Dear George:

Somehow I feel that I have answered your letter which was written in December from North Africa, - I mean answered it through the Jayhawk Rebounds, but I did just want to write you a personal note and let you know that all of us here at home are trying to do things constructive for you boys over on the other side.

We are working with the Red Cross, Selective Service Board, and other activities with a view of carrying on this fuss with our fee. There is not a lot that us oldsters can do but we can take our jobs seriously and do them to the best of our ability. Somebody must do that during the time you and other boys are away. The Jayhawk Rebounds, our sixth, will tell the sad story of our basketball accomplishments. We finally finished with five hundred per cent in the conference, and our total record was 15 wins and 9 losses. That is a better record than I thought we would have at the start of the season. Iowa State had three of their regulars back and then they had all-American Price Brookfield from the Texas Teachers College after he had played four years there and also a year of professional baseball and basketball.

Oklahoma had Allie Paine, one of their regulars who was as good proportionately as Charlie Black or Ray Evans would be on our team. He played four years of varsity and independent basketball and he was just too good for the competition we had. I am not alibiing in the least because I am not taking our basketball too seriously. In other words, I mean I am not going out over the country and getting them like some of these boys who are still doing it. They are picking up all the 4F boys they can get hold of and taking some advantage of the lax eligibility rules to further their athletic percentages. I would rather put my energies in the war effort than to wave a flag and say we are developing boys for the army and then pick up a bunch of 4F boys to tour the basketball circuit. But enough of that.

I understand your family is getting quite grown up. The young lady of the house, Margaret, said to her mother, "What does Dr. Allen look like? I want to go up to see him." So I have invited the young lady up at any time her mother can find it convenient. Bobby is getting to be quite a man. The other day I called from Ward's Flower Shop at noon to talk to Mrs. Hulteen about the birthdays for the Rotaryans, and Bobby answered the phone just like some young man. I said, "Who is this, Bobby?"



He said, "Yes, sir." I said, "Is your mother there, Bobby?" He said, "No, sir, not yet, but I'll have her call you when she gets home." So later I got the information I desired. It just shows how quickly youngsters grow into manhood.

We are hoping that you will be back by Christmas, 1944, at the old stand. Things have changed a lot since Sam Moyer and you and the other boys left the office. But we are hoping for a return to normalcy by Christmas, 1944. I imagine you will have some tall tales to tell and we will be glad to hear them.

There is some talk about playing baseball here this spring but I am letting that take care of itself. I have a very heavy speaking schedule out over the state, and if I take baseball which is always held late in the afternoon it precludes the possibility of my getting out. We may play some baseball, but the season is generally short, and traveling is difficult so we will play some nearby teams if we do indulge. I like baseball. It is a sport where you can have a lot of fun and get out in the sun. There is not the hard drive that football and basketball have, but I am not taking the easier side at the present time. We are choosing the things that we ought to do, perhaps - just exactly like you boys when you chose the harder, more difficult road.

Here's wishing you all of the good luck in the world, George. Carry on until we see you in Lawrence.

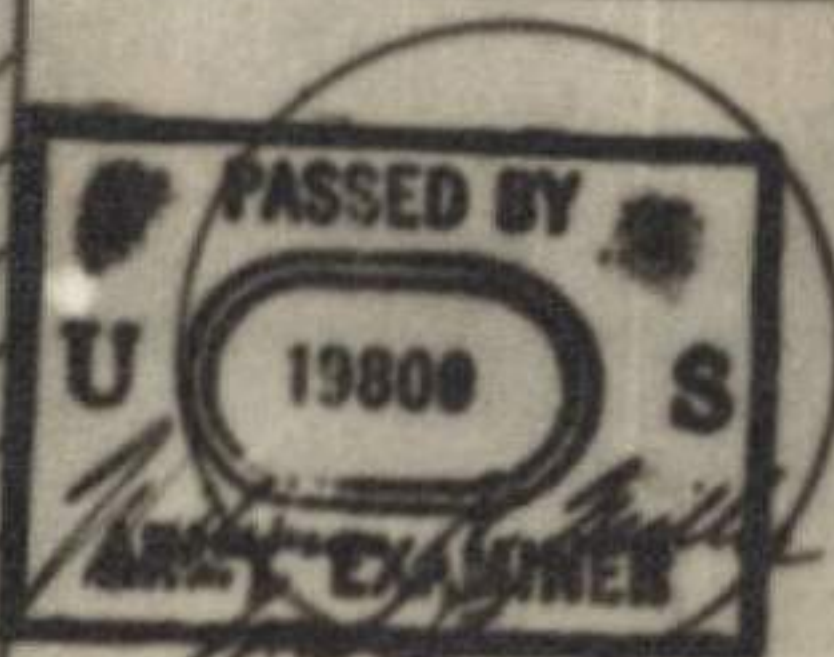

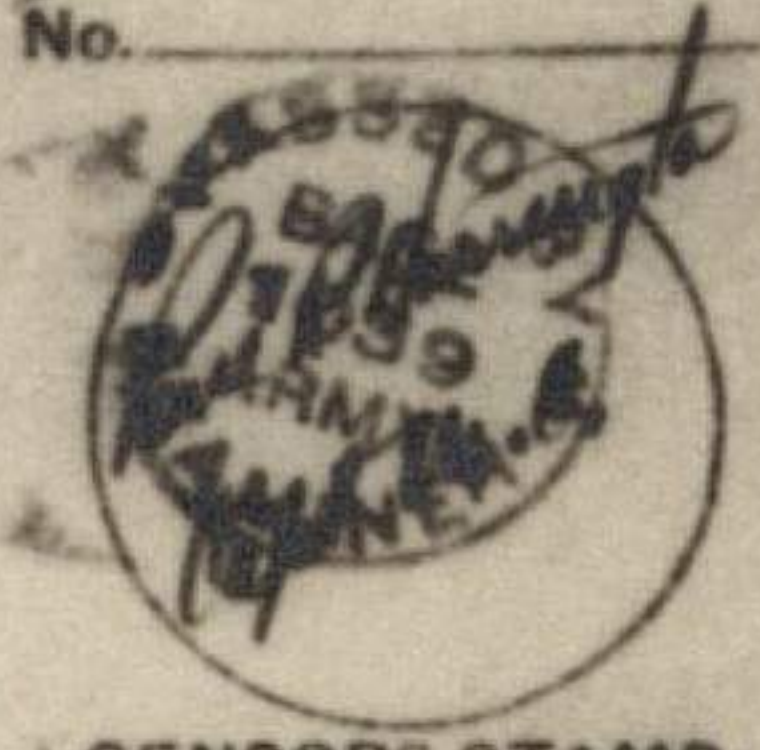

## Victor Hurt Returning to Manage Philbrook

Victor C. Hurt, former head coach at University of Tulsa, became business manager for Philbrook Art Center's financial interests with his election as president of the Southwestern Art association at a board of trustees meeting late Wednesday. Hurt succeeds Norman M. Hulings, who has held the position since it was created two years ago, and who returned to the First National Bank and Trust Co. as trust officer January 1.

Fred T. Haddock was elected chairman of the board of trustees; Dr. C. I. Pontius, vice chairman; R. Otis McClintock and Mrs. Allmand M. Blow, vice presidents; Mrs. Warren D. Abbott, secretary, and B. B. Weatherby, treasurer.

This is an addition of two new officers by a by-law amendment, vice chairman and the separation of the office of secretary and treasurer, formerly held by one person. This creates an executive committee of seven instead of five, Rush Greenslade, retiring chairman, pointed out, since the officers act as the executive committee of the board.

New trustees elected at the annual membership meeting which preceded the trustees meeting were A. I. Levorsen and Sidney H. Davis. Re-elected were Mrs. A. L. Farmer, P. C. Lauinger, R. Otis McClintock, Dr. C. I. Pontius and Mrs. John S. Zink.

A new by-law amendment which goes into effect with this election prohibits trustees from serving more than two terms in succession. Another new by-law provides that money remaining in the acquisitions fund at the end of a year may stay there instead of being transferred to the endowment fund. "This will give opportunity to accumulate larger amounts and buy paintings and works of art of real permanent interest," Greenslade commented.

Hurt, who has had a wide and varied business experience in addition to his athletic abilities, has been manager of the Lawrence, Kan., division office of the Virgil E. Hurt Co., investments, real estate and securities brokers, since February, 1942, when he left the University of Kansas coaching staff. The company, headed by his brother, headquarters in Emporia, Kan., and operates in eight mid-western states.

The new Philbrook president has been on the board of directors of the company since its organization 12 years ago and has worked actively with them during part of that period.

His duties in connection with his work there included property management as well as brokering assets of building and loan, insurance and mortgage companies.

He was an organizer and first president of the Morris Plan bank in Shawnee, during the time he was coach at Oklahoma Baptist university.

His experience with colleges, and particularly the University of Kansas, has included handling public relations and the business of his department. He went to K. U. from the University of Tulsa in 1939, after three years here as head coach, and there was assistant to Gwinn Henry, head of the athletic department and his former coach at the College of Emporia.

"Mrs. Hurt joins me in being very happy at the thought of returning to Tulsa," he said this morning. "The position of the southwestern Art association is already known and appreciated throughout this section of the southwest. I am particularly impressed with the vision and foresight of those responsible for the development of Philbrook Art Center. It is with a lot of enthusiasm that I look forward to playing whatever part it is possible for me to play in its future."

Hurt spent today getting acquainted with the outline of his new duties, which include management of the Beacon building, donated to the art association two years ago by Waite Phillips.

He will then return to Lawrence to wind up his affairs there and will return here the latter part of next week.

When he will bring his family to Tulsa is problematical since it depends on the housing situation. Mr. and Mrs. Hurt have five children, Vera Margaret, a sophomore at K. U.; Victor, jr., a senior in high school and already enlisted in the army air corps but deferred until he completes his school year; Mary Elizabeth, in junior high; Martha Ann, age 4, and Jane Eleanor, age two.

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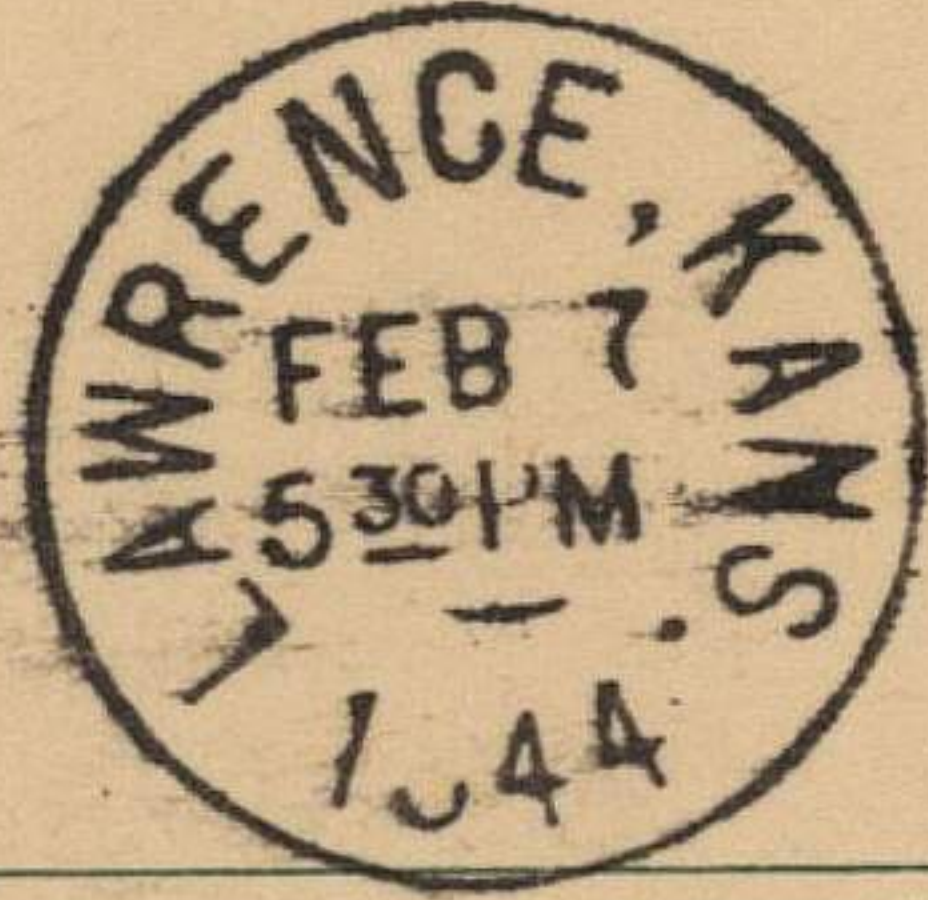
