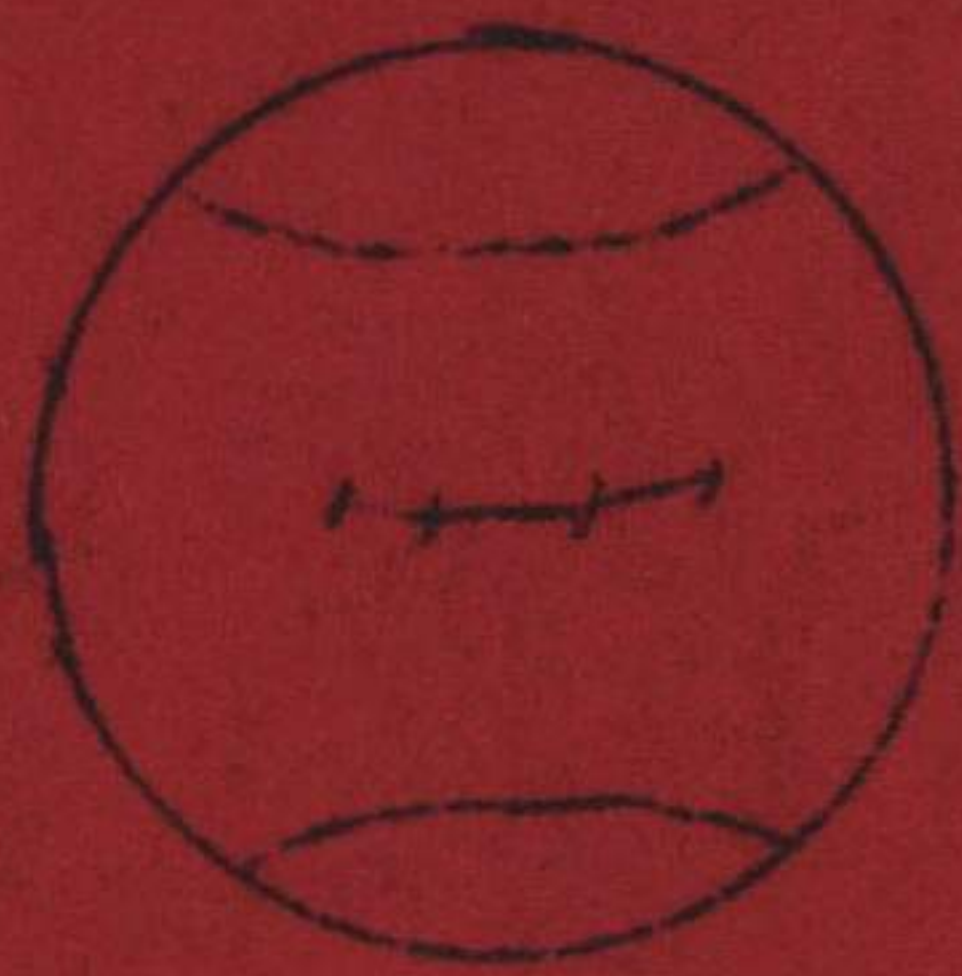

PORTIS MAN ACCUSED!

At a recent session of the United States District Court in Topeka, the case of the government against J. E. Kissell of Portis, Kansas, came up for disposition. Mr. Kissell was charged with sending some matters of the nature of comic valentines through the mail. Mr. Kissell who was represented legally by Harvey McCaslin of Osborne and Ed Rooney of Topeka, declared that he was not guilty and that he would not personally contest the case. Mr. Rooney, attorney for Mr. Kissell, was present, and filed a motion to require the government to set out copies of the alleged improper mail matter. This request of Mr. Rooney was sustained by Judge Hopkins.

As soon as the specimens of the mail were set out, Mr. Rooney then moved the court to quash the indictment and throw the same out of court for the reason that indictment did not state a violation of the laws of the United States. Mr. Rooney argued the matter to the court and the court sustained him.

The court in sustaining the motion of Mr. Rooney, stated that it was a common thing for him, the Judge, to receive more severe letters and cards than those exhibited, every day, and thought nothing of the matter. Judge Hopkins reprimanded the District Attorney's office and told them that he thought they were uselessly wasting the money of the government when there were more important things to get after and prosecute.

After the sustaining of Mr. Rooney's motion, Mr. Kissell was discharged and freed of all accusations.

In view of the foregoing statements which are true, Mr. Kissell, whose name was connected with action that was said to be defamatory, offensive and scurrilous, would like to ask a question or two.

Who instigated the proceedings mentioned?

Dear Cy:

Answering your favor of the 20th instant, beg to state that Tony Hinkle, the Great Lakes coach, picked Charlie Black on his all-opponent team, and you know Tony played some good boys. "Pic" also picked Charlie Black on their all-American. He was undoubtedly the best man in our western part of the country. That even takes in the Big Ten and runs to the coast. I do not believe that we saw a better man than Charlie Black from a standpoint of coordination, offensive and defensive rebound play, and ability to score in the clutches.

Big Ed Beisser, of Creighton was also a top man, as was Senesky, of St. Joseph's. He could make anybody's ball club. Ray Evans, our all-American in football, was picked by several coaches on their all-American. I would certainly put him on any team that I would pick. Tucker, of Oklahoma, could do almost anything, but was not nearly as good as Charlie Black.

Babich, of Fordham, was another good man, as was Binetti, of St. Bonaventure. Gene Rock, of Southern California, could do just about everything that any versatile basketball player could do. Also, his teammate, Seminoff, of Southern California, was a great player.

Langler, of Creighton, was a very versatile and valuable man.

This gives about the best ten that I can think of at the present time. This St. John's center must be a good boy with all of his height if he can use it.

I have asked our publicity man, K. W. Davidson, to send a picture of Black, head and shoulders, to Hugo Autz, at St. Louis. This has been done, I am told.
