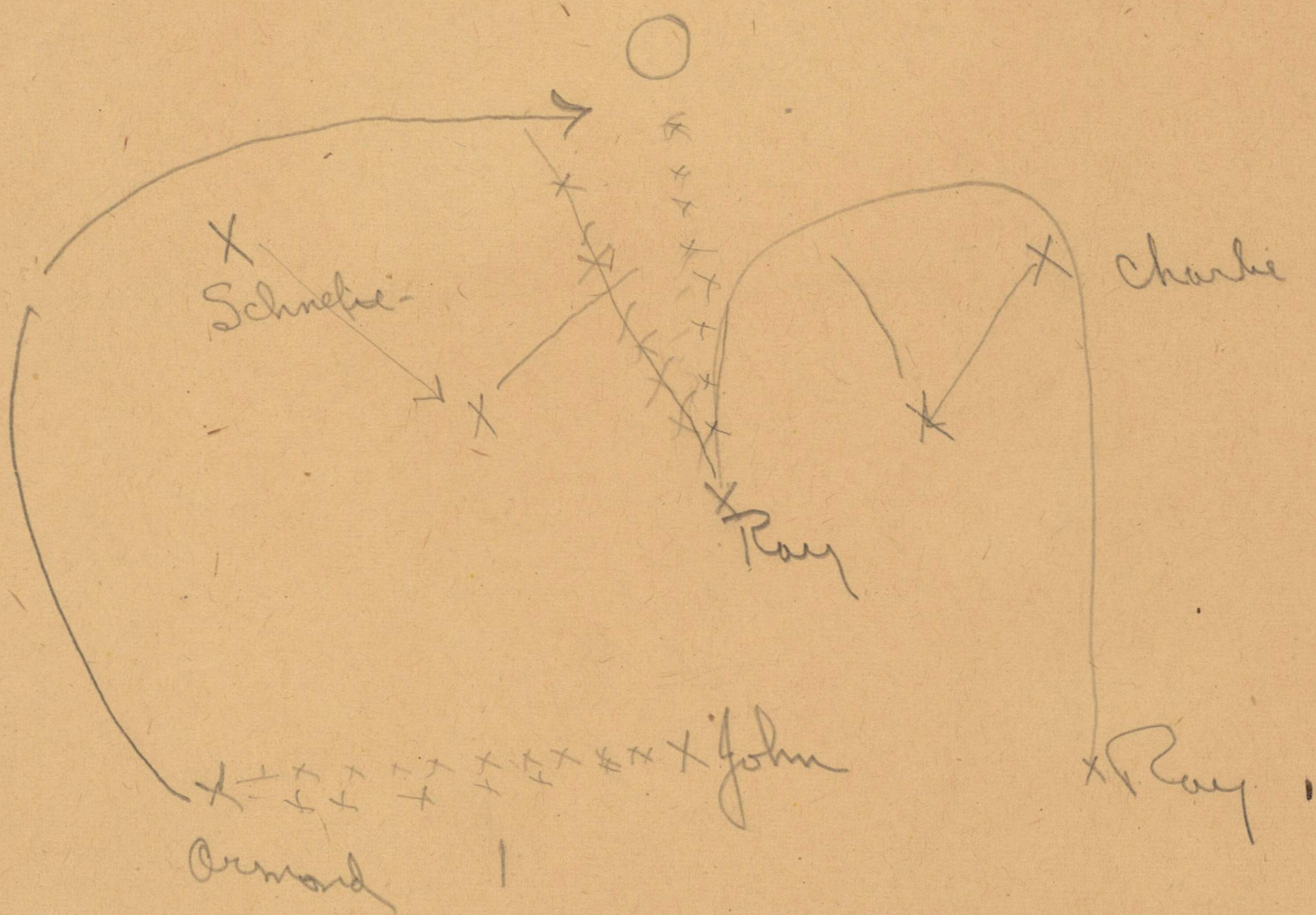

#### I. Cor. 12:12-31

For as the body is one and hath many members and all the members of that one body being many are one body, so also have Christ. For by one spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free and have been all made to drink into one spirit. For the body is not one member but many. If the foot shall say, Because I am not the hand, I am not of the body, is it therefore not of the body? And if the ear shall say, Because I am not the eye, I am not of the body, is it therefore not of the body? If the whole body were an eye, where were the hearing? If the whole were hearing, where were the smelling? But not hath God set the members every one of them in the body and it hath pleased Him, and if they were all one member where were the body? But now are they many members, yet but one body. And the eye cannot say unto the hand, I have no need of thee, nor again, the head to the feet, I have no need of you. Nay, much more those members of the body which seem to



be more feeble are necessary, and those members of the body which we think to be less honorable upon thee we bestow more abundant honor, and our uncomely heart have more abundant comeliness. For our comely parts have no need that God hath tempered the body together having given more abundant honor to that part which lacks. That there should be no schism in the body but that the members should have the same care one for another, and whether one member suffer all the members suffer with it, or one member being honored all the members rejoice with it. Now, ye are the bodies of Christ and members in particular, and God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondly prophets, thirdly teachers; after that miracles, then gifts of healing, health, government, diversities of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Are all workers of miracles? Have all the gifts of healing? Do all speak the tongues? Do all interpret? 



We realize how many demands there are on your time and money. I have refused to take the chairmanship of many worthwhile activities this year because of my reticence in asking you to give for any cause.






