Dear General:

Thank you so much for sending me the clipping from the Topeka Capital of August 28, 1938. It was nice of you to take the time and trouble. I would have missed it, although I had heard about it. To have a friend as busy as you are to send it to me - well, that is service plus friendship, and I want you to know that I appreciate it.

I just want to say some things to you so that after you glance back over the article you can see why some of the statements are at variance with the information that has come to me. Regarding Bunn saying that he was criticized last fall in the Ralph Miller case, I just want you to know that Harold Miller, Ralph's father, told me that John Bunn personally paid Ralph's tuition. I was in the office of the Sunshine Mantle Company at Chanute, Kansas, talking to Bill Gray and Harold Miller about Ralph coming to K. U., and I told them that we had to pay Jane's application tuition in May or else the application would not be considered, and Harold Miller told me then that John Bunn paid Ralph's personally.

"Well", Butts said, "if you could get all your expenses paid and still make some money on the side you would go to Stanford, wouldn't you?" And Ralph said, "I don't know." And then he said, "You would be interested, wouldn't you?" And Ralph said, "I might."

And then it was Butts who arranged to pay for the airplane trip to California. Now here is the joke - if Bunn furnished the money for the trip, then when Ralph rode back with John Bunn in Bunn's own car -- Bunn came in for this basketball picture that was to be shot with Keegan of Notre Dame, McMillan of Minnesota, Bee of Long Island, Carlson of Pittsburgh, and Allen of Kansas -- and when Miller told Bunn at Chanute in my presence that he was going to stay here, why did John Bunn write Harold Miller and insist on a refund from Ralph on the return trip ticket that he would have used had he not come back with Bunn?
