12. The time shall be two 15-minute halves, five minutes between.

13. The side making the most goals shall be the winner. In case of a draw, the game may, by agreement of captains, be continued until another goal is made.

The original rules have survived remarkably well the impact of the years.

"The happiest moment of my life", Dr. Naismith said, "came in 1936", when he attended the Olympic games in Berlin and saw the game of basketball played for the first time in the international Olympic competition. The "Father of Basketball" was sent to Berlin following a drive ^{for funds} sponsored by the National Association of Basketball Coaches among spectators, officials and players who wanted to have Dr. Naismith present when the teams of all nations filed in behind ^{their respective} flags of their country. Dr. Naismith addressed the assembled players before the start of the tournament and ~~he~~ ^{in so doing} admitted that his eyes were misty.
