
Dear Mr. Allen:

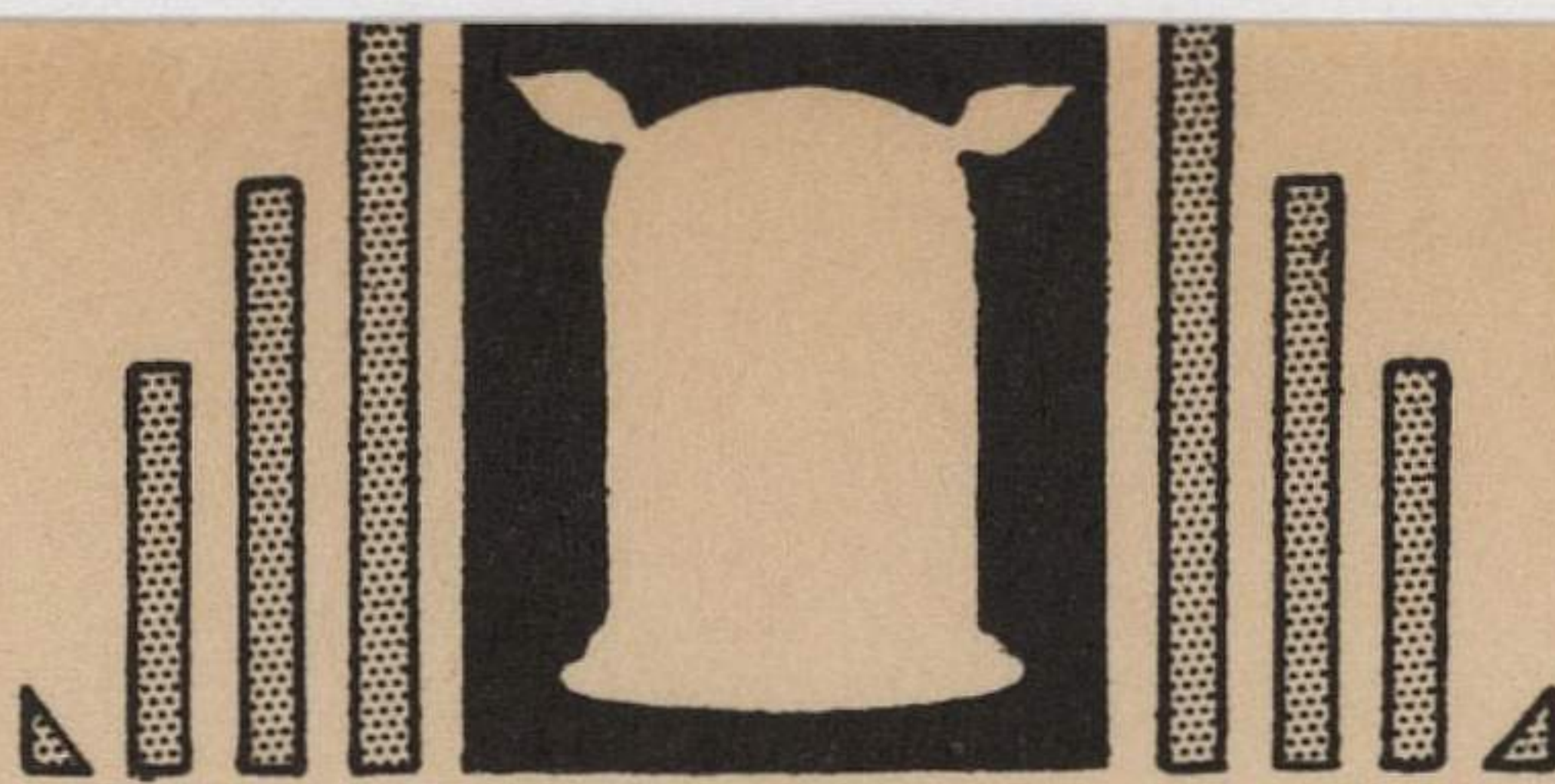



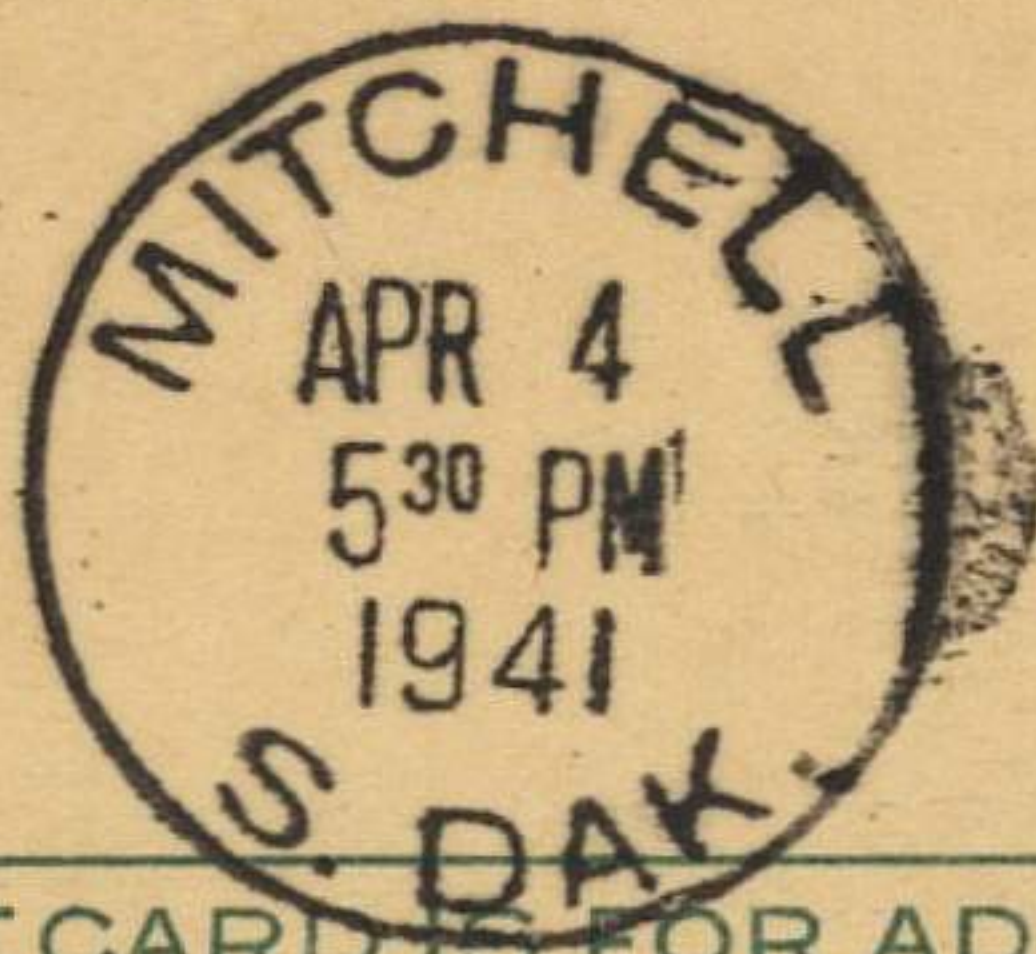

Dr. Forrest C. Allen, Director of Physical Education and Recreation, and Varsity Basketball and Baseball Coach, will have been with the University of Kansas, twenty-five years, this next year. Was Director of Athletics for eighteen years. In 1905, he was manager and member of the Kansas City Athletic Club National Championship Basketball Team. (At that time, this was called the K.C.A.C. World's Championship Basketball Team, because the K.C.A.C. beat the Buffalo German Y.M.C.A. team which won the Olympic title at both the Pan American and the St. Louis World's Fair). 1908-9 Coach of the University of Kansas Basketball Team (winning Missouri Valley Championship) both years; also coached Haskell Indians in 1908-9. From 1920 to the present time, has coached Varsity basketball at the University of Kansas. He has won seventeen championships in twenty four years; twenty four championships in thirty one years of coaching.

Doctor Allen is the founder of the Kansas Relays--1923.

The Founder of National Assn. of Basketball Coaches.  
(Past President for two years).

He has been a member of the Basketball Rules Body for thirteen years. He is the author of "Basketball Bible", "Better Basketball", and a chapter entitled "Administration and Organization" in the book "Higher Education in America", by Kent. He has written numerous articles for outstanding magazines and for seven years wrote syndicated articles for the Associated Press in New York.


I'm not teaching this summer and plan to go up on the north shore of Lake Superior for a short time with my family.


