Dear Mr. O'Connell:

The Extension Division of the University of Kansas has a two-reel film which is called "Fundamentals in Basketball", which was made by the Eastman Kodak Company of Rochester, New York. It is a part of their teaching class film project and the pictures are excellent, I think, for teaching fundamentals. We use it constantly here at the University. The Eastman people came here and shot the pictures.

Mr. W.H. Maddock is the man in charge. They sell the two reels for \$48.00, but our Extension Division and other extension divisions, like Wisconsin, rent them. The fee for rental from our Extension Division is \$3.00 plus transportation. Perhaps you would rather rent the films than purchase them, but we have two sets here and use them constantly. It is a great thing for teaching fundamentals. I imagine you could use your own projector.
