Dear Mr. Higgins:

I can understand fully the situation regarding the purchasing of the Goal-Hi rule books. The point that I made and still wish to make is that many of these boys in the service who should know the rules apparently do not get them. I imagine the rule books go to the officers' quarters and are not distributed down to the ensigns and chief specialists who teach the game.

For that reason many of these army and navy groups just get out and play shinny, so to speak. I can envisage what would happen if we just let a group scrimmage in basketball without anyone teaching them the rules. I believe this is a parallel illustration.

The fact that you get so many requests for rule books shows me that apparently your advertising is getting across the thought that this is a game and not just a piece of apparatus. I believe if in your advertising you continue to stress that it will still bear fruit.

Now, regarding the matter of providing basketball backstops with an adjustable feature that will permit the height of the basket to be changed. That also is a difficult problem to get action upon. I believe that this should wait until after the war because it depends upon the coaches and physical directors in the various high schools and junior high schools. Things are so unstable as regards the tenure of the people now in those jobs that I do not believe they would be interested in working on a project that is at the present uncertain. However, as you suggest, if I am in or through St. Louis I will certainly stop in and have a talk with you.

I would like to know more about Roy Weinzettel and Bill Robinson. Where are the boys and how are they doing?

This is in response to your recent letter to Mr. Banashek concerning the matter of Rules books for Goal-Hi.

We fully appreciate that we have not made the most of distributing Goal-Hi Rules books, however, we do propose to give Goal-Hi a real shot in the arm in the Advertising Program that we will launch immediately that we can determine when the "duration" is about to end and we will be privileged to go back to manufacturing our regular lines of equipment including Goal-Hi equipment. At the moment we have not too many Goal-Hi standards on hand and once they are gone there will be no more for the duration. This is one of the many items that we manufacture that can not be produced further according to the War Production Board restrictions.

We are doing a fairly good job of distributing Goal-Hi Rules books regardless of the fact that we do not have many of the outfits left on hand for sale. We never fail to get a half dozen to a dozen requests for rules books each day and of course each and every one of those requests is answered promptly and the Rules book is furnished without charge. As a matter of fact any requests that we receive from dealers is answered without costs and dealers are advised that there is no charge for this book. We doubt very much that any of the dealers are charging the \$1.00 amount that we originally advertised, which some dealers still mention in their catalogue.

Incidentally, Dr. Allen, we have not heard a great deal lately as concerns the matter of providing basketball backstops with an adjustable feature that will permit height of the baskets to be changed depending on the classification of the players involved. Will you be so kind as to give us at your convenience latest information concerning this matter and if perchance you should be either in St. Louis or passing through St. Louis in the near future by all means drop in and see us.

Dear Mr. Banashek:

I am writing you regarding Goal-Hi. In many of the advertising spaces for Goal-Hi, in Lowe & Campbell's catalog, and the R. S. Elliott Arms catalog, I note a lack of emphasis on the rules. In the Lowe & Campbell booklet it states that the Goal-Hi rules are for sale for \$1.00 and given free with each Goal-Hi standard purchased. But if sold separately they sell for \$1.00.

I do not know how to get this across, but I believe more of an emphasis should be placed on the rules. Here is the reason I am making the point. We have a lot of chief specialists here with our Naval unit. None of them seem to know much about the rules, nor do they seem to take much of an interest in the game because they have no knowledge of the rules. They just put one of the standards out and let the boys mill around the basket. If something could be said - more than is said - regarding the necessity of emphasizing the rules, I believe the game would continue to attract an even larger following.

Many people who have purchased these Goal-Hi standards write in and want to get copies of the rules. The people who unpack the Goal-Hi apparently do not attach enough significance to the enclosed rules to see that the proper people get them. I am opening up this point, trusting that you can enlighten me as to how these rules are distributed and emphasized. I trust that you see my point.



Dear Doctor Allen:

I was happy to receive your letter on the basketball tournament and to note your interest in the event.

The question of transportation (and also hotels in this war-jammed town) has been in my mind quite a bit as we started feeling our way along on this year's tournament. However, I have about decided to hold the field to eight teams-- none from any staggering distance--- which will cut down the travel requirements considerably.

With the smaller field, it is vital that we have the best possible field--- and what would appeal more to Oklahoma City fans than Oklahoma, Oklahoma Aggies and Kansas? The rest of the field probably would come from the Southwest conference, with perhaps one service team entered.

The fans here have been used to morning, afternoon and night sessions with 16 teams (we even had 18 year before last) but I believe the reduction to eight top notch teams would be even more appealing and that Sooner-Aggie-Jayhawk rivalry should whet the appetite of even the most discriminating fan.

Basketball squads being comparatively small and the distance from Lawrence here not excessive I can't see how you would be criticized for travelling to a tournament where your boys could get so much good experience in such a short time. The Santa Fe's streamliner, which is an all-chair car train, would deliver you in here on Sunday night before the tournament and back in Lawrence the following Thursday afternoon, if you wanted to shave the time that closely.

The question of the navy's 48-hour rule comes up naturally. With Oklahoma, it won't make any difference since they will be able to get back ~~home~~ home each night, if need be. The only other coach with whom I have had any correspondence on that rule, is Joe Davis of Rice. He said that he had talked with a couple of his boys and that they were anxious to give up part of their Christmas leave in order to

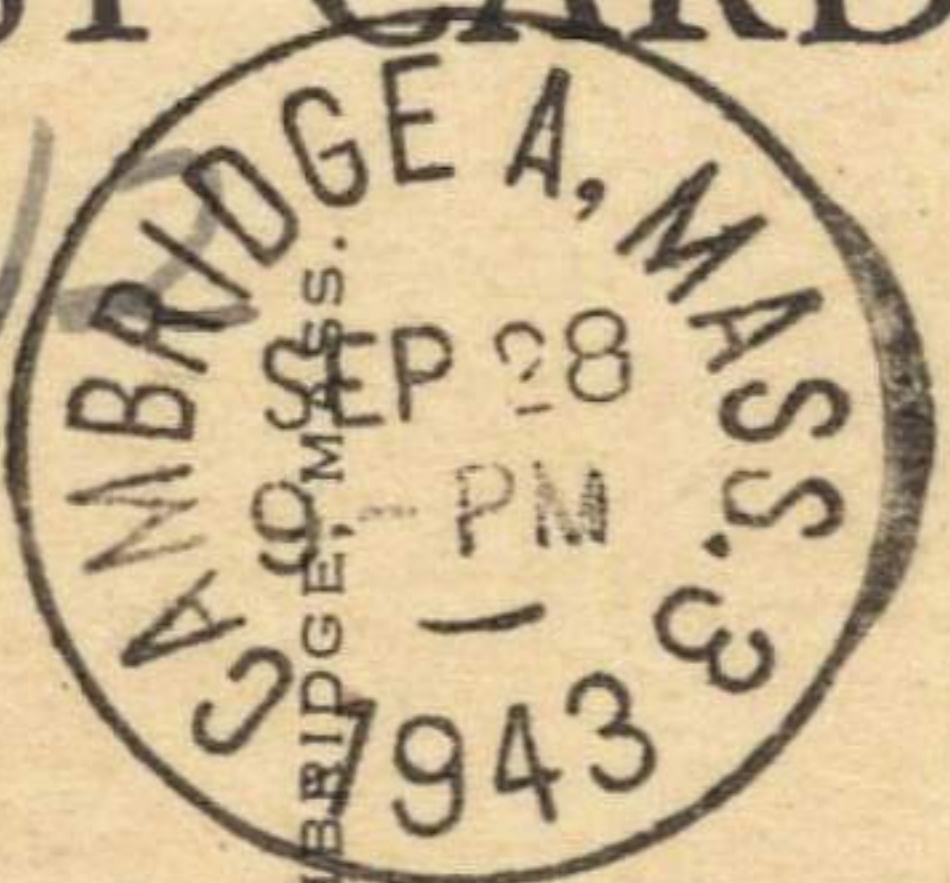

Your good letter of the 4th instant just received and I am hastening a reply so that it will be in your hands before Saturday morning.

I am writing you confidentially to let you know that while I would like to take care of you in the way that would be pleasing to me, I am afraid that the set up here is not conducive to that. After Gwinn Henry resigned the Chancellor appointed Karl Kleoz, the University bursar, as athletic director. Karl watches the University pennies quite assiduously, and a complimentary ticket, in his opinion, is only to be placed in the Smithsonian Institute as a relic.

Of course, men in the service are given a special price of fifty cents for unreserved seats. That is on the east side, and frankly they are every bit as good as the \$2.25 seats on the west side. The seats are \$2.25 a piece. The time of the kick-off is 2:30 p.m.

Frankly, Red, I would take the fifty cents seats and enjoy it. Won't you please drop me a line and let me know so that I can release the tickets to Earl Falkenstien or tell him that you desire them. I will make it a point to say hello to you as soon as I get your letter and know your location. If you are on the east side I will come over and extend greetings to the Markleys and to the Roberts. It will be a pleasure to see all four of you. I assure you if there was any way I could have you as my guests I would do so.


Dear Doctor Allen:

Dear Dr. Allen:

Certainly enjoyed the copy of Jayhawk Rebounds you sent. Since I got in the Navy I have pretty much lost touch with my old friends, and "Rebounds" contained a lot of dope that was interesting to me concerning the boys I used to have so much fun being around.

The day is growing nearer when I will be going to sea and my only regret is that it still is a couple of months away. I would grab at the chance to sail tomorrow.

I am now starting the 5th month of a 6 months course which officers go through at Harvard to fit themselves for sea duty as Communications officers. That is, you don't necessarily get sea duty when you finish here, but

at least you are qualified for it.

However, after being in the Navy for 17 months, I won't see duty the worst way. If I don't get it when I finish here I am going to make myself so obnoxious that they'll be glad to send me to sea to get rid of me.

After spending my first 6 months in the Navy in Public Relations, I switched over to Communications and was in the latter office at Great Lakes for 7 months.

However, there were a number of things about ship board Communications I didn't have any opportunity to learn at Great Lakes, so I put in for this school at Harvard. Have been here since May 1.

Even with my background in Communications at Great Lakes, there has been a world of things to learn up here. Everyone greets the weekend with open arms when it finally rolls around. We get off Saturday evening

at 5 o'clock and then are due back
by 7:50 Monday morning.

I am duly impressed by Harvard's
ancientness, but can't say much

I live in, Hollis House, was built

situation making everything so uncertain,
the last thing I ever expected to
