Regarding the two boys at Wichita that would like to go to college, I have this to say. If they have had letters from Iba and from the Pittsburg Teachers it is a cinch that they wouldn't enjoy the campus and the remuneration on Mount Oread. I am speaking from past experiences because when those two boys, Mr. Lance and Mr. Iba, pass up any material, even though it costs a little something, then it is unusual. If these boys wanted to go to school and pay their own tuition, we would give them a job that would pay \$18 to \$20 a month, but that is all. I know this will not compare with what they will get at other places, so I never go out in competition for those fellows if I have them sized up correctly.
