He and Mary can hardly hold themselves until your first game and from what Ernie says the boys appear to be capable of developing into one of your better clubs in that long line of championship teams. NINE SPORTS PARTICIPATION RECORDS BROKEN

A continuation of the upward trend in sports participation among the member schools of the Association is shown in a summary of athletic participation for the 1939-1940 school year. More than 21,000 boys took part in the ten approved sports during the year, representing an increase of approximately 400 over the previous high established in 1938-1939.

Altogether nine new records were established as old marks were broken in football, basketball, track, tennis, wrestling, golf, and softball in addition to the total number.

With 73 schools reporting six-man football teams, the number of schools playing football jumped to 391, an increase of 24 over the preceding year and the highest number participating in the gridiron sport since 1931-32. There were 318 eleven-man football schools with 10,631 boys competing, while the 73 six-man schools had 1,127 boys reporting. The combined total of 11,758 was the largest number of individual football participants since

records have been kept and was a hike of more than 700 over last year.

Although four less schools played basketball, the number of pupils continued to climb and reached 13,937, another record, and an increase of approximately 350 over the former mark. Track turned in a double record as eight new schools took up the spring sport for a total of 490, and a record-smashing total of 8,815 boys turned out for the cinder competition. The number of tennis schools dropped off slightly, but more boys than ever before participated.

Wrestling increased both in the number of schools and in the number of grapplers as 346 boys took part as representatives of 19 schools. The total of 50 schools having golf teams tied the number in 1935-36 and also in 1937-38, but the individual total of 278 was an all-time high. Twenty schools playing softball had 358 players, another record.

CONSTITUTION

of the

KANSAS STATE HIGH SCHOOL ACTIVITIES ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Kansas State High School Activities Association.

ARTICLE II

Purpose

The purpose of the Association is to approve, promote, develop and direct activities and contests among its member schools in Athletics, Music, Forensics and Debate, Typing, Scholarship and any other activities which the membership may desire to sponsor. This purpose is to be attained through a plan of unification in the administration of these activities and contests without destroying the identity of any individual activity.

ARTICLE III Membership

Section 1. Any public accredited high school in the state of Kansas may become a member of this Association by its principal—the term "principal" as used throughout shall be construed to mean the executive officer of the high school—subscribing to the rules of the Association, and by the payment of the annual dues for each member as hereinafter provided. The term "high school" shall be interpreted to include the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades.

NOTE: Either the principal or superintendent may be the official representative, according to the policy of the individual school.

- Sec. 2. Any approved junior high school may become a member of this Association by its principal subscribing to the rules of the Association, and by the payment of the annual dues as hereinafter provided.
- Sec. 3. In schools not maintaining approved Junior High Schools, teams may be organized from the seventh, eighth and ninth grades, or any division of those grades, and enrolled in this Association, for athletic purposes only, as Junior High Schools. Schools enrolling in this Association under the provisions of this section shall be subject to the Junior High School regulations.
- Sec. 4. A private school of secondary rank may apply to the Board of Control for admission and, upon payment of dues and the fulfillment of the requirements designated by the Board of Control, shall be admitted to membership.
- Sec. 5. Each school in joining the Association expressly agrees not to contest with schools which are under suspension from the Association by the Board of Control, under the powers given in Article 6, Section 1, or with schools of other states which are similarly suspended from the associations of

The Basketball Critics

We understand that the members of the national basketball rules committee, composed largely of college and university men, took a lambasting at their recent annual meeting from a small group of 30 or 40 members of the college basketball coaches' association and were told that they should rule out the molded basketball and the new fan-shaped backboards. Furthermore, we understand that a majority of the committee "took water" and tried to crawl out from under the responsibility for making the new-type basketball and backboards official. We are told that these coaches tried to place the blame upon a small group of midwestern high school men and made a number of the committee members believe that they could not afford to accept anything from the high schools, that until such time as the college basketball coaches should make formal recommendations they should not vote any changes.

Since we were not in on the preliminaries to the change in the backboards we cannot speak with any authority. We were informed, however, by the committee that the research division of the rules making body supervised tests and experiments authorized by the committee and that following the report of this committee, which was headed by Dr. F. C. Allen of the University of Kansas, the change to the new boards was authorized and recommended. At the annual meeting of the joint committee in 1941 it voted not only to make the new boards official but put into the guide the statement that, "in all new construction and in replacements the official board (the new one) should be installed." The vote on this change in the rules was 14 to 1—and there are only four high

school representatives on the committee.

In this Missouri Valley area not only have the high schools changed to the new-type board but also the colleges and universities. In fact, we do not know of a single college in this section that does not have the new boards installed. Were our Missouri Valley college and university coaches influenced by a small group of high school coaches, or did they make the change upon the recommendation of the national committee, just as our high schools did? Did they think they were to be misled by a group of uninformed rules makers who did not know their own minds or those of their constituents?

The popularity of the new boards among those who have used them is attested by the overwhelming vote of 5 to 1 by hundreds of college and high school coaches throughout the country. Our Kansas coaches are almost unanimous for them, as they are for the molded basketball and we doubt if there will be any going back. In fact, we fear for the safety of anyone who would suggest such

a thing.

We are not so much concerned just now with the merits of the molded ball or the new backboard, but we are concerned with the advisability of our high school associations being submitted to the domination of a rules making body that does not know "where it has been, where it is now, or where it is going."

Dear "Doc":

I was in Chicago over the week end and had another talk with Mr. Porter in regard to the action of the basketball rules committee. I also sent a copy of my editorial to George Edwards and have a fine letter from him this morning.

George Edwards does not think the situation is so serious as Mr. Porter seems to think it is. George believes that if we will just be patient and not try to force the issue so fast the transition to the new type of backboard will come in time. Of course, you and I understand that Mr. Porter is quite persistent in advancing his ideas and I was a little bit afraid that perhaps he was endeavoring to force the issue a little too fast at first. While George is very loyal to the streamlined board I think he is cognizant of the true situation and it is quite a relief to me to receive his reassuring letter. He seems to think that with both boards and both types of basketballs approved we shall have to be content until after the war is over. He is also very anxious that nothing be done to disturb the relationship between the high schools and the colleges. Unlike Mr. Porter he does not believe the college and university men are anxious to break away. This is good news to us, of course, and it will be of assistance to us in planning our affairs for the future. The first opportunity I have I shall drop in and talk to you about it. In the meantime I think our best procedure is to say very little about it. Perhaps I have said too much in my article and I shall not comment on it further unless something comes up in the meantime.
