I wish to acknowledge receipt of the check from Jimmy Cox in the amount of \$3.33, and thank you very much.

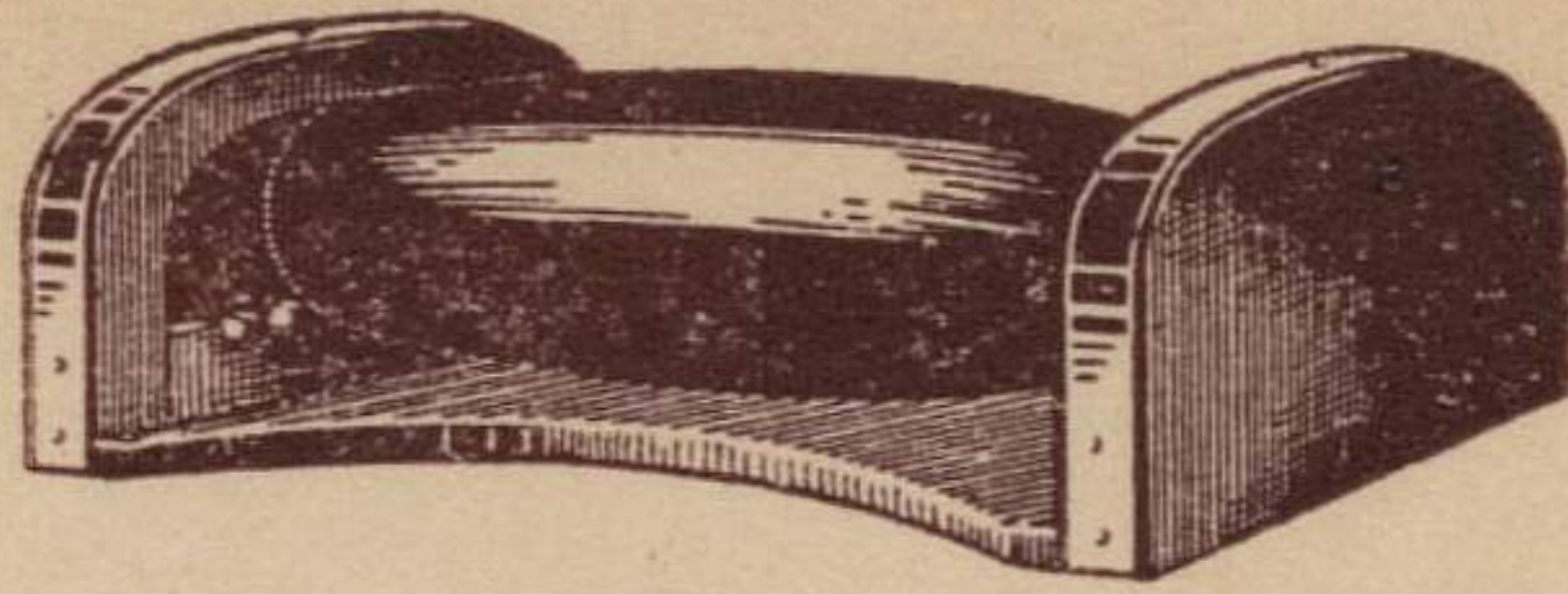


My dear Doctor Allen:

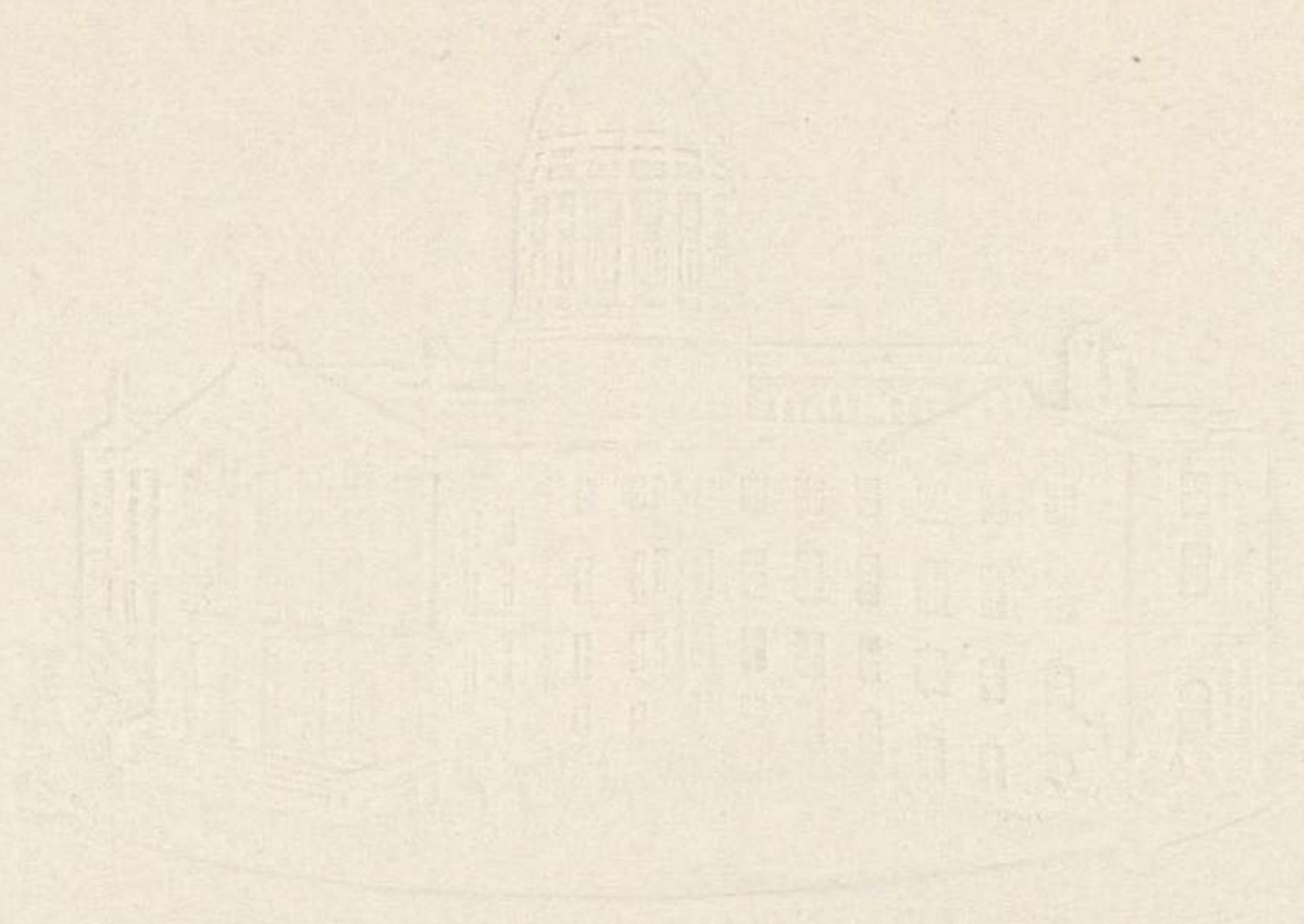
