Of course I consider this a rather flimsy excuse, but I can pretty well assure you that we drove home the point to the young man and I don't believe you will have any more trouble with class-cutting by Charles.

Mrs. Black and I have conferred together a number of times regarding Charles' temporary inconsistencies, but I am happy to say that I definitely feel that Charles will make a grand man after he faces the responsibilities of a more serious life.

Again I want to thank you and assure you that I will enthusiastically cooperate in having him get out of college the most important things.
