Enclosed you will find our schedule of basketball games for 1944-1945.





DESCRIPTION OF KINNICK HALL

Located on the athletic area on the west side of the U. S. Naval Air Station, Olathe, Kas., Kinnick Hall houses a large gymnasium or drill hall and swimming pool. In addition to athletic events, indoor personnel inspections and reviews are held in the hall.

The building is named for Ensign Nile Clarke Kinnick, Jr., who lost his life 2 June 1943 when his carrier plane made a forced landing in the Caribbean Sea. Ens. Kinnick received his primary flight training as a cadet at the U. S. Naval Reserve Aviation Base, Fairfax Airport, Kansas City, Kas.--from which the Olathe Naval Air Station evolved. As a student at the University of Iowa, in 1939 he was awarded the Heisman, Camp, and Maxwell trophies as the nation's No. 1 football player and was selected captain of the All-American team. In addition, he was a brilliant student and a member of Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic honorary fraternity. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. N.C. Kinnick, live at Omaha, Nebr. Mr. Kinnick attended the ceremony when the hall was dedicated 9 August 1943 by Capt. Dixie Kiefer, USN, then commanding officer of the Olathe Naval Air Station and now in command of a ship atsea.

The main part of the hall, housing the gymnasium, has an over-all length of 304 feet and is 141 feet four inches wide. The inside playing surface is 300 feet by 100 feet, providing space for five regulation basketball courts, badminton and volleyball courts, gymnastic equipment, and punching bags.

Twenty laminated wood arches, used to conserve steel, support the arched roof and are imbedded at the ground in concrete footings each 8 feet wide.

Along the lean-tos at each side are rubbing rooms, showers, heads, athletic offices, and storage rooms.

South of the gymnasium and attached to it is a 50-meter enclosed swimming pool. A regulation Navy pool, it is approximately 25 yards wide and 55 yards long--making it one of the largest in the Kansas City area. The pool holds approximately half a million gallons of water. A filtration plant at the South end of the pool keeps the water pure. Here officers and men, as well as WAVES, check out in their Navy swimming tests in addition to swimming for sport.

The pool was built according to plans formulated nationally by Lt.-Comdr. Francis O. McDermott, Station Athletic Officer and Administrative Assistant to the Station Executive Officer, when Mr. McDermott (then a lieutenant) was on duty in Washington, D. C., in charge of building swimming pools and other Navy athletic facilities.

The athletic area surrounding Kinnick Hall includes five regulation fields, for football or soccer, six tennis courts, a regulation hardball diamond, and two additional diamonds for hardball or softball. Outdoor reviews are held on the field west of Kinnick Hall.

Dear Mr. Keller:

Answering your questions as per number, will say (1) that we have a superintendent of the stadium and stadium grounds. I hired him 25 years ago when I was Director of Athletics. He has a house, and has been paid \$100 a month and his house rental free. A farmer is the best type of man for this type of job because he has been accustomed to work and doesn't watch the clock like some of the boys you get from town.

He hired a colored fellow who helps him in marking the courts, fields and play areas, and those two are always on the job.

(2) We have a very happy arrangement because until seven years ago I was Both Director of Athletics and head of the Department of Physical Education. Since my resignation as Director of Athletics, the set-up has not changed at all. When Gwinn Henry was here and now when Mr. Quigley is here, we have the same happy arrangement. The Department of Physical Education pays on the hour basis for the work done by these men. That makes it possible for the athletic people to keep their men busy the year-round, and it permits the Department of Physical Education the services of a splendid pair of men who know their job and there is no lost motion, overlapping, or failure to provide someone to do the work, as would be the case if we had a part-time man. This superintendent of stadium has authority to hire students for extra work when moving bleachers, or emergency jobs.

(3) I have one of the men in my department who is responsible for all equipment. I do not mean for the safekeeping of it because that is handled by the check room. We have a storeroom in the gymnasium above, which is under our office management, but this stuff is checked to the equipment room as needed. One of our physical instructors is responsible for the gymnasium, reporting the breakages, needs for repair on equipment, and so forth. He may also make our schedules for our physical education personnel, under the authority of the head of the Department of course. This same man, and all of our physical education men, of course, are responsible for reporting to the office any uncleanness.

We have a janitor under the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds. But naturally I assume responsibility to see that these things are enforced and am ever vigilant to see that the building is kept clean. It

seems to me the head of the Department of Physical Education ought to assume that responsibility.

I have answered both 3 and 4 in the same breath.

(5) The responsibility for keeping the grounds attractive, if at the stadium, is of course that of the superintendent of stadium. If at the University, it is the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, who is a graduate engineer, and has charge of all buildings and grounds.

For our physical education grounds, if you speak of those, the man that I mentioned above, the superintendent of stadium, regardless of where the grounds are, if they are used for intramural or physical education activities, we assume our share of expense in having him keep these up.

(6) Outside of the check room man, we only use two men, the superintendent of stadium and his assistant, and in addition the number of students that he wants to hire. But we do not hire a lot of students merely for them to draw pay. I have made it absolutely imperative that we only have men who will work.

In answering your questions in a general way, we have found that when we handle the problems through the Buildings and Grounds Department that we pay excessively for our work. They have a cost-plus basis, and the cost is much higher than if we hire our own men at so much a month, and get them to do odd jobs here and there for both the Athletic Department and the Physical Education Department. We think we have a very efficient set-up. This work is also performed for the women's department for their hockey field, and so forth. All the work clears through our office. Every request must come to our secretary and we clear through the office. There is no overlapping, no misunderstanding, and we are very happy in our arrangement.

Answering your postscript in regard to gym management, as I told you, we have a very efficient young man in our Department of Physical Education who was head of a department in a large high school in Western Kansas. He makes out the schedules for our personnel on all classes, keeps the gymnasium appointments properly set up; in fact, he has the say as to how they shall be handled, the placing back of equipment by different instructors, and so forth. If any of these people fail to do their allocated jobs, he reports to me and I naturally have a conference with the members failing to do their job.

It all reverts back to the head of the department, after all, to see who is running the show.

I will try to outline the nature of my inquiry some months ago.

I am interested in the organization of labor set-ups in different physical education departments about the State of Missouri.

2. If the same workmen are responsible for the athletic department as well as the physical education department.
3. Who is responsible for equipment for the different physical education classes:
4. Who is responsible for keeping the building clean?
5. Who is responsible for keeping the grounds attractive?
6. How many men are needed in this type of work as outlined in the above two questions?

I believe these questions will give you some idea as to the nature of my inquiry - I am most interested in the policy of the University as to the organization of the above items.



Hope you all have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year - wish I were going to be around but I guess that will have to wait. Haven't seen a Rebauch for a long time but our mail seems to be fouled up. Dad said you saw my letter about T. P. - thanks, Doc, it was merely expressing what we all thought and felt about good ol' T. Bone. None finer!

We were at Leyte with MacArthur as Bill probably told you - although I was just a spectator. Been on this ship a year now and at sea 11 months without liberty so maybe things will pick up in the future. At that - it's an awfully soft life for a marine. Although I hate to see one man in so long, from an international standpoint I believe it was best that Roosevelt won. Not any hot news. 
