Dear Dr.:

I do not believe that you clearly understood my letter of May 28 regarding contract for basketball games between our institutions.

We do not have any contracts in basketball where we extend the privilege of an option only in your case. We either trade games home and home or pay flat guarantees. The Valley Conference has been operating on basis of trading home games every since I have been in the Conference and we feel that it is better to pay flat guarantees for intersectional games. We trade our games home and home with Oklahoma University.


I want you to fully understand that we have appreciated the series with Kansas University and we would like very much to continue the series. But, we do not feel that we should make a proration on our student season tickets, due to the fact that this particular game does not have any bearing whatsoever on the sale of our student tickets. But, I do feel that it is fair that you should have an option of the cash gate plus a proration on the transferable season tickets. In other words, we would like to have games with you with guarantee of \$400.00 and option of fifty per cent of net gate less student tickets. Or, we would be willing to play you on a flat guarantee of \$400.00, \$500.00, \$600.00, or \$750.00.

Naturally, when we scheduled the games with the per cent privilege I thought that we would exercise enough in option to offset the amount we would deduct from our student season tickets.

I hope that your understand our position in this matter and I will be looking forward to hearing from you in the near future.

Dear Henry:

I fear very much that we are nearing the abrogation point in our basketball games. I can see the point you are making, namely, that our game does not have any bearing whatsoever on the sale of a student ticket. But, our athletic body feels that since they have been playing this game under this contract, that they are not willing to play without their share of student ticket income.

If anything had arisen which would make Kansas less of a drawing card in this series, then the reasoning on your part might be justifiable. On the other hand, this series of games has perhaps been the high light in this part of the country.

As Mr. Falkenstien wrote you, we play under this arrangement in our Big Six Conference and there are schools on our membership that pay us more than you have paid us on this arrangement. And, on the other hand, we pay them only the guarantee on account of the limited seating capacity that we have.

Yet, it is Kansas playing at their place and at your place that helps in making an attractive schedule. So, we do not feel but what we're entitled to a part of the student ticket income since we help in an attractive schedule at your place. It seems to us that it would be just as logical for Nebraska, Missouri, or Oklahoma to write us that they would be willing to pay us a cash flat guarantee, rather than to continue the agreement that they have been operating on.

Kansas has had a fairly respectable reputation in basketball for a number of years, yet, we did not endeavor to capitalize on that reputation when we brought our Sophomore team down to Stillwater to play you two games to open your field house. I'm sure that you could appreciate our position a bit in being willing to give rather than take in this matter.
