THE COACHES

Leonard D. Sachs-- Director of Athletics
Varsity Basketball Coach

* * * * *

Exactly 19 years ago Loyola University obtained the services of Leonard D. Sachs to coach the basketball team, basketball having been established as an inter-collegiate sport at that time. Today this same Coach Sachs can be found putting the modern version of the Ramblers through their paces. Since 1923 Loyola team have won 189 games while losing 109. This gives Loyola a win average of .635 and a lose average of .365, which is indeed a remarkable record considering the class of competition, and the quantity and caliber of the material that Sachs yearly molds into a winning combination. In 1923 the Ramblers had won 33 straight games before losing to Purdue and were recognized National Champions. Again in 1938 the Ramblers completed their regular season without a loss and had run their streak to 21 before losing to L.I.U. in the finals of the Metropolitan Sports Writers Tourney. All of this has been accomplished with material provided from the 450 students on the Lake Shore Campus. Coach Sachs being one of the earliest advocates of the pivot play and an authority on this type of play has produced the games greatest pivot men in Charlie "Feed" Murphy and Big Mike Novak. Coaching the U is not the only work that Sachs must find time for. He also coaches the Loyola Academy Football and Track teams and has been turning out Champions for them as well. His teams have won four football and five track championships since 1928 and yearly they are listed among the top contenders

for Championship honors. Coach Sachs, rated as one of the greatest strategists and players of his time, demands that his teams play hard, aggressive, smart ball. Thus we find the Ramblers of yesterday and today being rated among the nations best due chiefly to the ability, hard-work, and untiring individual attention of one man, Coach Leonard D. Sachs.

Wilbert "Wibs" Kautz Freshman Basketball Coach

The primary purpose of the Frosh team is to develop the men for future service with the Varsity. In order for the Frosh to be well trained in the fundamentals and intricacies of the Sach's system it is necessary that someone familiar with this type of ball Coach them. None is better qualified for this position than Wibs Kautz. Twice All-American, one of the leading scorers in the National Pro League, holder of the All time individual and three year Loyola high scoring record, Wibs starts his second year as Frosh Coach. Last years Frosh team, characterized by the hard drive and smart play that made Kautz himself one of the best, proved that besides being one of the games top players "Wibs" is fast becoming one of it's adept mentors.

WENSKUS, GEORGE-Capt. A Senior-hard driving-rugged-aggressive-Wink the only returning regular from the undefeated squad of '38-39, led the '39-40 squad in scoring with 178 points. Elected Captain as a Junior, George was again selected by his team-mates to lead the '40-41 Ramblers. An excellent shot- a clever ball handler-a quick thinker--a fine team man, all are reasons why Wink was selected at a Guard position on the Mythical All-Midwest team and the reasons for the prediction of a banner year and more honors for Wink.

GRAHAM, VINCENT--A Senior-One of last year's regulars and a member of the '38-39 squad--Combining exceptional jumping ability with natural basketball instinct, "Vee" plays any position, and although only 5'11" often jumps center. Besides being a two-letter man in Basketball he has won two Monograms in track where high jumping is his forte.

CAHILL, DANIEL--A Senior--A quick starter--an excellent rebounder--a one hand push shot artist. Dan a newcomer to the Sachs system one year ago, won a starting position by his quick response and natural ability. A years experience--a combination of natural ability and training-the result-- a dangerous threat to any Rambler foe.

LEE, EDWARD--A Senior--Steady-dependable--a good shot from any position--Ed a transfer student from St. Viator's readily took to the Sachs system and played a great deal of the time.--Though not

LEE, EDWARD--spectacular or flashy Ed can be depended upon to score when necessary.--He will certainly be called upon again when the going gets tough for the Ramblers.

ROTTNER, MARVIN--A Junior--Unorthodox--Shifty--Fast--Unpredictable--a great team man--"Mick" joined the team in Feb. and in spite of playing in only seven games ended fifth in team scoring with 80 points. Though not big Mick takes more than his share of both offensive and defensive rebounds and revels in breaking fast.

NEWCOMERS

DOUBLE, ARTHUR--A Soph--A fine defensive man--a deadly set shot--Art led last year's Frosh in scoring and will see a great deal of action during the '40-41 campaign while operating from a Forward position.

DURKIN, WILLIAM--A Soph--Tall--fast--good with either hand around the hoop--Bill will merit a great deal watching and will be seen carrying the brunt of the Rambler attack in the future.

PRIM, EDWARD--A Soph--small--speedy--the directing type--Ed is the thinker--From his Guard position he directs much of the offensive work of the team, and at the same time manages to be a constant scoring threat, due mainly to his set shot and fine left hand.

DWAN, JOHN--A Soph--tall--sleepy in appearance--Jack deceptively fast, shoots with either from any position --the more awkward the better--Jack is a truly great scorer--he will be eligible in January.

*The regular season was completed and Loyola had won 20 straight victories. Loyola then defeated St. John's and then lost to Long Island U in the finals of the New York Sport Writers Tournament at Madison Square Garden.

#Loyola was recognized National Intercollegiate Champions, 1929-30, during which season a successive winning streak was extended to 33 games before the team was defeated by Purdue.

Basketball was organized at Loyola as an intercollegiate sport in 1923, since that time Varsity Basketball has been Coached by Leonard D. Sachs. During that time Loyola has won 189 games against their opponents 109 and has scored 8878 points against their opponents 7560.

From the teams Coached by Len Sachs four men have been chosen on the All-American team. In 1929-30 Charlie (Feed) Murphy was unanimously chosen to the center position. In 1937 Loyola was again represented on the mythical All-American when Marv Colen was chosen to a Guard position and acclaimed as one of greatest to have ever played the game. Again in 1938-39 members of the Ramblers were selected on the All-American team. This time, however, not one but two men were chosen. "Wibs" Kautz and "Big" Mike Novak were both selected and it was agreed by the Sport Writers that neither one could be omitted and the team still be called All-American.

In his three years at Loyola "Wibs" Kautz broke the all time scoring record twice, once as a Junior when he scored 289 points to smash the old record of 219 lead by Marv Colen. Then again when a Senior he scored 341 points to break his own record. In his three years Wibs scored a total of 813 points for an all time Loyola High. The former record was 496 by Charlie "Feed" Murphy.

THE 1939-40 SEASON

Won 5, Lost 14! Written in the records as one of the most disastrous seasons in L.U.'s history, the 1939-40 season will probably go down as such. However, let's look a little deeper than the won and lost column. Loyola played 19 games and scored 656 points to their opponents 675. Thus Loyola was outscored by only 19 points, or an average of 1 point per game over the entire season and about $1\frac{1}{2}$ points per game lost. Playing one of the toughest schedules in it's history, the team, lacking heighth, reserves, and experience, turned in very creditable showings against major opponents. Of the six teams competing in the Metropolitan Sport's Writers Tourney, Loyola played four, along with Kansas U, finalist and winner of the National A.A.U. Championship, Butler, Rice, Oklahoma A & M, Southern Methodist, Carnegie, and many other top-notch teams. The Ramblers, combining a cautious, deliberate offence with an air tight defense played many of their opponents to a standstill, losing late in the game because of fatigue and lack of heighth. Playing this type of ball the Ramblers to their high scoring, intercity rival, De Paul--21 to 15. This was the lowest score ever rung up in the series and indicates the type of games that the Ramblers lost. So in view of the manner in which the games were played, we are forced to say that although this team will never be rated as L.U.'s greatest it will not go down as the poorest either, but rather an example of what hard work, spirit, and superb coaching can accomplish.

PROSPECTS FOR THE 1940-41 SEASON

Graduation was exceptionally kind to the Ramblers last year and claimed only one man, Frank Leahy. The entire team was slated to return again this year and Coach Sachs looked forward to one of the largest squads in many years. Now, however, the Rambler squad consists of only thirteen men, including eight Sophs.

The 1940-41 edition of the Ramblers will be pitched headlong into the toughest schedule that has confronted any team in recent years. The alumni are the first foe to threaten the Varsity and are followed in quick succession by Georgetown, Purdue, Yale, Kansas, Duquesne, Chicago, Temple, De Paul and many other traditionally strong teams. This array of talent has caused many a headache for Coach Sachs when he realizes that to oppose them he has a team built around five returning vets but as yet untested with regard to reserve strength. This is very serious as Coach Sachs realizes that basketball as it is played today requires many and adequate replacements if the team is to experience any degree of success. The team is not much taller than that team which last was referred to as the "Sachs" midgets and will again experience great difficulty against taller opponents. The individuals have worked rather hard, however, and have developed a high speed offense which should more than offset the height disadvantage that will be apparrent.

All in all the 1940-41 team although it may not win all of it's games will certainly better the record of the succeeding squad by many games. We can predict no definite victory or defeat, but each game will be played in turn and we hope to see the Ramblers win a majority of them.

Dear Doctor:

I have just had a long conference with Len Sachs, coach of Loyola University and he has asked me to communicate with you regarding a very serious problem with which we are confronted, in the hopes that you will be able to help us out in the matter. I feel that in discussing this with you very frankly, we will be able to obtain your assistance, as you have always been more than cooperative and courteous in the field of athletics.

DePaul University and Bradley University are both scheduled to meet their respective opponents in New York on January 24. They were scheduled to meet each other in Chicago on January 15 on the same night that Loyola plays Duquesne. DePaul and Bradley were advised by Mr. Irish that the Madison Square Gardens would be unavailable for basketball on the 24th, and consequently, the only open date remaining would be January 15, the date that they are scheduled to play each other in Chicago. Both DePaul and Bradley sought our cooperation in changing the January 15 game so as to permit them to make this trip to New York. In an effort to be cooperative with everyone concerned, I agreed to do so, providing

however, that by reason thereof, no inconvenience should be caused to Duquesne who was also scheduled to play on January 15 in Chicago. Inasmuch as DePaul and Bradley had a choice of either playing in New York on January 15 or not playing at all, there

was little else I could do except to rearrange my schedule to accommodate this new feature. Any new date would have to be a date proximate to January 15 in order to permit Duquesne to come to Chicago without added expense of any great amount. The only open date would be January 10 or 11, in other words, Duquesne is willing to play on January 10 or 11. We have been trying all this time to get another opponent for DePaul for that night, and have been unsuccessful.

It occurred to Mr. Sachs and myself that if we were to add \$200 to the guarantee already offered to you, you might find it possible to help us out of this dilemma by playing on January 10 or 11, instead of January 2. The January 2 date is much easier to fill than the January 10 or 11 date as there are four or five other universities that can only play on January 2.

I hope this is not all confusing to you, but the substance of the matter is that merely by playing in Chicago on the 10th or 11th, you will help everybody out of a very embarrassing spot which neither Mr. Sachs, the authorities, nor myself have any control over. I don't expect you to make this change if it will work any undue hardship on you.
