

CHRIST OF THE ANDES

"Sooner shall these mountains crumble into dust than the peoples of Argentina and Chile break the peace which at the feet of Christ the Redeemer they have sworn to maintain."

So reads the inscription on a 20-feet-high granite pedestal carrying the impressive statue "Christ of the Andes", erected in 1904 as a symbol of everlasting peace. It stands a short distance south of the snowy peak of Aconcagua, above La Cumbre Pass, on the frontier between Argentina and Chile, to mark the end of a dispute between these two nations which had lasted over half a century. Cast from the bronze of guns removed from frontier fortresses and melted down in the Arsenal at Buenos Aires, the statue was taken by train as far as the rails were laid; then drawn on gun carriages by mules to the summit, and where even mules failed at the ascent, soldiers and sailors of both governments dragged it up with ropes to its 13,000 foot site on the mountain top.



Dear Phog:-

I have such a time trying to reach you when you are nt busy that I am going to answer your letter regarding the proposed basketball program by letter. At the same time, I would like to ask for an opportunity to talk to you at the first moment you have in order to more fully cover the situation. You name the time and I will be there, either during business hours or later.

I tried to reach you by phone several times during December in order to go over the proposition as I had run into some snags and also the fact that everything that had to be done was apparently dumped on my doorstep. In trying to keep up with my own business together with my affairs in Tulsa and also the job of winding up the year, the program was sidetracked and it was humanly impossible for me to do otherwise.

God knows that I hate alibis and I rarely resort to them but in this case I will have to run the risk of your thinking that is the case. However, there is noone in Lawrence who has given more in time or money than I have to help the athletic situation. I have never made any effort to capitalize on this and there are few people who know anything about it except those who have had close contact with the Relay Club. There comes a time however when you just run out of time to devote to these things and that is my situation.

I feel that you are aware of my loyalty to you, there has never been a time when I would'nt and did'nt say you had brought more favorable attention and had meant more to the K.U.Athletic dept.than all the rest of the coaches, managers, boards and what have you put together. I think you will also realize that in making such a broad statement, I have had to defend myself verbally and even physically from some of the wolves

who unfortunately infest this part of Kansas.

In order that you won't get the wrong impression from this letter, I did not get the idea from yours that you were blaming me solely or implying that I had fallen down on you. It amounts to that but I realize that the community as a whole has drifted away from supporting athletics and that our merchants won't give the financial aid that they have always accorded the teams at Manhattan.

The reason for this is beyond me, I have spent many weary hours on Mass. St. soliciting advertising, direct gifts and selling tickets and I know as well as anyone that they just won't come through as they should. It must be the result of a gradual lessening of interest in Athletics and a consequent turing to some other form of amusement.

Well, this is taking up too much of your time but please set aside a few minutes sometime during the next few days and I will gladly go over the situation with you. I know exactly how you feel and I agree with you 100 percent. I also am willing to do my full share in anything that concerns your team and wo uld gladly do it but I just can't undertake the sole responsibility of this program.
