

Dear Dr. Allen:

When we sell out our present stock of Goal-Hi's, we will be unable to manufacture any more. In fact, I am right now greatly concerned about the possibility of a freeze order (M-126) which would prohibit the sale of Goal-Hi's as it has many of the other things we make. At the moment, I know if I asked whether they were included the answer would be yes and we would be through, and someone else is very likely to raise that question with W.P.B.

I think I have an opportunity to sell in one lot all of the Goal-Hi's we have left, but to complete this transaction I will have to make a very close price to a dealer who would then be assuming the risk of having this item frozen by inclusion under the M-126 order, and I am very much inclined to move these units now, retaining only a few hundred Goal-Hi's for shipment during the next few months to important customers.

My thought in writing you is to suggest that you cooperate to the extent of taking a little cut in your royalty. I think I will have approximately one thousand Goal-Hi's to dispose of in such a deal as I suggest, and it would be my idea to give you a lump royalty payment of \$750.00, as I will have to sell these under \$20.00 to make the deal.

If this is agreeable to you, I suggest that you wire your approval as I do not want to let this deal get cold.

The book sells for \$1.00, but I am asking them to send you a copy with my compliments. You may feel free to make copies of the rules if you wish.

Yes, we are in the midst of preparation for our basketball season. I am sending you a schedule of our games. Tonight as a part of the homecoming program we are having the Varsity-Frosh game in Hoch Auditorium. I believe this will be a big attraction because so many people are interested in seeing these two groups in action.

Bob and Eleanor are in school at the University of Pennsylvania, and Bob is extremely busy with his medical work. He goes to school from 8 o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the afternoon. While Bob has had some offers to coach basketball he is not doing any of that this year. He felt he should get more firmly settled in his school work before attempting any coaching.

Milton, my older son, who is a senior in the Law School and president of his class, is assisting me with the freshmen this year. He is doing a fine job.

We shall miss you and Mrs. Garrison and Dean at our games this winter, but I am sure you are having a most interesting time in South America.

Dear Coach Allen:

You may be surprised to hear from me in this far away country. But when the chance came to me to come down here in educational work I could not pass it up. I am now learning the Spanish language and have been since we arrived late in July. I will be director of the Colegia Americano when the new year begins late in January. This college takes the student thru about the same amount of work as does the junior college in the states. The students are the pick of the population because there is no mass education or compulsory in this country. The present school year will be over shortly after the middle of this month. Then there will be a vacation until late in January when the new term will begin. We have about 500 students in our college.

I am writing particularly to ask if you will give me some information about your invention called "Goal-Hi". If there is a book or pamphlet of rules for it I should like to have it and I shall be glad to pay you for it. I should like to know the rules of the game, the number of players, the height of the goal from the ground, its diameter, the number of braces from the rim of the goal to the pole, the diameter of the circles at the base of the goal and any other information pertinent to it. We shall probably have to make the goal or have it made because if we bought it new and had it shipped from the states the duty would be so high that it might be prohibitive. I will be glad to pay for any information you may be able and willing to give me. These young people are hungry for games because this is an adult world in this country. There has been no time given to amusements of any kind for children until recently. Even now children under 15 are barred from the 6:15 and the 9:15 p.m. movies. They are allowed to attend only the matinees at 3:15 p.m.

This city in which we live is the capitol of Colombia and has about the same population as Kansas City, Mo. though it is more concentrated as are European cities. There are more than 20 picture shows in the city and most of them show Hollywood productions. Rarely is a picture produced in Mexico or Argentina shown. Since all Hollywood sound films are in English the translation in Spanish is flashed on the screen at the bottom of the picture. We have had several late pictures here from Hollywood. Since we are about 9,000 feet above sea level the temperature does not go above 65 degrees F. though this is a tropical country. The low temperature never is below the 50 degree mark. We wear winter clothes the year round and hence do not need heat in our homes. Temperature is determined here almost entirely by altitude though we are only a little more than 4 degrees from the equator.

No doubt, you are in the middle of pre-season basket ball practice. I hope you have a good team and a satisfactory season. How I would like to see some of your games this year! I note that Ralph Miller is playing football this fall. I hope that he is at his best for basket ball this winter. You will miss your son, Bob and Engleman in your line up but you will have two good boys from Kansas City, Kansas I believe.

How is Bobma making it in the east? He is to coach basket ball while attending medical school I have understood. I'll wager
