Dear Mr. Nettels:

Dr. Allen read your letter of June 24 before he left the office, and asked me to tell you that he will write you very soon.

As a member of the local Draft Board, it has been Dr. Allen's observation that after a boy becomes 18 years of age it is usually six months before he is inducted. The policy of the board at Pittsburg might be different, however.

Dr. Laurence Woodruff, the Registrar, offers the following suggestion. If a boy is called for induction before the end of a semester he is eligible for fee refunds and credit according to the amount of work completed. It is his experience that it takes a minimum of sixty days after a boy reaches 18, before he is inducted, and quite often the time is ninety days.

Since the regular sixteen-weeks semester, beginning July 3rd, ends on October 21, Dr. Woodruff feels it is highly probable that George Timmons would be able to complete the semester.

I am sure that Dr. Allen will write you in a few days.
