




E. A. Thomas, of Topeka, appoints the officials for the Kansas Conference games, and selected the men who worked our game with Bethel College on December 18.

This season he has 15 assignments in the Central and Kansas Conferences, as well as a number of high school games. The early part of December he was one of the officials for the Kansas State-Doane College game at Manhattan.

Forrest C. Allen December 31, 1941 I went with him to this game, and had a nice visit with Mike Ahearn whom I had not seen since 1907. That year the Western Dental College team, of which I was a member, took a trip through Kansas, playing the Kansas Aggies, Fort Riley Soldiers, Bethany College, McPherson College, Sterling College, and the Newton Athletic Club. We won 5 of those 6 games, losing the last night to Newton, 25 to 20. In the Aggie game, on account of myself being a professional ball player at that time, Mike Ahearn, the coach, played with his team. "Great eligibility rules in those days." Digging a little deeper into "eligibility", I believe the focus could be thrown on you for if I remember correctly you coached as well as played with the Kansas City School of Osteopathy. 


