Dear Ray:

Thank you for your good letter of the first instant. I realize that basketball interest will have sagged by the time of the Central District Physical Education meeting, but at least it will be a good opportunity for me to get away from the business of basketball and I will have a chance to have a visit with you for a short while, at least.

I am terribly sorry regarding Mrs. Parkins. You certainly have been a grand, swell fellow with all of your troubles. I know just how much it means when the helpmate of the household is ill. If it were not for your old up and coming morale, Ray, you just couldn't do it, but you have got the stuff.

We are all well, thank you. Of course, Mrs. Allen feels that she isn't in the best of health, but she has had two of the best physicians give her a thorough physical examination and they can't find anything wrong with her. I think she is just tired and needs a rest. It is a strenuous job raising a family.

Jane is at Stanford getting her second degree out there, and Milton is with the Stanolind, which is a subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company, at Russell, Kansas. They have a young baby girl, Judith, not a month old yet. Milton is expecting to be transferred to the Standard Oil Company in the very near future. He has had about four years experience now, from filling station attendant to hustler and roustabout in the oil fields, and I think he is due for something very much better. Now, Ray, I imagine you at Edison are just like I am here at Kansas - regardless of what you have got, they expect you to win. We have some fine boys, but they are not the stuff in the physical way that Nebraska and Oklahoma, or even Kansas State, have. Missouri has a nice outfit and they will deal somebody a lot of woe. So you see it is either up to us to win down at Norman or take second fiddle. That is a pretty tough assignment, and anything might happen. We might be beaten badly, and we might eke out a win.

It looks like Dave McMillan is having a tough go of it. And Dutch Lonborg, the dark horse, is really coming through.

To Members,
National Basketball Committee:

At long last the announcement relative to the place of meeting for the National Committee may be announced. The secretary disclaims all responsibility for the delay in this announcement. On the deadline date of February 4th there was a clear plurality in favor of Chicago as a place of meeting but the secretary did not feel that he had authority to announce a decision as long as there was not a majority vote. Consequently follow-up letters were sent to those members who had not voted by February 4th. The last vote came in today. The result of the vote is as follows:

IN FAVOR OF CHICAGO: F. C. Allen, John Bunn, M. C. Cunningham, Sumner A. Dole,

IN FAVOR OF NEW YORK: John Brown, Curtis Parker, Samuel Rogers, J. W. St. Clair,
L. W. St. John, H. H. Salmon, Jr., Oswald Tower,

J. H. Crocker is on an extended trip in Australia and could not be reached.

On the basis of this vote, it seems clear that the meeting will be held in Chicago.

With respect to the time of the meeting there is not a majority vote. Six members favor April 5th and 6th. Four favor April 6th and 7th on the grounds that those who attend the Tuesday afternoon session of the coaches' meeting will be considerably hurried if they attend the rules meeting on the same night. The remainder of the committee did not vote or else voted for April 8th and 9th on the assumption that the meeting would be held at some distance from Chicago.

Since there is no especial reason for a hasty decision relative to the actual dates, the secretary is asking for another expression of opinion as to whether the meeting should be held on April 5th and 6th or on April 6th and 7th. A post card is enclosed for this purpose. It is hoped that those members who did not have the price of a stamp for the other vote will be more prompt this time.

The annual questionnaire is now on the press and in a short while copies will be sent to each member of the committee. Plans should be made for proper distribution. These questionnaires will serve as an excellent educative medium if they are used as the basis for discussion at various meetings which may be held between now and the middle of March. The questionnaire incorporated the suggestions made by the various members of the committee after review of these suggestions by the members of the Questionnaire Committee.

Further details relative to the annual meeting will be sent as soon as there is anything to report.

Dear Mr. Porter:

I am returning my ballot for Chicago, inasmuch as the coaches meeting is held in Chicago, and it will save money for the group. If the coaches meeting is on the 4th and 5th, I think it would be better to have the Rules meeting on the 6th and 7th.

It is too tiresome to go from one meeting right into the next, and I think a little breathing spell would be better for all concerned. They could not possibly get through until late afternoon, and as some of the coaches are on the Board of Directors of the Rules body they need that evening to finish their work. We would get a lot more accomplished if this scheme were followed.

I would say that if the meeting were held in New York it should be on April 8th and 9th. Anything will suit me, however.

I am doing a bit of research. Our conference approved all jump balls in the nearest one of the three circles. The problems that we are working on are as follows: The time consumed in bringing the ball across the division line after either a field goal or a free throw by both of the competing teams; the number of held balls at each of the three circles by both of the competing teams; the number of goals scored by the team receiving the tip-off after a jump ball.

I will have something ready about the time of the coaches meeting as our conference will have finished their playing schedule. I am also working on another problem that concerns the coaches more than it does anyone else, and that is an evaluation chart for the basketball player giving merits and demerits on a percentage proposition for the efficient player.

I think that your questionnaire should include the question of throwing up the jump ball in the nearest of the three circles. That seems to be a more logical rule, especially since the football rules committee moved the ball in 15 yards in from the side line, and one official throws the ball to the other official to put it in place. This scheme could be worked out in basketball where one official would throw the ball to the other official to toss it up for the tip-off.

Certainly we should have uniformity concerning the end line and the side line regarding a jump ball.

I also agree with the second notation to declare a jump ball whenever a player in possession is touching the floor with any part of the body other than hands or feet, provided there is an opponent say within three feet of him. That would prevent the piling on, and also prevent a possible injury.

Regarding provision 3, I believe that providing a short interval of rest after a field goal by having the official handle the ball or by prescribing an official's time out in the middle of each period applies to high school rules and not to college rules, does it not? I think it would be well to provide that an official may have the option of calling an official's time out when in his opinion the players are distressed by over-exertion. Certainly the game is too strenuous the way it is being played.

Regarding provision 4, I believe if we should make the division line out of bounds the same as we handle the side line and end line it will clarify matters considerably. Certainly it would be fine to put it in the questionnaire and get the reactions of the group.





EXCERPT FROM THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF
DIRECTORS OF THE KANSAS STATE TEACHERS ASSOCIATION HELD
IN THE ASSOCIATION HEADQUARTERS BUILDING IN TOPEKA,
DECEMBER 20, 1935

The next item taken up was the item of whether or not the secretary should make any arrangements for the admission of students from colleges on a reduced admission charge at the time of the annual meetings of the Kansas State Teachers Association. The secretary explained the difficulty of handling this matter without a definite ruling by the Board. Following this statement, it was moved by A. J. Stout, seconded by Ira O. Scott, that the secretary hereafter be instructed to admit no one to the annual meetings of the Kansas State Teachers Association except those persons who held either K.S.T.A. membership cards, single admission tickets, or passes issued by the secretary. Motion carried.
