Dear Private Morgan:

I would be very happy to send you the University of Kansas basketball record, but you did not state for how long a period. This data is rather difficult to obtain, but if you want the score of the University of Kansas vs. University of Indiana game I will be happy to send you that.

Kansas won the Western N.C.A.A. championship in 1940 by virtue of having won the Big Six championship and then playing the Oklahoma Aggies for the right to represent the Fifth District of the N.C.A.A., which is our district. Then we defeated Rice Institute, Southwestern champions, while Southern California defeated Colorado. Then Kansas defeated the University of Southern California, 42 to 41. for the Western championship.

In the eastern half, Purdue won the Big Ten championship, with Indiana second. However, the Fourth District of the N.C.A.A. selected Indiana to represent that area. In the play-off at Indianapolis, Indiana defeated Springfield, Mass., Y.M.C.A. College, and another team that I have forgotten at the moment. They came on to Kansas City and defeated Kansas for the national N.C.A.A. play-off, 60 to 42.

Indiana had one of the greatest teams that night that I have seen in action in a long time. There was certainly no desire to give them anything but the highest praise.

Kansas has only met two other Big Ten teams. In 1922 we played Minnesota at Minneapolis, defeating them 32 to 11. Minnesota went on then to win her next five Big Ten games. She finished either second or third in the conference. In 1942 Kansas defeated the University of Iowa, under Coach Rollie Williams, 54 to 52. Iowa did not lose a single Big Ten Conference game at home that year. I have forgotten shere she finished but it was close to the top.

Dear Corporal Moore:

I am sorry that I do not have the record of the western teams playing in the Garden in the east in 1940, '41, '42, '43, but with conservatism I would stake my reputation on saying that the western teams won over eighty per cent of their games played in the Garden and other eastern locations. In 1942 and '43 I believe they won ninety-five per cent of their games.

A sure way of finding out would be to address a letter to Ned Irish, President of Madison Square Garden, and ask him to give you the results of the games played by western teams in the east that were under his control. He has a chain of playing areas, such as Philadelphia, Buffalo, and the Garden. I believe he controls Hersyen, Pa., and one other location. But these are the main sites where the eastern teams play the western teams. You might tell him what you consider "western". I would consider it the western conference area, and on west.

I can assure you that if you are from Indiana you should never take a razzing from any of these fellows from New York. The only time any of those eastern teams have come west is when Nat Holman's CONY team went to Peoria, Illinois, to play Bradley Tech, and they were beaten by 66 to 27 or 37, and Clair Bee's Long Island University team went out to Denver to play in the AAU tournament a few years ago. He did not last long.

In the east you are forced to follow the type of officiating that is common to professional basketball, which is very different from the collegiate branch. I am safe in saying that if eastern teams came west and played under the collegiate rules or any rules that they would play by, they would be lucky to win thirty per cent of their games. The New York game is stereotyped and professional. The western teams are much more aggressive, progressive and versatile. I am not saying this because I am from the west. I have seen both teams, and that is my opinion, but the record still stands for itself.

Indiana has long been famous for its wonderful teams because basketball in Indiana is progressive.

Dear Dr. Allen:

About three months ago I was given some information by a certain resident of Boulder, Colorado, where for four years (1938-42) I taught in the University of Colorado. After being furnished this information, I wrote to two reiable persons at the University and received word from them that my informant had given me accurate statements. They concern assertions made by a certain woman in the Department of English at the University of Colorado.

First I should say that in March, 1942, this woman, according to a letter handed me by the Head of the Department of English, brought about my dismissal from that University by furnishing the charge that students tried to avoid being in my classes.

The information which I later received from Boulder, however, was that this woman asserted, late in 1943, that the real reason that I was let out was not that students avoided my classes but that I had been associated with immoralities while I was at the University of Kansas.

Naturally you will understnad that I have a reason for asking you, particularly, whether you can tell me anything more about this. I do not mean that the rumor was said to have come from your Department. I believe that it might be better for me not to be more specific just now, however.

I think that I should know of any statements that may have made the woman in Colorado feel free to make such an assertion. I think that there is no question of her personal hostility toward me. Still, had she nothing to "work on", I imagine that she would have connected me with a fiction in Colorado itself.

I know that I can trust you not to let this letter fall into anyone else's hands, and I would rather you would not mention the matter to "any living soul", no matter how sympathetic or friendly to me you may know a person to be.
