



"I have never before seen such a place in which to hold a school. It wasn't as good as our worst chicken houses. The little shack was old and drab. There wasn't a desk or table on which the children could write and not enough rough board benches for all of the children. Only the cheerfulness of the children kept me from dejection". What can we do to help this teacher and these children?

CONSTRUCTIVE ENDEAVOR OVERSEAS



In England the SCF is giving supplemental aid to 10,000 children and seeking support for 100 residential nurseries in the country — of which 10 are now opened.

This is what a child draws when first evacuated from a bombed city district and the memory of the horror is apparently indelible — a world of violence and engines of destruction.

What the SCF is doing overseas is not merely emergency relief but constructive service to children.

The SCF works in England through its sister organization, the Save the Children Fund. For work in other countries, it is the supporting American member of the Save the Children International Union, Geneva, Switzerland.

The effect of taking city children out of the welter of war to a pleasant rural home where with others they have opportunity for normal play, is amazing.

Here is a specimen of a child's drawing after a restorative period of play at a center in the country away from war and the screeching of bombs—trees, flowers, birds, Peace!


