I thought that you would be interested in the attached circular which we have just prepared to send out in the May issue of our publication "The Coach".



I certainly enjoyed the Baseball course and thank you for the "B". I hope the summer program is running smoothly. Please give Dave Shirk my regards.

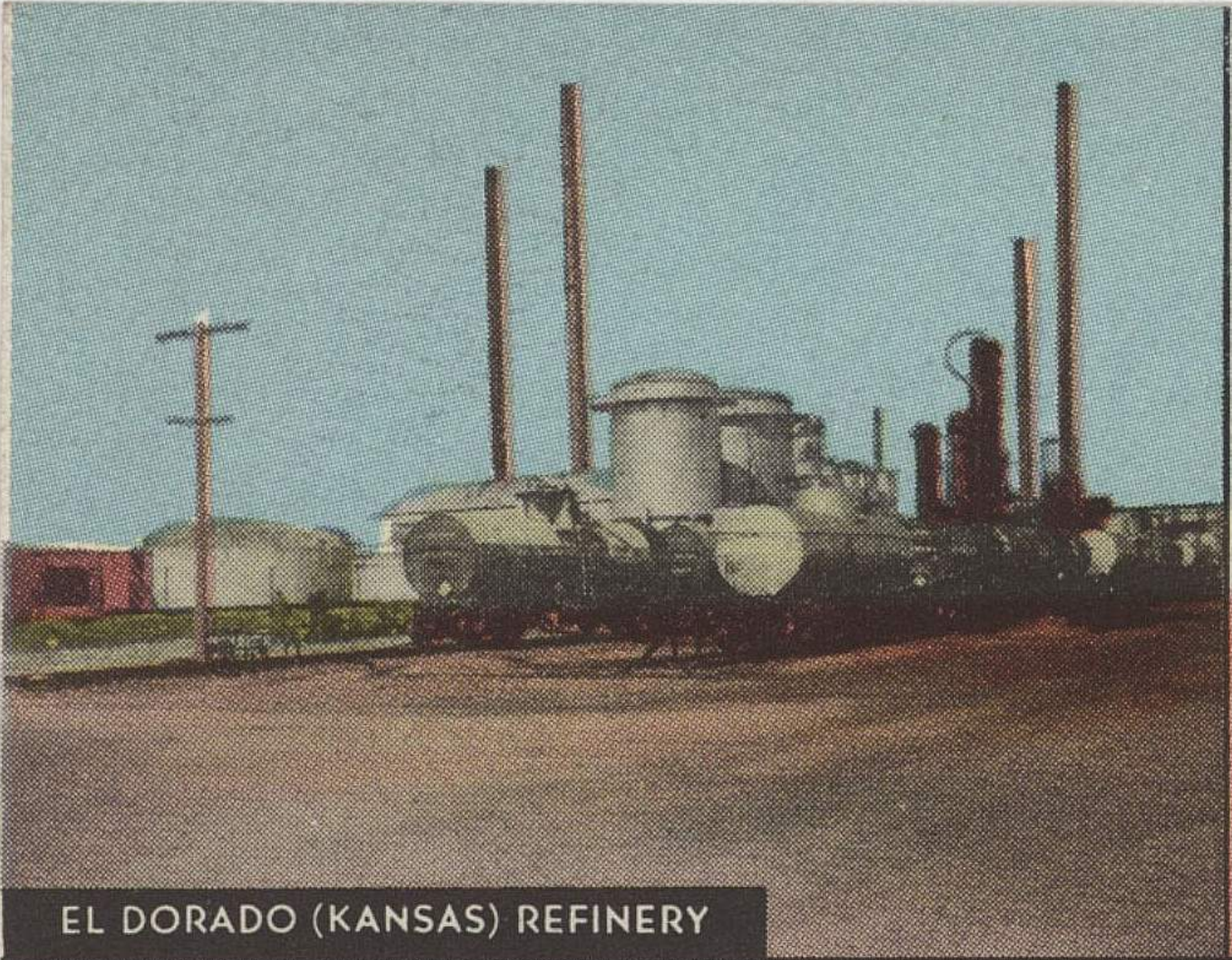


From the contents of your letter, it seems that unless we are able to get together some week end, it will be some time late in August before we can come to some understanding.
