Dear Mr. Hunter:

I have answered your attorney, Mr. White, and also have talked with your brother, T. P., as well as our registrar at the University, Mr. George O. Foster. T. P. had an appointment with the committee yesterday. I saw T. P. but did not have an opportunity to talk with him about it.

It may be necessary for your attorney to write to this committee. I am very sure that if you have had the probate judge execute these documents that you will have no difficulty in finality in having the committee here recognize your point.

This committee is composed of University professors and the business manager of the University. So many out-of-state students falsify their residence address that this committee is a very hard-boiled group. It may be necessary for your attorney to write to Mr. Henry Werner, Adviser of Men, who is chairman of the committee. If your attorney writes him I am very sure that he will have no difficulty, as you have the law on your side.

You will understand my position. I am an employee of the University. It is rather bad grace for me to be an intermediary between outside parties and the committee.

I think you are absolutely justified in your stand, and I am sure that when all the facts in the case are set before this committee they can do nothing otherwise than to accept the facts as they are and permit the boy the benefits of his residence status in the state of Kansas.
