
Please accept my thanks for your letter of

Dear Mr. Hayden:

Answering your communication of the 25th instant, I beg to state that the best way we treat athletes foot is to paint the floors of all the dressing rooms with good oil paint. Then we endeavor to keep the floor perfectly dry so that the fungus growth does not start from damp and humid rooms.

I think foot baths of some antiseptic do help, but we paint our boys' feet with compound tincture of benzoin, or as the Cramer Chemical Company calls it, "Foot Toughener".

The thing that permits the infection of athletes foot is that the feet are sweaty and the skin tissue gets tender and does not resist the infection of the bug. If the skin of the foot is tough you will not get athletes foot. It is when there is a break or lesion in the skin and the infection comes in contact with this lesion.

Of course, you cannot treat all of your students by painting their feet, but I think by using compound tincture of benzoin you can handle your teams that way. We get a camel's hair brush and paint the feet just like you would paint any other skin area. We are never bothered with it here. However, we do have foot baths around the swimming pool.

I generally observe that these foot baths in pool rooms are not taken care of well and the boys will not bathe their feet in them. They will step over them and pay little attention to the foot baths, and they have foot trouble. Merely by bathing the feet in a strong solution of briny salt water, or a solution of bichloride of mercury, or any of those foot tougheners you can get foot resistance to this infection.

Rayon hose are the worst thing to cause athletes foot. Remember, it is sweaty and tender feet which permit the bug to get hold of the foot due to unhygienic foot conditions and floors favorable to the propagation of the bug.



Will you write me again telling me whether or not it is for your team or for your entire school? Proper foot hygiene and painting the feet every day with some good foot toughener is the best way to prevent athletes foot. If there is infection, then some heavy ointment that has sulphur as a base will help. However, I would say that if any boy has athletes foot he should be sent to a doctor as the responsibility is too great for a coach or principal to undertake in the treating of these cases.

Let me know if I have answered your questions in a manner that is of any help to you.



The English Literature I is very difficult and it would entail a lot of study. This other entails reading, and you, having good gumption and a fair degree of judgment, should be able to make this quite satisfactorily.



Now the Elementary Economics is also a freshman course and since you have taken Social Science Survey and have learned how to study, and the fact that you made a good grade in Zoology, shows that you are definitely making progress. Now, T. P., this is your job and I want you to tackle it like you do any athletic contest.

By the way, had you taken football it would have been necessary for you to have bought a book perhaps, and this other way all this will cost you will be the enrollment. So I urge you to get busy at once and write me occasionally, making a progress report from time to time so that I will know that you are not letting any more grass grow under your feet. I am glad that you stated that you realize the time is relatively short and that you must get busy.
