## The Jayhawk Coach

Dr. Forrest C. Allen

The dean of basketball coaches in the United States, Dr. Forrest C. (Phog) Allen of the University of Kansas, embarks on his thirtieth campaign this winter. His record is 22 conference championships in 29 years of coaching.

Allen played his high school basketball at Independence, Mo. and it was there that he first met Dr. James Naismith, inventor of the game of basketball, who was coach at K.U. at that time.

In 1904 Dr. Allen entered the University of Kansas. During his college career, he lettered in basketball in 1905, 1906 and 1907 and in baseball in 1906 and 1907.

The following year, 1908, saw Allen off to a successful start as a coach, with a championship basketball team at K.U. His second Jayhawk team made even a better record in winning another championship the next year, marking up ten conference victories to two defeats.

The same season, Dr. Allen was coaching the Haskell Indian "National Aboriginal" team which won 19 of 24 games and the cage team of Baker University, twenty miles away.

This concluded Allen's coaching efforts for three years, while he pursued the study of medicine. In 1912 he became coach of all sports at Missouri State Teachers College at Warrensburg and his service as a coach has been continuous from that date.

In his first year at Warrensburg, Dr. Allen's football, basketball and baseball teams were undefeated and the basketball team started a series of championships which was unbroken during his seven years there.

In the fall of 1919 he became director of athletics at the University of Kansas, and before the basketball season was over was coaching that sport. Missouri was dominant in basketball at that time, but by 1922 the youthful Jayhawk mentor had brought Kansas up to a tie with the Tigers, each team losing a single game of the 16 game conference schedule.

The remaining six seasons of the old Missouri Valley conference yielded Kansas five championships; the one in 1923 without a defeat. This season was notable, also, as being in the midst of a winning streak of 34 consecutive conference games, ended finally by Oklahoma, which in 1928 moved into championship position.

Oklahoma carried over its winning ways into the Big Six conference and held the leadership in 1929; Missouri won the next year; then Kansas, under Dr. Allen, swept the next four years. The 1935 championship went to Iowa State, coached by Louis Menze, a pupil of Dr. Allen's at Warrensburg.

In 1936 the Jayhawks blazed through their regular schedule without defeat, winning eighteen consecutive games. In the regional Olympic tryouts Kansas defeated Washburn and Oklahoma A. & M. to qualify for the semi-final eliminations.

In that series of games the Jayhawks played Utah State and won the first game, but at a great cost. Francis Kappelman, all-conference guard, suffered a deep cut across his knee when he ran into a wire supporting one of the goals and was lost to the team. Without him Kansas could not keep pace with the sensational shooting of the Utah State team.

In 1937 Kansas and Nebraska tied for the Big Six championship and in 1938 the Jayhawks were undisputed champions. Last year Kansas finished third behind the co-champions, Oklahoma and Missouri.

ALLEN, ROBERT- center- 20 -home, Lawrence; graduate of Lawrence high school, 1937; coached by Edd Wood. Youngest son of Coach Forrest C. Allen. Has been playing basketball since his kindergarten days. A fine ball handler and all-around player. Holds down the "quarterback" position which his brother Milton played in 1935 and 1936. Played guard, center and forward in high school. Good man on defense. Runs the team on offense and does his share of the scoring. A junior.

FRILING, DONALD- forward- 21 -home, Lindsborg; graduate of Lindsborg high school, 1936; prepped by Coach O.C. Ostenberg. Brother of Ray Ebling, Kansas' All-American forward who graduated in 1936. After a mediocre freshman year, battled his way into a first string forward berth on the 1938 championship team. Was in pretty much of a slump last year. Good on set shots and an excellent free thrower. A very good rebound man for his size. Makes up for lack of height with worlds of fight.

ENGLEMAN, HOWARD- forward- 19 -home, Arkansas City; graduate of Arkansas City high school, 1937; played under Coach Everett Nicholson. A sensation on the 1938 Jayhawk freshman team. An excellent scorer last year as a sophomore. Finished in the first ten of the Big Six scoring leaders last winter. Set a new K.U. individual scoring record for one game when he chalked up 27 points against Oklahoma here last year. Almost impossible to guard around the basket. A junior.

HARP, RICHARD- Guard- 21 -home, Kansas City, Kan.; graduate of Rosedale high school in Kansas City, 1936; coached by Roscoe Brown. A great guard as a sophomore at K.U. Went into a slump last year. His work on defense fell down and his shooting was off. Appears to be back in stride now. If he plays as well as he appears capable of playing, he should rank high nationally among college defense men. At his best, he is a brilliant defensive player and a deadly accurate long shot.

HOGBEN, WILLIAM- guard- 19 -home, Kansas City, Mo.; graduate of Southwest high school in Kansas City, 1937; coached by Mel Bishop. Played frequently during the first semester last year and then was lost to the team because of scholastic ineligibility during the second term. Would have lettered had it not been for this. A smooth guard. Was in the starting lineup at guard in the second game of the season this winter.

HUNTER, T.P.- forward or guard- 22 -home, Oklahoma City, Okla. Graduate of Central high school in Oklahoma City, 1937; coached by Clarence Breithaupt. Was a member of the Jayhawks' crack freshman team in 1938. Scholastically ineligible for varsity competition the first semester last year and did not see any action the second semester. A lanky boy.

JOHNSON, ROBERT- forward- 19 -home, Kansas City, Kan.; graduate of Shawnee Mission high school at Merriam, 1938; played under Coach Harold Reade. The best prospect in an unusually weak sophomore crop. May not see much action this winter because of the number of veterans available, but will be valuable in the next few years. Looks like the old Jayhawk star, Fred Pralle, and has the same driving spirit.



KLINE, JOHN- guard- 20 -home, Hutchinson; graduate of Hutchinson high school, 1936; prepped by Coach "Chop" Cairns. Attended Hutchinson Junior College a year after graduating from Hutchinson high. One of the few tall, rugged men on the squad this winter. Was valuable last year as a rebound man. Takes the ball off the backboard well. Is used to guard giants on opposing teams. A real scrapper under the basket. Not an especially good scorer, but makes some timely baskets.

MILLER, RALPH- forward- 20 -home, Chanute; graduate of Chanute high school, 1937; played under Coaches Dale Skelton and Tony Lockyear. One of the two greatest high school basketball players ever developed in the state of Kansas. "Red" DeBernardi the only one whose record compares with Miller's. Averaged 19.8 points a game during his three years of high school competition. Is equally adept at every phase of the game, ball handling, shooting, guarding and passing. Missed about half of the season last year due to a "football knee". Still bothered by it.

REID, BRUCE- forward- 21 -home, Arkansas City; graduate of Arkansas City high school, 1936; coached by Everett Nicholson. The trickiest ball handler on the squad. Not an exceptional scorer, but good around the basket. Also can play the center or "quarterback" position. Valuable as a feeder for the sharp shooters on the team. Has been in the starting lineup off and on during his college competition. A senior.

SANDS, JACK- center- 20 -home, Lawrence; graduate of Erie high school, 1936; coached by Adam Kahler and Babe Lewis. Played a year at Parsons Junior College after starring at Erie high. Is a clever ball handler. Is left handed, which makes his passing the more deceptive. A fair scorer, with one hand shots his most accurate means of scoring. Lettered last year in both basketball and baseball.

VORAN, BRUCE- guard or forward- 21 -home, Pretty Prairie; graduate of Pretty Prairie high school, 1936; played under Coach Walter Graber. Captain of the Pretty Prairie high team that won the state Class B championship in 1936. Lost a year of competition at K.U. when he suffered a burn on his leg prior to the 1938 season. A remarkable rebounder for his size. A brilliant guard on defense; sticks to his man like a leech. Has a good left hand hook shot and is effective around the basket.
