Of course, I could not expect this money from the University Budget Committee, but since the past two years have been very lucrative years from the earnings of the basketball team, my feeling was that this \$200 perhaps should come from the Athletic Board since the Athletic Association pays me but \$2100 for coaching basketball. I will guarantee that this is the lowest salary paid to any Varsity basketball coach in the United States. Therefore, I feel that it would not be an unjust burden on the Athletic Association to make this adjustment. However, the Athletic Board meets separately, but the Chancellor has access, of course, to both Boards.

I do not want to put the Chancellor on the spot and would not embarrass him for one moment, but I do feel that until this matter is taken up and cared for in the way that the Board of Regents and Chancellor Mallott's predecessor agreed, that I have not been treated with the fairness that should be accorded a member of the faculty who has gone on and done his job, regardless of the failure of people in authority to consummate.

I am sending you a carbon copy of the letter that Chancellor Lindley wrote me so you can see that it is unmistakable as to what the intent and purpose of the letter was.

I deeply appreciate your friendship and please rest assured that regardless of how this comes out there will be no moaning at the bar.
