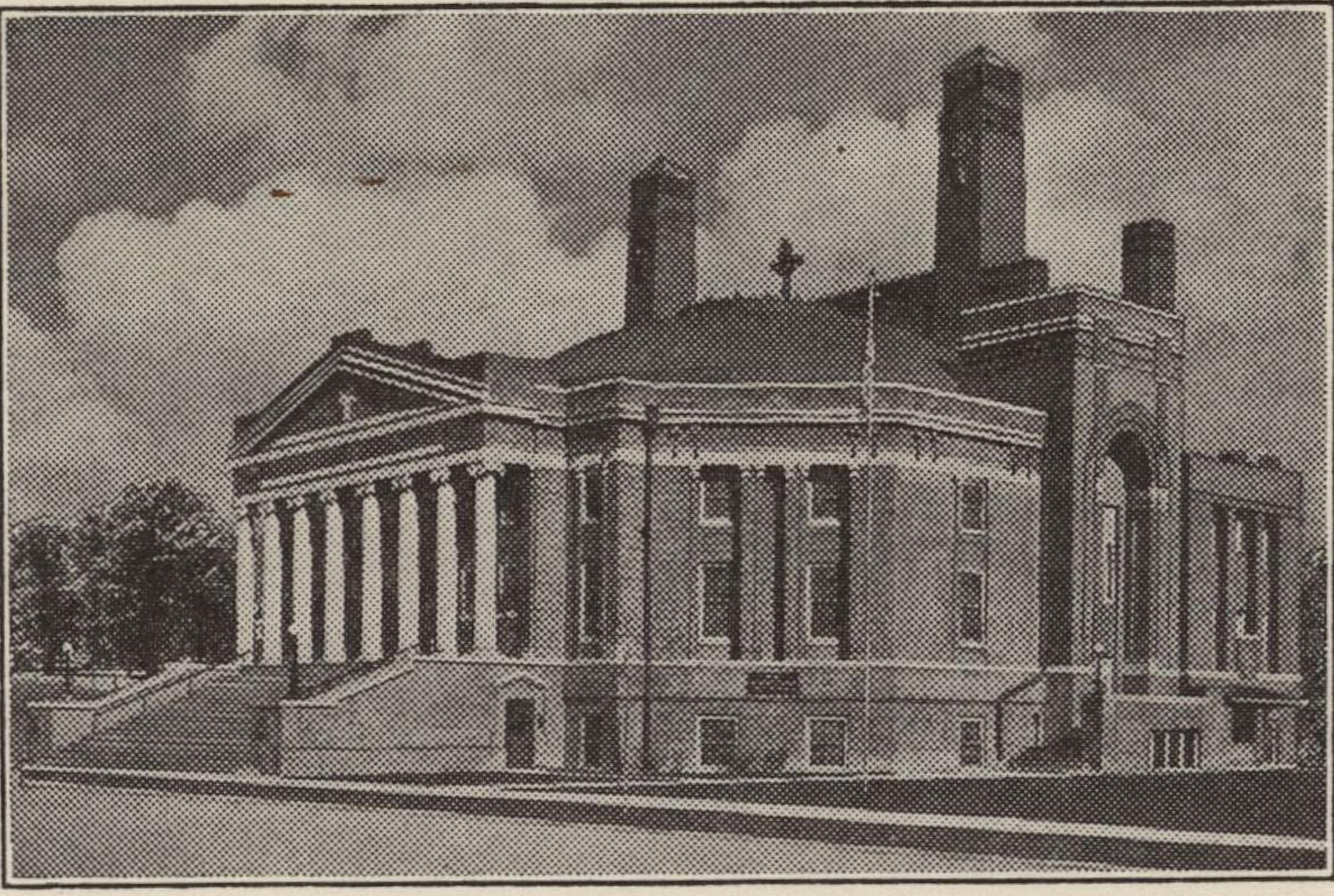
Probably I seem stickily

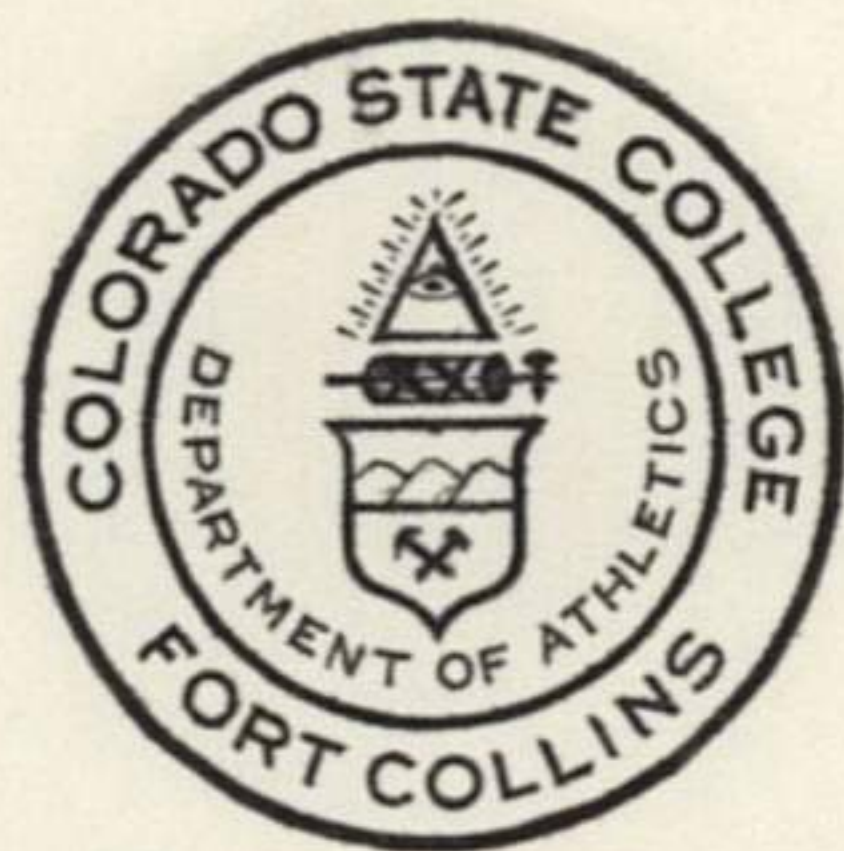
I think Binns of Dodge City Junior College is a fine man. I believe he has had quite a bit of success.
