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

High Schools to Debate American Foreign Policy

In view of the unsettled conditions in the Orient and in nearly all parts of Europe, the high school debate question this year is one of unusual interest and vital importance. The proposal "that the United States should establish an alliance with Great Britain" challenges the immediate interest of every individual, student debaters and adults alike. It possesses the additional challenge that, with almost daily changes in the political situation in Central Europe, additional facts are developing constantly to affect the validity of both affirmative and negative arguments on this proposition. Since the average citizen has given but little thought to our foreign policy, this topic projects the high school debater into a field of information which he has not previously explored.
